KENILWORTH PBA #135 SILVER CARD ASSOCIATION DONATES MONEY TO LIBRARY TO REPLACE STOLEN FUNDS

In a scene more than a little reminiscent of the classic holiday film "It's a Wonderful Life", Kenilworth Police Sergeant Timothy Dowd and Kenilworth PBA #135 Silver Card Association member Robert W. Schielke presented a \$500 check to Kenilworth Library Director Dale Spindel as a reminder that the Borough of Kenilworth is indeed a small town with a big heart. Several weeks ago, it was reported in the local newspapers that a fundraising jug filled with approximately \$450 in coins and bills was stolen from the library's circulation desk, with the culprit going unapprehended. At the time, Spindel was quoted as saying that she was "angry, sad, disappointed and surprised" by the theft. However, as word of the theft spread, members of the community, many of whom had previously contributed to the jug, flocked to the library to make donations to replace what had been taken.

After a photo-op with an oversized version of the \$500 check, a still smiling Spindel said that she was now "elated, touched and more than a little overwhelmed" by this latest manifestation of generosity toward the library. Spindel explained that the donation would bring the library that much closer to buying a special piece of equipment for the children's department. "I've always considered myself fortunate to be working in a community that is as nice as Kenilworth and when something like this happens, it just reinforces my appreciation," Spindel added.

KENILWORTH BEGINS 2009 WITH TWO NEW COUNCILMEN

Kenilworth Councilmen Lawrence Clementi and Anthony DeLuca both stepped down when the borough held it reorganization meeting on Wednesday January 7. DeLuca and Clementi both Democrats, won their seats on the Borough Council in 2005 when they made their initial run for office. Both men cited family reasons when they announced that they would not seek a second term in office. Their seats on the Borough Council were filled by Republicans Scott Klinder and Kevin Leary who were sworn in on January 7 along with Councilman Salvatore Candarella who was reelected to fill the remainder on an unexpired term. Councilman Sal Candarella is a small business owner. Councilman Candarella also serves as Chair of the Planning, Zoning and Ordinance Committees, and as a member of the Finance Committee. Prior to joining Council, he was a member of the Planning Board and Board of Adjustment. He is also an active member of many community organizations. Councilman Candarella is a past Grand Knight and former trustee of the Kenilworth Knights of Columbus. Sal, his wife Darlene and son, Marc Antony are Parishioners of St. Theresa's Church.

Klinder has served as a member of the Kenilworth Rescue Squad and the Hudson County Anti-Terrorism Task Force and is a former President of the NJ State Park Police Union.

Councilman Kevin Leary is a lifelong resident of Kenilworth. He is a self employed political consultant and he is a former Congressional aide to Congressman Mike Ferguson. Councilman Leary has served on the Kenilworth Municipal Planning Board and Board of Adjustment. He is a parishioner of St. Theresa's church and is a second degree Knight with the Kenilworth Knights of Columbus.

10 years ago by teacher Diane Westbrook. It is a community focused group that engages students in grades 9-12. There are 120 members in the 2008/2009 school year. 


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LIBRARY **B-DAY** BOOK RAFFLE

ARE YOU HEATING THE NEIGHBORHOOD?

snowfall will give a clear indication if your home is losing heat. If your home has a clean roof while others are still covered with snow then you are wasting huge amounts of money and fuel. The recent snowfall gave you the opportunity to see if your roof was keeping the heat in your home or if you were paying to heat the neighborhood.

After a few inches of snow fell, the weather stayed below 30^{0} for a few days. The below freezing temperature kept the snow frozen for over a week but for some homes the snow melted within hours.

You can only image the energy it takes to melt snow on the surface of your roof in below freezing weather.

Heat rises and, unless contained, it will rise straight through your roof. In addition to attic insulation, roofs should also include material that assists in containing the heat. Attics should also be properly ventilated for maximum efficiency. Poorly vented attics run the risk of trapping moisture which can lead to the formation of Black Mold and decay.
