

HOW KENILWORTH SCHOOLS TELLS THE STORY OF A CHILD

Dr. Scott Taylor, Assistant Superintendent, Kenilworth Public Schools

There's a story to tell about every child who starts to learn about the world into which she is born. The learning process is actually believed to begin when the fetus is aged between 37 and 40 weeks (a key finding of an ongoing research project by Canadian and Chinese researchers who are studying infant development). Of course, babies gain lots more understanding and learning once they actually enter the world. So, chapter one of the learning process is written as little ones look, listen, and touch the people and things around them.

In the Kenilworth School district, a child's story begins when she enrolls in Kindergarten. We begin to paint a performance picture that encapsulates her ability to identify letters, write her name, recognize numbers, and conceptually describe the things with which she interacts every day. Her learning story closes with the senior year "chapter" that includes years of performance measures that evaluate her preparedness for life after high school.

Since a story is only as good as its details, our school district has pulled together a large array of performance measures that will describe a child's ability to grow socially, emotionally, and academically over 13 years time, from Kindergarten through Twelfth Grade. We've also harnessed the power of a tool called Genesis with which, once it is fully operational in spring 2012, every teacher will be able to read the performance story we are cultivating.

The first step is having our Kindergartners and First Graders take a test called the Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) assessment. Teachers identify children's fluency skills at the very basic level.

Beginning in Second Grade and culminating in their junior year of high school, students take the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) test. MAP results describe how effectively a child has grown in the language arts, math, and science content areas. Another element of the performance story is the set of benchmarks teachers share in Genesis. Benchmarks include mid-year projects, mid-term and final exams, and major unit tests administered from textbook programs the district have adopted. Finally, we look at the standardized assessments New Jersey requires all Third to Eighth, and Eleventh Graders to take each spring- the NJASK and HSPA tests.

Thus. Kenilworth School child's a performance story is based on multiple measures. We recognize that each child is an individual who brings different expertise and abilities to the classroom. The most accurate way we can determine a child's learning needs is to collect all kinds of performance data from a variety of sources. When all of this data is placed in Genesis, our teachers will be able to view the performance story from Kindergarten through the high school senior year by selecting from a multitude of "data views" for that child. Each teacher will have access to every student's performance information by selecting a data view and seeing a historical longitudinal display of the multiple performance measures we will have collected over time.

Parents will have access to their children's performance stories as well. Teachers will be able to share all of this information during conference time or upon request. We will help each child grow to her fullest potential by telling

her performance story over the life of her educational career in our community. Individualizing instruction is the most effective way to prepare our children for a lifetime of continual learning and adult independence.
