Summer Squash Ribbon Pasta

- 1 zucchini and 1 yellow squash cut into ribbons with a

- 1/4 cup chopped fresh mint juice and zest of 1 lemon
- ¹/₄ cup toasted pine nuts
- 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil ¹/₄ tsp cracked black pepper
- 4 oz low-fat crumbled feta cheese
- 1 lb linguine pasta

Cook pasta according to package directions. During last 2 minutes of cooking add in squash ribbons to cook, drain and set aside – reserve $\frac{1}{2}$ cup pasta water. Mix mint and next 5 ingredients in a small bowl and mix with cooked pasta and squash. Add a splash of pasta water if linguine seems dry. Enjoy! Make this dish heartier by adding a can of drained and rinsed ShopRite cannellini beans

Tomato Stuffed Peppers 4 large red bell peppers, halved lengthwise and seeds and ribs removed

- 2 garlic cloves, sliced
- 4 medium tomatoes, wedges into 8 pieces
- 3 tbsp chopped olives (recommended kalamata)
- 2 tbsp olive oil 1/2 tsp cracked black pepper

Assemble pepper halves on a baking sheet. Divide garlic and olives evenly among peppers and fill each pepper with 4 tomato wedges. Drizzle with olive oil and pepper. Roast at 375°F for ~50 minutes until peppers are tender and slightly browned. Serve as a dinner side dish or as a side to eggs

in the morning for breakfast.

After developing a care plan focused on increasing Dorothy's strength, endurance and balance, she started a program that included physical and occupational therapies. Strong emphasis was placed on walking, stair climbing and independence in everyday activities.

At the completion of her rehabilitation, Dorothy was discharged home to resume her active life there and in the community. She's climbing stairs, doing laundry, cooking and is independent again. Dorothy made her stay at Clark even more productive by designing and crafting earrings to donate to her church sale. Now at home, she is making more jewelry and creating decorative pillows as well. In addition to the Rehabilitation Team, Dorothy's recovery was aided by excellent care from our nursing, dietary and social work teams.

Seeing as some of our volunteers come to us with very little coaching experience, having the mentors available for practices and games has proven to be invaluable. "The mentors have been key in getting our team up and running this season. They provide great drills and game strategies. In addition, they set a good example for the young players and help to give them the tools and confidence they need to really enjoy the sport. I'm so glad to have them on board!" says Coach Stacy.
