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MEMO FROM THE MAYOR

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Four years ago, I began my first term as mayor of this wonderful Borough. Life was good, everyone was prospering financially and we were all riding high. A year or so later, the global economic meltdown began and the riding wasn't so high anymore.

The plans we had in the Borough to move forward to build a new public safety building had to be shelved and we entered into a period of difficult financial burdens on many levels. State aid to the Borough was slashed at

the same time that costs and expenses for things like health insurance, pension benefits and other costs beyond our control skyrocketed.

This administration worked hard to minimize tax increases while maintaining the services that our residents have come to expect. In fact, Kenilworth continues to provide services like garbage pickup, bulky waste pick ups and sewer fees in their tax base while other towns have been forced to eliminate services and pass the costs on directly to their taxpayers.

We saw a sea change in our police department with the retirement of several officers, including Chief William Dowd. New Chief Ken Grady has gone to great lengths in his short tenure to modernize the department. This administration has also replaced uniformed officers with civilian dispatchers, placing those officers on the street where their profession and training best suit them. And though it was not economically feasible to construct a new public safety building, we did expand the police facilities by acquiring the building adjacent to the municipal lot and converting it into offices for the detective bureau.

Even the weather was a nightmare in 2011, including Hurricane Irene and her devastating flood, the Halloween snow fall and even an earthquake. Despite these unprecedented weather events and their aftermaths, through the tireless efforts of the members of the Kenilworth Volunteer Fire Department, the Police Department and the DPW, the Borough recovered relatively quickly.

While other towns struggled to recover from the flooding or left their residents to fend for themselves after the snowfall, the members of our Police and Fire Departments and our DPW worked long hours to see that the Borough was quickly back in service. This administration recognized the needs of our residents and acted to meet them. After the snow fall the members of the Fire Department and our DPW were again called upon to work hour upon hour to clear fallen limbs quickly and efficiently. Halloween was not postponed in the Borough of Kenilworth.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars in grants have been obtained over the past four years for many purposes, including infrastructure improvements and energy saving upgrades at all of our municipal facilities. Some of the renovations at the new detective bureau are being funded by grants which we have obtained. Computer equipment throughout Borough Hall has been upgraded for much needed and long-overdue modernization. Borough Council meetings may be viewed on three cable channels and over the internet. A new web site will be unveiled in the next few weeks providing more information to the public at the click of a mouse.

I am extremely proud to have been a part of the creation of the September 11th memorial. I am even more proud of my fellow residents who came out in force to commemorate the lost lives on the tenth anniversary of that horrific day.

Although I am hopeful that 2012 will bring positive economic change to our country and our Borough, the days ahead remain challenging. Manufacturing activities at the Merck Campus will be phased out by the end of this year. On the positive side, the new R&D facility is anticipated to open at the same time. I have had meetings with Merck representatives to discuss redevelopment of the site and will continue to make that a priority of this administration.

I would like to congratulate Scott Klinder and Anthony DeLuca on their election to council. I would also like to thank Council members Brian Joho, Fred Pugliese, Scott Klinder, Pete Corvelli, Sal Candarella, Kevin Leary and Toni Giordano for all of their hard work and dedication in 2011.

Last but certainly not least, I want to thank all of those who have supported me and have confidence in me. I have worked very hard with council to do the very best for the Borough and I look forward to serving you again as Mayor.

I wish everyone a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year. May God bless the United States of America, the Borough of Kenilworth, each of you and your families.

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KENILWORTH GIRL SCOUTS EARN BRONZE AWARD

The fifteen 11-year old members of Kenilworth Girl Scout Troop 437 recently achieved the highest award Junior level Girl Scouts can earn. The Bronze Award is achieved by girl scouts who earn two badges related to their Bronze Award Project, complete the Sign of the Star and the Lead On and Girl Scouting in the U.S.A. badges. The Award is usually achieved by Girl Scouts before they bridge to the Cadette Girl Scout Level.

Once those tasks are completed, the candidates are required to develop a service project that demonstrates leadership skills learned as a Girl Scout Junior. The project must show a commitment to community and the Girl Scout Promise and Law.

