The Borough will dedicate a new memorial to the three victims with ties to Kenilworth who were killed September 11, 2001 in the attacks on the World Trade Center.

Robert Kaulfers was a Sergeant with the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey who died in the line of duty, having rushed from Hoboken to New York City after having learned of the attach. Originally from Roselle Park, Bob was married to Cookie Kaulfers and raised his two (2) children, Timothy and Meredith in Kenilworth.

John Tobin was a senior vice president of the FINPRO Division of March and McLennan, Inc. and was attending a meeting on the 99th floor of the North Tower of the World Trade Center when it was attacked on September 11, 2001. John was married to Barbara and was the father of Jennifer and Sean.

John G. Ueltzhoffer was raised in the Borough and was the son of Lillian and John Ueltzhoffer, a former councilman in the Borough. He was married to Uschi and was the father of three young children, Sarah, Jacob and Rebekah. John worked for Marsh \& McLennan, Inc. on the 95th floor of the North Tower.

The memorial is being constructed by Robert

Vesselli of Vesselli Landscape \& Design and David Kokai of Dave's Landscaping. Both Bob and Dave are donating a good deal of their time to create the memorial. Bartell Farm \& Garden in Clark, NJ generously donated the pavers being used to construct the monument.

The Kenilworth PBA is purchasing the memorial plaque which will be incorporated into the memorial and the Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad provided a piece of a beam from the World Trade Center which was given to them in recognition of their response to the tragedy.

Many local businesses, organizations and individuals donated to the Borough to help defray the cost of constructing the monument. "I am so grateful for all of the contributions made by so many of the merchants and local organizations", said Mayor Fiamingo. "We also received checks from local residents who sent notes remembering Sgt. Kaulfers, Bob Tobin and John Ueltzhoeffer. It was truly heartwarming."

The memorial is being constructed in the front of Borough Hall and will be dedicated on September 11, 2011. All of the residents of the Borough are invited to attend the ceremony which is currently planned for 1:00 p.m.

## NEW LAW MEANS CHANGE IN HOW YOUR TAX BILL LOOKS

This month, when Kenilworth residents receive their third quarter property tax bill, they may notice a new tax line for the public library. Is this a new tax? Absolutely not!

For towns with municipal or joint libraries, the minimum funding requirement of $1 / 3$ mill Library operations tax levy has been in effect since 1884. Until this year, appropriations for these types of libraries were included within the municipal tax rate. This was different for towns within a county library system, which have always had a separate library tax to support library operations.

To ensure fiscal parity among municipalities that support a local or joint library and those that support a county library, on march 21, 2011, Governor Chris Christie enacted P.L. 2011, c. 38 (S-2068). The law provides a dedicated line item on the property tax bill for the minimum funding to municipal and joint public libraries.

The Kenilworth Public Library wants you to
know that this does not result in any increased taxes, but only changes the way your tax bill looks. This change reduces the municipal tax levy and rate, and creates a new line item on the tax bill for library purposes. Now all state residents that support a public library will clearly see the cost of the library on their property tax bills.

This new law simply provides a dedicated line item on the property tax bill to collect this minimum funding. It provides more transparency in library funding and creates equity for municipalities supporting county, municipal and joint libraries as all will be displayed similarly on the tax bill. It does not result in any increased taxes, nor does it change existing financial, operations, personnel, or other relationships between a municipality and the library.

As performed by members of The Hudson Shakespeare Company, the setting is being updated to the 1920 s , making it more accessible to modern day audiences.

## THE BREARLEY WALLS HAVE CHANGED

The David Brearley Middle School Mural Project was made possible through a residency grant from the NJ State Council on the Arts administered by Arts Horizons. The grant was written by David Brearley Middle/High School teacher Janice Marsili and is the fourth of its kind secured by the David Brearley Art Department since 2007.

