

He was at the PATH bureau in Hoboken, when the call came through about the World Trade Center attacks he rushed to New York City. Reports vary, but it is believed he was last seen at the South Tower. Originally from Roselle Park, Bob was married to Cookie Kaulfers and raised his two children, Timothy and Meredith in Kenilworth.

John worked in Midtown Manhattan, but on that Tuesday, he left his Kenilworth home early to attend a meeting on the 99th floor of the North Tower of the World Trade Center. John G. Ueltzhoeffer, 36, a software architect for Marsh & McLennan Inc., he was at work on the 95th floor of the North Tower of the World Trade Center when the first plane struck. John was raised in the Borough and was the son of Lillian and John Ueltzhoffer, a former Kenilworth councilman. He was married to Uschi and was the father of three young children, Sarah, Jacob and Rebekah.



HOW SHOULD A SCHOOL DEFINE SUCCESS?

Dr. Scott Taylor, Assistant Superintendent, Kenilworth Public Schools

There has been much debate about how preparedness. schools should define success. The easy answer for many is that success is measured by an increase in standardized test scores. Each November, regional newspapers publish a spread's worth of test score data and district comparison information. However, there are more thorough ways in which to view and measure success.

Secretary of Education, Arne Duncan is proposing sweeping changes to NCLB that would have schools be evaluated based on their ability to prepare students for either posthigh school jobs or college. He is also suggesting that schools would also be judged on their ability to show student growth from school year to school year. Duncan's message is being received well by Washington legislators. The possibility that schools will be viewed through the lens of a "growth model" and an ability to foster postprimary/ secondary school success is welcome news to Kenilworth School District staff. We have in place several initiatives and projects that reflect the national trend to define success according to the growth model of

Since arriving in the district, one of my mantras has been, "We must tell the story of a child from Kindergarten to Senior year." Teachers and administrators talked extensively about assessment last year and discussions will culminate this year in the building of an student information system electronic "assessment portal" that will keep common assessment data agreed upon by grade and content-area teachers teams in one place for all district faculty to see. After bringing an assessment tool called Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) to the fold, the district will have constructed a single, comprehensive point of review of a child's performance that will tell the 13-year story of a Kenilworth student.

The Brearley Middle-High School's Personalized Student Learning Plan (PSLP) initiative is designed to help students determine a path out of high school. The newly instituted PSLP program will continually be tweaked to serve the needs of the students as they may change, and district staff will always put a best foot forward to coach our students for life

outside Brearley's walls. You can read more about the PSLP initiative in the May 2011 issue of Kenilworth Business Life which can be downloaded at:

Growth and preparedness are but two measures of student achievement. Success is not always tangible. Veteran teachers know the "aha" moments that are not measured by numbers. New teachers may consider making it to June whole and intact a marker of success. I propose that schools measure success by all of these things and that we recognize that schools are charged with helping children in a multitude of ways.





In the rush to buy pens, pencils and notebooks for the back to school crowd, busy parents might overlook one of the most important tools they can get for their children - a card at the Kenilworth Public Library. September, in addition to being the traditional "back to school" time, is also National Library Card Sign-Up Month. Although Kenilworth is fortunate to have excellent libraries and librarians in its schools, the public library also plays an important role in the academic success of local students. Studies have shown that children who are read to in the home and use the library do better in school than children who do not have this important advantage. The Kenilworth Public Library offers an opportunity for parents to participate in their children's reading experiences and reinforce the message that reading is important.

Through its webpage, kenilworthlibrary.org, the library provides access to its online catalog, giving cardholders the ability to check the library's holdings and place reserves on items from home. The webpage also provides access to online databases, including a student version of The Encyclopedia Britannica, which can be accessed at home through the Internet at no cost to the user. Additionally, the webpage is the place where parents can stay on top of the library's full schedule of exciting activities and special programs that can be enjoyed by children and their families, including crafts, bingo, toddler time, story times, musical performances, a Friday evening Halloween celebration and even, on occasion, visits to the library by live animals with their handlers. New this year is

Tuesday morning lap sit program for babies and educational software for children 2 through 9. their caregivers. Activities targeted for adult audiences include the library's popular book discussion group as well as a variety of other programs and guest speakers.

An excellent new service available to Kenilworth Library patrons is the ability to sign up for Wowbrary, a weekly online subscription that provides current information regarding the newest books, audiobooks, DVDs and CDs that are being added to the library's collection. The library's webpage prominently features a link to the most current Wowbrary issue, along with a link to get you started with your own subscription. Additionally, patrons wishing to subscribe to the library's email updates of upcoming events and acquisitions of the children's department can do so by contacting Robin Koerner, the library's Coordinator of Children's Services at rkoerner@lmxac.org.

