



SCHOOL DISTRICT STUDENTS EARN AP SCHOLAR AWARDS KCoC • Page 9 • November 2010

Brearley High School currently offers a wide variety of Advanced Placement (AP) courses to its students. AP provides motivated and academically prepared students with the opportunity to earn college or university credit or advanced placement once enrolled in a college or university, and to stand out in the college admissions process.

Each exam is developed by a committee of college and university faculty and AP teachers. The exams are aligned with the same high standards expected by college faculty at some of the nation's leading liberal arts and research institutions. Research consistently shows that AP students who score a three or higher on AP Exams (based on a scale from one to five, with five being the highest) typically experience greater academic success in college and higher graduation rates than students who do not participate in AP.

Brearley High School provides opportunities for students to participate in such programs as AP Micro Economics and AP Environmental Science. The district is very proud to announce that five of the 34 students who took the most recent AP exams have earned AP Scholar awards in recognition of their exceptional achievement. This is an outstanding recognition of our talented students' work considering only about 18 percent of the 1.8 million students worldwide who took the AP Exams performed at a high enough level to have earned an AP Scholar Award.

One Brearley student qualified for the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average grade of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of three or higher on four or more of these exams. BOOK GROUP TO CELEBRATE TWAIN ANNIVERSARY YEAR

The year 2010 marks the 175th anniversary of Mark Twain's birth as well as the 100th anniversary of his death. To celebrate this special milestone, the book discussion group of the Kenilworth Public Library will meet at 7:15 PM on Tuesday, November 23 to discuss two works by Twain, Pudd'nhead Wilson and Adventures of Huckleberry Finn.

Pudd'nhead Wilson first appeared as a serialized story in The Century Magazine between 1893 and 1894 before it was published separately as a few months later. Considered an "ironic" novel, Pudd'nhead Wilson tells the story of the fictional Missouri frontier town of Dawson's Landing and of two babies who are switched not too long after birth, one the free born son of a wealthy landowner and the other the son of Roxy, a light skinned freed slave who is caretaker to them both.

Considered by many to be the great American novel, Adventures of Huckleberry Finn was, ironically, first published in England and Canada; the American edition was delayed by a

couple of months because of deliberate vandalism to the printer's plate of one of the accompanying illustrations. Because of the controversies surrounding Twain's treatment of racial themes and his use of vernacular language, Adventures of Huckleberry Finn has the dubious distinction of having been one of the most frequently challenged books in American schools during the 1990s. It is also likely that the merits of this novel will be debated for many, many years to come.

Participation in the book discussion group is free and open to all adult members of the general public. New members are always welcome, including people who reside in communities other than Kenilworth, and no previous experience with a book discussion group is required. Copies of a compilation of Twain's works that includes both Pudd'nhead Wilson and Adventures of Huckleberry Finn will be available for check out at the library's circulation desk. Because space is limited, preregistration is requested.


