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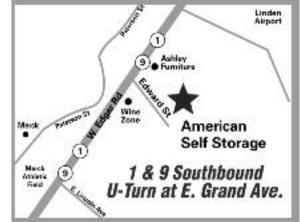

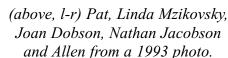

Inside the file was a vintage picture of Dr. Hehnly with the then Board of Education from 1956, a letter from Dr. Hehnly humbly thanking the Board of Education for naming the soon to be constructed elementary school on Raritan Road in his honor, Dr. Hehnly's 1959-1960 contract for \$5,700, and a whole treasure trove of vintage documents.

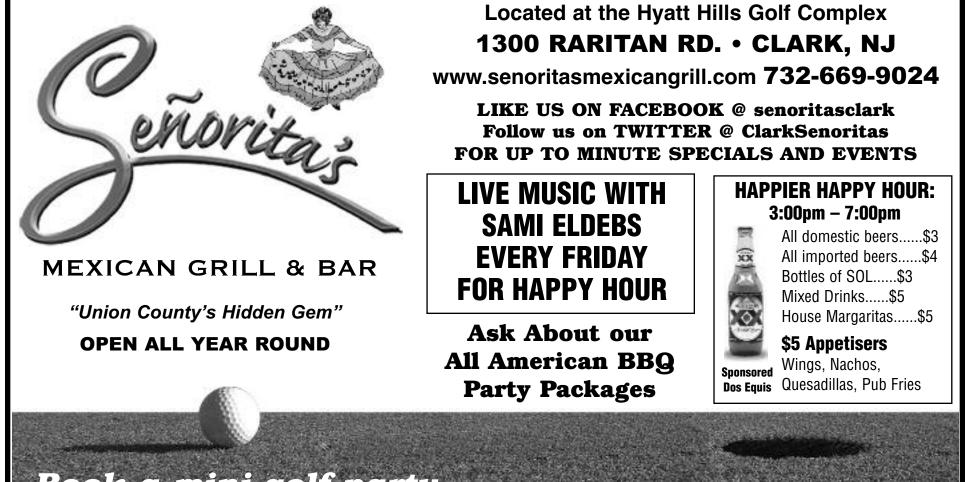
Superintendent of Schools Kenneth Knops, a history buff, thought it would be a nice idea to create a display in the main hallway of the Frank K. Hehnly Elementary School for the purpose of introducing a new generation of students, parents, and teachers to Dr. Hehnly, a distinguished educator whose career ran from 1932 to 1960 in Clark. Second grade teacher Erika Barrett has voluntarily taken on the task of researching Dr. Hehnly's life and career, reaching out to contemporaries from Dr. Hehnly's time in the District, and creating a lasting display in the school hallway. 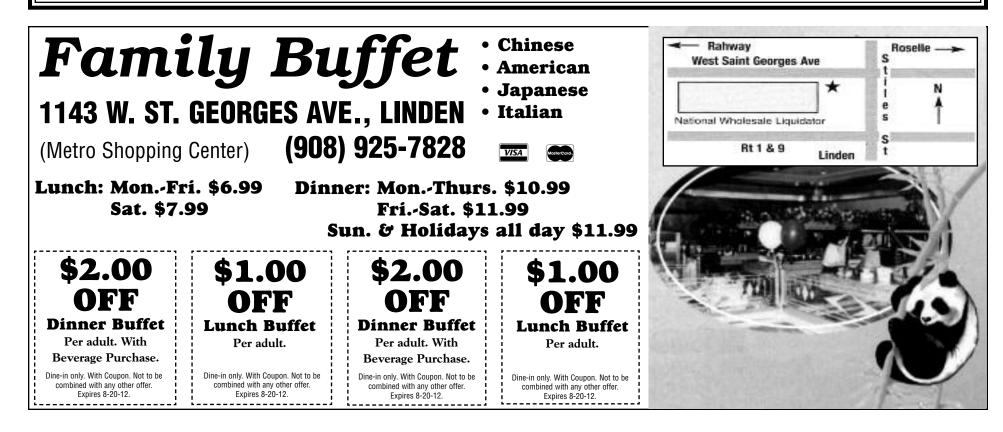

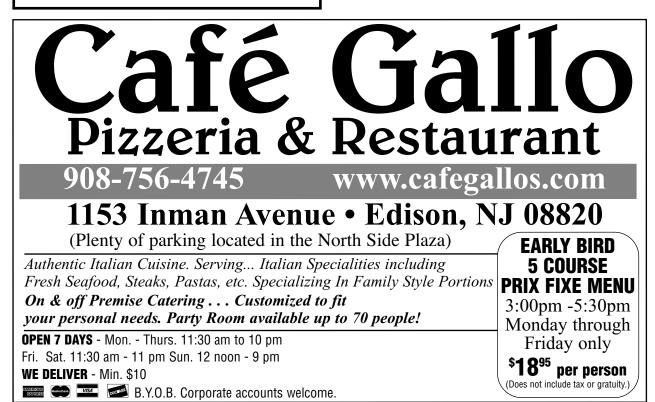

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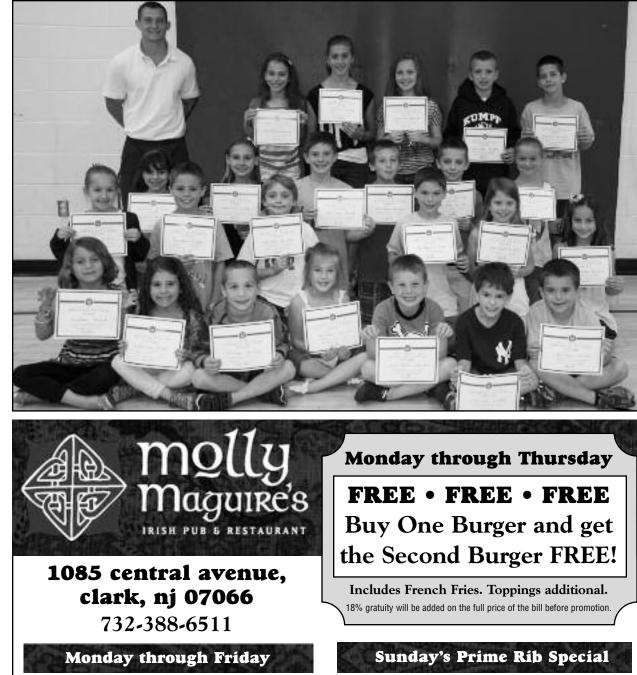

PROGRESSIVE MATHEMATICS INITIATIVE (PMI) TEACHER TRAINING AT KUMPF MIDDLE SCHOOL

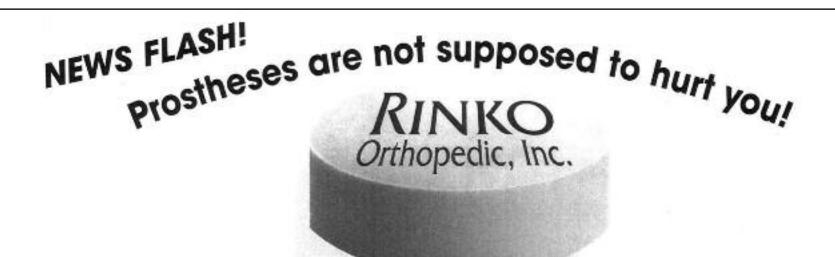