In addition to its excellent collection of books for everyone from babies to seniors, the library currently owns approximately 2,300 DVDs which can be checked out, at no charge, for a three day period. There are also more than 1,000 CDs covering every musical taste imaginable and an ever growing collection of popular audio books in CD format. Through the website, cardholders also have access, through the ListenNJ icon, to hundreds of current and classic downloadable e-books and audiobooks.

But that's not all!!! The library also provides free high speed access to the Internet as well as two computers that serve as dedicated word processors, plus the extremely popular AWE computer which is specially loaded with fun and

Best of all, the Kenilworth Public Library is proud of its people, with a staff that is friendly, knowledgeable and second to none. The library staff stands at the ready to help people find the information they need and the books that they want to read next, regardless of how off the beaten path these requests might be. To see just how helpful and friendly we are, Kenilworth residents who wish to apply for a library card can do so by coming to the library and presenting a current driver's license or other document which provides proof of residency such as a rental agreement or utility bill which includes both the applicant's name and address. For children under age 18, a parent or legal guardian must present any of the above mentioned forms of identification for themselves and co-sign their child's card. Anyone not residing in Kenilworth but who either works or goes to school with the Borough is also eligible for library borrowing privileges as is anyone residing in any community within Union County with the exception of Summit and Winfield Park. The recent completion of the library's elevator makes the library even more welcoming to people with disabilities and babies traveling in strollers.

IN THE AFTERMATH OF HURRICANE IRENE

In the aftermath of Hurricane Irene, I want to express my thanks to all of the police, emergency and public works personnel who worked tirelessly to do what they could for the residents of this Borough.

Our police officers patrolled throughout the storm on Saturday night and Sunday, standing ready to help anyone in need. On Sunday morning, when a good part of the Borough had lost power, the police were helping residents navigate the streets, safe from fallen trees and downed wires. Chief Grady, Captain Hannon, Lt. Dowd, Sgt. Fennes, and Sgt. Sims, among others stood front and center, helping with the recovery efforts.

The members of the Department of Public Works readied themselves to clear fallen trees and debris, so that the streets were passable and utility workers could get to the process of restoring power. The DPW began their work early on Sunday morning and continued until all of the trees and debris were cleared. Supt. Ryan arranged to have trucks come in to clear the water soaked property of people hardest hit in the flooding.

Sunday morning the neighborhood on the west side of the Borough, near the Cranford border, was flooded with several feet of water. The Boulevard from Pembrook Drive west to From the desk of Mayor Kathi Fiamingo

Cranford was a lake and flood water filled the basements and living areas of homes in that area.

Throughout Saturday evening and well into Tuesday night, the members of the Kenilworth Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad worked around the clock to do what they could to pump water out of homes and assist as many people as possible. On Sunday, boats were employed to assist several people from their homes to safety.

In addition to assisting people who had sustained severe damage from the flooding caused by Hurricane Irene, the Fire Department and Rescue Squad answered fire and rescue calls. Keep in mind that the members of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad are volunteers, serving without compensation to provide help to the residents of this Borough.

Many residents also offered their help which was gratefully accepted. Joey Lospinoso and his wife, Patty, brought sandwiches to the Fire Fighters. Rich Vitale lent his boat to help get some residents out of their homes and through the flood waters. Ed Pastor sent a front end loader to get some fire fighters through the flooded streets to a home to answer a rescue call. Rich Picerno brought a large truck in case it would be needed to get through the waters and ferry people from their homes to dry ground. Throughout the storm and during the clean up efforts I maintained contact with Police Chief Grady, Fire Chief Giordino and Department of Public Works Superintendent Ryan. I can attest to their hard work and long hours.

Fire chief Giordino was particularly helpful in keeping me informed about where help was most needed. As I write this memo on the Tuesday evening after the Hurricane, the chief and the members of the fire department and rescue squad are still out there helping the residents and I am in contact with PSEG officials to push for the quick restoration of service for residents on the south side of town who remain without power.

The governing body will do its best to assist those who suffered losses. At this point, the Borough is waiving permit fees in addition to those waived by the State for flood related repairs. We urge residents to obtain permits so that their repair work will be inspected by qualified Borough inspectors for the safety of the residents.

These past several days have been difficult for many of our residents. Our hearts are with all of those who were most affected by the flooding. We are all thankful that they are safe.
