MEMO FROM THE MAYOR

difficult year we have had in the Borough but it was quite certainly challenging. The depressed economic

conditions experienced throughout the nation affected the Borough as well. The governing body pulled together with our department heads and presented a budget with an increase in spending of less than 1%. I hope that everyone understands just how impressive that is. The cost of operating this Borough in 2010 increased less than 1% over those costs in 2009. More importantly, this was achieved without reductions in services to our residents.

Kenilworth taxpayers continue to receive the same services in the Borough for their tax dollars that they have received in years past. In many other municipalities governing bodies have resorted to cutting services from their municipal budgets to reduce the tax bills, without actually reducing costs to the those municipalities, taxpayers. In homeowners now pay separately for sewer and garbage fees, have no bulk waste pickups and/or are required to deliver their recycling to community recycling centers, while their tax rates are high and continue to climb. Kenilworth remains a community with one of the lowest tax rates in the county and with services that other municipalities no longer provide.

We are also a community of people with impressive accomplishments. Despite the relatively small size of Kenilworth, in 2010 alone four young men completed the rigorous requirements to achieve Eagle Scout status. Zach Kozak, Jeff Jaeckel and Chris Koehler were each elevated to the status of Eagle Scout. Scott Vanek completed his final project and his Eagle Scout Court of Honor will be held later this month. The Borough also benefited because several of the young men focused on service projects in

2010 was not the most Kenilworth for their final Eagle Scout projects, including painting the Recreation Center, the OEM building and installing a victory garden at the Nietschke House.

> In 2010 we welcomed Robert Ordway as our Tax Collector/CFO. Rob jumped into the position with both feet and has been a fantastic addition to the Borough's team. Rob's enthusiasm for his position and his interest in continually improving himself and the Borough is inspiring. He and his staff in the Finance and Tax Department perform a wonderful job on a daily basis, as do all of the other employees in the Clerk's office, Construction Department and Municipal Court. Thanks to the dedication and hard work of all of our staff, the Borough is run efficiently and professionally.

> In the Kenilworth Police Department we saw the end of an era with the retirement of Chief William Dowd, a fixture in the department for almost forty years. With his retirement, came the appointment of a new chief, Kenneth Grady who has hit the ground running, looking to upgrade and improve the department. He is assisted by members of one of the finest police departments in Union County and the Borough is well-served by them all.

> In fact, the blizzard of last week demonstrates just how well served we are by all of our Borough employees. When workers in other municipalities called in sick or refused to man their positions, the Kenilworth DPW was out in full force during the height of the storm doing their utmost to keep the Borough running. It was a huge task for which they should be thanked and congratulated.

> In the coming months we will be unveiling a new web site for the Borough which we believe will serve as a model for all municipalities. It will significantly reduce the need for the public to make requests under the Open Public Records Act because the new web site will put information available under OPRA at your fingertips without cost to you or the Borough. This administration believes that the public should not have to ask or pay for general

information otherwise available under OPRA. The new website will achieve that result and more. More importantly, it will be completed without cost to the Borough. I am pleased to announce that the new web site is being designed at no cost to the Borough and will be maintained and updated by Borough employees, eliminating the need to pay an outside contractor for that service.

We continue to apply for and receive various grants for projects throughout the Borough. We also continue to explore cost cutting measures through shared services and other possible collaborative efforts with the County and other municipalities. We are currently looking into the possibility of a shared services arrangement for expensive equipment used in Public Works projects. In the past, we have made arrangements with other municipalities on a project by project basis. I recently proposed to other Union County municipalities a more formal cooperative situation which we hope will be mutually beneficial to all participants. We are also utilizing Union County services which may be available to the fullest extent possible in order to maximize our County tax dollars as well as minimize duplication of efforts.

With the Governor's Property Tax initiative, which we fully support, coming into full effect in 2011, we will be looking for additional methods to reduce costs and expenses. It will be challenging to meet the financial requirements of the new legislation especially if State Aid to the Borough is reduced again. We are however dedicated to containing costs and spending and to giving the taxpayer the most bang for their tax dollar.

I hope everyone has a better New Year, and one which is happy, healthy and prosperous for all.

May God bless the United States of America, the Borough of Kenilworth and each and every one of us.

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KCoC • Page 6 • January 2011 WHAT ARE TEACHERS DOING ON THOSE HALF DAYS?

The Kenilworth School District had a clear plan in mind when it asked the Board of Education to grant eight half days to teachers and administrators to engage in professional development activities. What we've been doing on these afternoons is all about promoting student achievement.