The girls of Troop 437 developed a project which they believed would help to make their community a safer place by teaching younger children about bicycle safety. SNOW ORDINANCE Adopted

On December 14, 2011, the Borough Council adopted a new ordinance restricting parking on Borough streets during and after a snow event. Effective on January 1, 2012, during a snow fall and for 24 hours thereafter, there is no parking permitted on the odd-numbered side of the streets or in municipal parking lots to permit the Borough to clear the streets and the lots.

Cars parked in driveways must be no less than one foot from the edge of the street pavement. Cars parked on the street must be no less than 4 inches from the curb or street edge. No one may attempt to reserve a parking space by placing any type of material in the street. No one may throw snow into the street and vehicles may not be parked in any manner which would restrict or prohibit removal of snow by the Borough.

The ordinance was adopted as a result of the blizzard of 2010 when streets were virtually impassable for days after the storm. The police, fire department and DPW reported that with cars parked on both sides of the street it was impossible to get plows and emergency vehicles through. All of those departments asked Council to adopt an ordinance which would alleviate these problems.

Borough residents must take note of the new ordinance and abide by the parking restrictions. If possible, vehicles should be parked off the street to allow those without off-street parking the opportunity to park their vehicles.

The fines for failing to abide by the ordinance range from \$150 to \$1,000. For more information about the ordinance, please request a copy from the Borough Clerk.

BREARLEY MIDDLE SCHOOL AND HIGH SCHOOL ACADEMY OF SCIENCE, ENGINEERING, TECHNOLOGY, AND ART (STEM-A) WILL BE HERE IN 2012-2013

The Brearley Academies were introduced to the Kenilworth community in May 2011. Slated for a 2012-2013 school year launch, the Brearley Middle School and High School Academy of Science, Engineering, Technology, and Art (STEM-A) will accept its first classes of between 15-20 Kenilworth students in each the middle school and high school programs.

Phase One of planning is already complete. A team of middle-high school teachers and administrators gathered to develop proposed selection criteria and a four-year program of study. These content and organizational specialists visited other programs and collected best practice ideas that the planning team will reinvent to make even more engaging and dynamic. Our academies will be world class institutions that prepare career-minded young adults for select professional occupations.

We seek local business-community and parent input before we implement Phase Twodevelopment of curricula, specialized support programs (symposiums, field trips, and guest speaking engagements). To form our Academy Community Advisory Group, we've identified parents, a member of the Board of Education (Mr. Gerard Laudati), two local business owners, and a Brearley High School graduate who is currently employed in a STEM field.

What the planning team will propose to this group is that selection criteria be rigorous yet fair. Acceptance into the Academies will be based on multiple criteria, and students will be given the opportunity to illustrate their abilities through different measures. An aptitude test will assess student's reasoning skills. Standardized test scores will reflect acquisition of the skills inherent in the New Jersey Core Curriculum Content Standards. Class grades will show work ethic, and an interview screening process will consider an applicant's willingness and ability to work with his or her peers.

Once accepted to the STEM-A Academies, the cohort of students will begin the first-year course of study that will require them to take honors classes, an Advanced Placement course (for college credit), and several career-focused sessions that will introduce them to the science, technology, engineering, mathematics and related arts fields. Courses will become more sophisticated from year to year until the culminating senior year series of field experiences (internships) and college-level classes that we intend to have offered by Kean University's own STEM program. A junior year experience will emphasize community service, and we will propose that students be bused to various community service organizations (i.e. shelters, food banks) where they can give to those in need.

A NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONTHAT WILL HELP OTHERS

Literacy Volunteers Recommends Volunteering To Help Others Learn to Read.

A typical New Year's resolution involves things like losing weight, giving up a bad habit or getting more organized. While those goals are important to the person making them, Literacy Volunteers of Union County (LV-UC) is asking you to expand your 2012 New Year's resolutions and help your fellow community members.

Volunteer tutors are trained at a 15-hour workshop where they will develop the skills needed to work with adult learners in their community. Resource materials are provided at the workshop and the professional staff of LVUC provides ongoing support to all tutors. In addition, free in services on specific literacy topics are offered several times a year and tutor mentors meet with new volunteers.