This $\$ 6,700$ grant covers the cost of a resident artist who works with the art teachers and students over the course of seven months. This year's resident, Julie Deery, is a well-known

Philadelphia mosaic artist. Ms. Marsili and Ms. Perez met Julie when they attended a two week summer artist/teacher institute at Rutgers Camden. Ms. Marsili has attended the institute as part of the last four grants' requirements, and Ms. Perez has obtained a scholarship to attend for the last two summers.
Both Ms. Marsili and Ms. Perez saw the construction of a mural as an opportunity to establish a visual identity for the David Brearley Middle School which shares space with the high school, and, at the time of the grant's writing,

had recently lost its sports and activities programs. However, the project ultimately achieved much more than the art department had hoped for.

With the help of middle school language arts teachers Nicole Warchol, Cindy Yakovchuk, Michelle Van Steenacker and Lauren Blizzard, every single middle school student composed a six word memoir beginning with the words "I AM". The art teachers, two parent helpers and Acting Grant Supervisor Melissa Ferraris, helped the students make butterfly, flower or leaf tiles that they then stamped with their
memoirs. These tiles all became part of the mural, along with hot air balloon tiles created by the middle school teachers and incised with their personal six word memoirs. The mural truly became a wall that talks, giving a voice to the members of the middle school.

The story of the mural details life's journey from childhood through middle school, and includes images of graduation figures passing on to high school at its end. It begins with the Gandhi quote, "Be the Change You Wish to See in the World", then moves on to the next wall with the statement "We Are the Change" and

ends with "We Are the David Brearley Middle School."
The construction of the mural was predominantly the work of the printmaking and ceramics students, the cultural crafts classes, and the eighth grade art cycle classes. However, many others contributed their time and efforts to the project. Teachers, students, administrators, and community members all played a role in the wall's creation.

The materials for the mosaic mural were secured through donations from local businesses as well as by funding generated by the sale of crash glass mosaic frames created by the art classes and marketed by Ms. Kress's business class. The crash glass mosaic technique was taught to the teachers and students by artist Jackie Stack Lagakos who spent two three hour sessions working with the art students. Ms. Lagakos' workshops were made possible through funds raised at last year's art show sale of pottery and prints.

The mural was unveiled to the public at a May 12, 2011 culminating event attended by over 200 students, parents and community members.

## SENIOR EXPERT SHARES LIFE-AFFIRMING MESSAGE

"Life is an Adventure, so Stay Engaged and Active"

The Auxiliary of Trinitas Regional Medical Center welcomed Richard "Rick" Stone, Executive Director of the Senior Citizens Council of Union County, who shared his more than three decades of knowledge of senior health and societal issues with an audience at Trinitas recently. Dr. Stone, whose PhD is in lifespan developmental psychology from West Virginia University, informed the audience that there is increasing knowledge of older citizens thanks to a variety of factors, including the growing study of gerontology.
"Thirty or 40 years ago, there was plenty of information about young people but very little was known about the health and wellbeing of

people as they aged," Dr. Stone explained. "Better health care and better nutrition are helping people live longer now as we see growing numbers of people in their 80 's and 90's and those who are 100 years old or older."

It's important to maintain a positive attitude towards. "Some people go into a panic when they see the first signs of aging and the health issues they may have as they get older," the psychologist noted. "Simply put, life can be an adventure. As people get older they should never stop doing what they have done their whole lives simply because they are older." Dr. Stone cited the work of Maggie Kuhn, founder of the Gray Panthers in the 1970s, stressing, "She believed that too many people accepted stereotypes about what it meant to be 'old.' She worked hard to change that view and, decades later, we're still reaping the benefits of her progressive thinking."

Dr. Stone recommended that older people remain active, engage with younger people, keep up with lifelong hobbies and interests, and consider retiring to an area where public transportation, culture and entertainment are readily available instead of more remote suburbs. He further emphasized that society overall needs to refocus on the potential of aging, instead of the debilitating aspects of becoming older.

He reminded the audience that volunteering energizes older people. "It's better to think about 'giving back' to society rather than concentrating on 'getting' services and entitlements."

Continuing its tradition of volunteerism, community health education and commitment to
