

WEATHER OUTSIDE IS FRIGHTFUL AND/OR DELIGHTFUL

Weather you love the snow or find it to be a nuisance Kenilworth had a record share of it this winter. At the time of this writing, 24.4 inches on average has fallen on New Jersey. The month of January has been reported to be the snowiest in 62 years.

Over the two day storm on Tuesday Jan. 25 through Wednesday January 26, Kenilworth received approximately 19 inches of snow. Kenilworth Department of Public Works employees worked two days straight, throughout the night, and will continue working on snow removal throughout the town. KENILWORTH AWARDED STATE GRANTS

The Borough recently received news that it was approved for a grant of \$190,000.00 by the New Jersey Department of Transportation for the improvement of Washington Street. The grant will be used together with Borough capital improvement funds to repave portions of the street where needed. "We have been successful in obtaining hundreds of thousands of dollars in DOT grants over the past four years," said Mayor Fiamingo, "The cost to pave a road these days is astronomical. These grants make it possible for the Borough to do much more roads than we could otherwise do." The Borough Engineer will submit a proposal for the improvement to be made to Borough Council shortly.

The Borough was also awarded more than \$170,000.00 to perform energy efficiency improvements throughout all of the Borough's buildings, including improvements to Borough Hall, the Senior Citizen's Center, the Library, the Fire Department, Rescue and the Recreation Center. These improvements include energy saving light fixtures, automatic

light sensors, and other energy saving improvements throughout Borough facilities. "Mayor Fiamingo asked that we look into the possibility of obtaining grant money through the NJ Clean Energy Program in December," commented Chief Financial Officer Robert Ordway, "I submitted a number of grant proposals to qualify for these grants and we were very successful in being approved for more than \$150,000.00. We were awarded another \$20,000 in an Energy Efficiency Block Grant." The improvements are expected to provide the Borough with more than \$30,000 in energy savings annually. "I had read that there were not many applications submitted for the Clean Energy Program grant funds," said Mayor Fiamingo, "and I asked that we look into submitting applications for qualifying projects. I am so pleased that our applications were accepted and that these energy saving projects can be implemented with these grant funds." The projects will be implemented as soon as the grant funds are secured.



MEMO FROM THE MAYOR

Obviously we have had an extraordinary amount of snow this past month. Our DPW has worked admirably to remove the snow as best it can, but they need our help to do their job properly:

- 1. Please do not leave your cars on the street during a snowfall. It is virtually impossible to properly plow a Borough street when the plows have to dodge parked vehicles. So, if you do not have available off street parking, ask a neighbor or a friend if you can park in their driveway. Just be prepared to help shovel the way out when it is all over. (Better to shovel your car out of a driveway than out of a mound on the street, I would think.)
- 2. Please do not shovel your snow back into the street. It causes dangerous conditions for you and your neighbors and is counterproductive.
- 3. Borough ordinances require that you shovel your sidewalk within 24 hours of a snowfall. The Borough Police are enforcing that ordinance, so be aware. I would ask people with elderly or infirm neighbors to lend a hand to clear their sidewalks.
- 4. State statutes require that all handicapped parking areas be cleared of snow within 24 hours. That requirement is also being enforced by our Police Department.
- 5. Finally, please try to keep fire hydrants clear of snow. If our fire fighters cannot get to the fire hydrant because it is buried in snow, they will be unable to protect you. Our volunteers work hard after every snow fall to locate and dig out every fire hydrant. Please give them a hand. Do your best not to bury any fire hydrant in snow.

I sincerely hope that by the time this is published we will have had our last snow of the season and that you will simply cut this out as a reminder for next year. If not, please keep these requirements in mind.


The January Middle School Student of the Month is Miss Emma Lucadema. Emma is

APPROACH TO BULLYING PREVENTION

A Proactive Approach to Bullying Prevention Particularly since the tragic suicide of Rutgers University student Tyler Clementi, the issue of bullying has come front and center to the national spotlight. The Kenilworth School District clearly and sincerely recognizes the need to promote a safe and nurturing learning environment, to deal with bullying promptly when it happens, and to work closely with victims (and their families) of bullies.

Both Harding and Brearley Schools have ramped up their efforts to prevent bullying from occurring, rather than to treat the problem after it has occurred. The administration team and faculty in each building have taken a systemic, multi-pronged approach to keeping kids safe by:

- 1. Establishing a process whereby children can report instances of bullying safely and securely.
- 2. Training teachers throughout the year on bullying prevention and victim support.
- 3. Providing anti-bullying programs to students during the day, including formal assemblies and regular guidance counselor in-class support sessions.
- 4. Using sensitivity training programs like "True Colors" to promote empathy among the students and faculty.
- 5. Responding to instances of bullying swiftly and surely, sending the clear message that teachers, administrators, and parents in the school community will not tolerate encroachment on children's rights to learn in a safe and supportive environment.

 Safety and security are the watchwords at

Harding Elementary School. Kids eat in smaller lunch sessions and teachers and lunch aides have been trained on effective student supervision techniques. Everyone in the school has been made aware of the "hot spots" in the school schedule when children are most likely to be socializing with their peers so they can monitor situations that can go awry.

To affect social-emotional change in children, the Harding faculty has annually instituted "No-Name Calling Week," a stretch of five school days during which students wear different colored clothes to represent the traits of positive relationships: kindness, loyalty, trust, respect, and peace. The week culminates in a hands-on, interactive assembly all about the five principles.

Harding children are provided individual support as well. The guidance counselor implements formal lessons about topics ranging from peer-to-peer empathy to cyber-bullying. Those young ones who seek emotional support can speak to a teacher who will complete a formal bullying discipline form or can place a note in the local law enforcement supported DARE program's anonymous box. Issues are either addressed directly to the school counselor or are presented to students during class for the benefit of from which to learn.

Elementary programs make way to agesensitive anti-bullying measures at the Brearley Middle- High School. Guidance counselors conduct peer support groups for both bullies and victims. The assistant principal (he has an "open-door" policy) is accessible by email, phone, and personal contact. And, the annual assembly programs provided to students are agerelative. This February's program for all students will feature John Halligan, featured around the country as a forceful advocate of anti-bullying measures and victim rights. His son Ryan's suicide was the result of bullying and cyber bullying incidents.

Brearley's character education initiatives are what work to develop socially-emotionally healthy and mature adolescents from the "ground up." A proactive, preventive approach to styming the problem of bullying has students taking semester-long health courses that infuse two important programs, "Sticks and Stones" and "Quest." To foster better understanding and sensitivity to the different personality and attitudinal traits teachers and students bring to the classroom, everyone in the school (teachers and students alike) have discovered each other's "True Colors," more effectively recognizing the fact that no two of us are alike.

Teachers district-wide are trained annually in September and again in February to recognize the signs of victimization of bullying and to be reminded of the protocol to follow when bullying incidents are suspected. The district is fortunate to be working with Jim Burns, nationally recognized expert on bullying prevention and victim support on February 17th and will continue to invite the top researchers and practitioners in the field to treat the problem of bullying not as an incidental part of childhood, but rather, as a national epidemic that must be eradicated like a disease.