A New Tutor Training Workshop Series begins January 21 at the Plainfield Public Library, 800 Park Avenue, Plainfield, and continues January 28, February 4, and February 11 (if needed for a snow day). The workshop begins promptly at 9:30 am and concludes 2:45 pm each Saturday. Attendance is required at all sessions to be come a certified tutor and you must be at least 18 years old, able to read and write English, and willing to commit to tutoring at a Union County Library for one hour a week for one year.

There is a \$40 non-refundable registration fee to cover the cost of materials provided at the workshop and scholarships are available to qualifying individuals to cover this fee.

THINGS THEY DON'T TEACH YOU ABOUT IN LIBRARY SCHOOL

As is the case with many public libraries, senior citizens make up a large proportion of the people who use the Kenilworth Public Library. Of all our adult patrons, the seniors are the ones who are less likely to be in a rush when they stop by; they are more inclined to spend time browsing the shelves, chatting with members of the staff or each other, or just hanging out for a while to read newspapers or magazines. The seniors also make more frequent visits to the library than do many of our younger adult patrons who are still in that stage of life that keeps them busy with work and family responsibilities. Because of this, we have the opportunity to get to know many of our senior patrons pretty well.

Although I have established friendships with library patrons of a variety of ages, the connections I have made with older visitors to the library are among my most memorable. My first such friendship originated at my first professional job out of library school; a rather crotchety gentleman who was nearly fifty years my senior and a frequent visitor to the reference desk was the first person I encountered who made me realize that the issue of age was really irrelevant to the development of a friendship. Although I later moved on to a position at a different library, this gentleman and I continued to maintain our friendship mostly by telephone and when he died a few years after that, it was from his wife that I received a personal invitation to attend the small memorial service at their home that was intended for close family and friends.

Many years have passed since then and I am now much closer in age to my senior library patrons than I am to the young librarian that I was all those years ago. I have been at the Kenilworth Public Library for nearly fifteen years now, far longer than I have worked anyplace else, so this brings me - as it must - to the sadness that I feel when we lose one of our regular patrons to illness, infirmity and eventually death. Librarians often joke about those situations we occasionally end up dealing with but for which we've had no special training - the overflowing toilets, dead animals in the parking lot, circulation desk computers that suddenly crash in the middle of a busy afternoon - classifying these events as "things they don't teach you about in library school." Unfortunately, librarians are not nearly as comfortable discussing with each other the sadness and loss we feel when we lose a patron who, over a period of many years, had become a

, regular presence in our work environment.

During the past couple of years, my library has lost more than a few of our regulars so it is with sadness this holiday season that I reflect on the fact that John is never going to get to enjoy those new armchairs that were just ordered for his favorite reading spot, that Lenore was not around to celebrate the recent dedication of the beautiful new sculpture that was installed on the library's front lawn, and that Marian, Joe and Teresa all were absent from this year's book group holiday party. We also know that it's going to take a long time for staff members to stop automatically thinking of Mr. V and Ms. G (who died way too young) when books by their favorite authors are added to our collection. At this time of year we also especially miss Irma who was not only a regular library patron but also a former member of our staff.

I have come to recognize that there is no way that any of this could have been taught in library school – it can only be learned on the job. As sad as this is, I would not want to have it any other way.

BOOK GROUP TO DISCUSS WINTER'S BONE

The book group of the Kenilworth Public Library will meet at 7:15 on Tuesday, January 24 to discuss Winter's Bone, a novel by Daniel Woodrell. Published in 2006, Winter's Bone focuses on the peculiar dilemma of Rees Dolly, an already overburdened seventeen year old girl who must choose between finding and turning in her bail bond jumping, methamphetamine cooking father or face losing the family home. As much about family loyalty as it is about the drug culture of the poverty stricken Ozarks, the novel is also the story of a young woman drawing on her inner strength in order to make sense out of the truly awful circumstances that she is forced to live within. A movie adaptation of this novel appeared in theaters in 2010; that same year the movie was awarded the Grand Jury Prize for best dramatic film at the Sundance Film Festival and also received four Academy Award nominations.

Participation in the book discussion group is free and open to all members of the general public, including people who reside in communities other than Kenilworth. No previous experience with a book group is required and new members are always welcome.