More than just an educational buzz-phrase, the idea of "professional learning communities" has taken root in Kenilworth. The administrators, teachers and staff of the Kenilworth School District are committed to the academic progress of our students and are finding ways to improve the learning process. Teachers have formed 21 small groups focused on conducting research, applying new instructional methods in the classroom, and analyzing results.

In 1996, the touted National Commission on Teaching & America's Future made a clear case for the importance of supporting teachers with professional development, pointing out the need for teachers to be able to enhance and build on their instructional knowledge. The Washington Post (December 9, 2010) chimed in on this topic: "making time for peer learning is a critical step toward improving instruction." Knowing the importance of professional development and recognizing the direct impact small-group professional learning has on student academic, social, and emotional growth, Kenilworth teachers have been developing year-long professional development goals, action plans, timelines, and measures of goal attainment since September 1 of this year.

One group of Harding School teachers developed a professional learning community around the positive impact of "guided reading" on young children's' literacy skills development. The group of eight teachers developed a SMART (specific, measurable, attainable, realistic, timely) goal that reads, "upon completion of research, studies, and discussions, teachers will gain a better knowledge of the components of guided reading and identify a guided reading assessment program to utilize in classrooms to gauge the reading levels of our students." These teachers have been reading the most important literature on guided reading and have planned to utilize what for the district would be a new form of literacy skills assessment that will allow K-5 teachers to identify specific reading levels and individualize instruction to elevate reading and reading comprehension skills for each child.

At Brearley, a learning community of seven middle and high school teachers established a SMART goal that has them working toward acquiring an understanding of pedagogy and practices that comprise Lemov's techniques of engaging students (Doug Lemov is a highly respected educational specialist who has documented instructional techniques gleaned from years of observations of outstanding teachers). The group fittingly called its research "[Teaching] Like a Champion" and plans to study the impact implementation of this pedagogical technique has on student achievement.

These are just two examples of the many goals that are being set to improve the quality of the educational environment for our students. Teachers have been documenting their work and progress toward meeting their SMART goals by maintaining blogs on the district's Google Apps. site. Many of the 21 instructional techniques being examined by the district's professional learning communities will be adopted schoolwide in the next two years. These programs will then be sustained with additional professional development support so that they become institutionalized aspects of the district's student achievement program.

How do you get a room full of adolescents to sit and be silent? One glance at the students of David Brearley will reveal that the answer is quite simple....Give them books and let them read.

Too often we don't take the time to sit with a good book, but during the third week of October (official Teen Read Week); students of David Brearley Middle/High School had the collective opportunity to engage with a good story by participating in a school-wide "read-in" for the second year in a row. Every quarter hour, classes rotated through the Instructional Media Center, with students claiming their reading territory like tributes from one of their favorite series, The Hunger Games by Suzanne Collins. Students could be found reading on the floor, under tables, beneath computers, perched on chairs, but all with one thing in common – eyes glued to the pages of a book or magazine.

Teen Read Week (TRW) is an initiative of YALSA, the Young Adult Library Services division of the American Library Association.

David Brearley participated in Teen Read Week for the first time last year, and it was a huge hit, demanding a return engagement this year. The purpose of Teen Read Week is to raise awareness of the importance of reading "for the fun of it", as the TRW slogan says. Reading research shows that independent reading boosts comprehension and helps across the board in all subjects, so it might be more than just "fun" going on when a student cracks open a book, be it a comic book, graphic novel, fantasy, or classic literature.

This year's Teen Read Week was made even more special by mini-grants from the David Brearley PTO and YALSA. The PTO grant funded student awards, and the YALSA minigrant was used to purchase 3 Flip Video camcorders that were used to record the week's activities and were available to students who wished to participate in a video contest. Two favorite activities from last year were continued – daily trivia contest questions were announced over the PA system, and "The Brearlies", awards for favorite books and characters, were put up for student vote.

David Brearley middle school marked the end of TRW with an assembly that rivaled the opening of a highly anticipated vampire series movie premiere. Students were welcomed into the auditorium by their language arts teachers, equipped with inflatable guitars, who rocked out to celebrate the YALSA "Books with Beat" theme. Many students expressed their support for TRW by creating pro-reading signs. Others wore their custom t-shirts and sat in our VIR -Very Important Readers – section. 'The Brearlies' were announced to passionate audience response, and the winners of the daily trivia and the video contests were warmly received.

After two years, TRW is firmly entrenched at David Brearley Middle/High School. While the results of our reading awards may change each year with the publication of new books, our tradition of celebrating teen reading "for the fun of it" is here to stay.
