The Linden Department of Recreation and Community Services is sponsoring a one day boat safety certification course, approved by the U.S. Coast Guard, on Saturday, May 1, 2010 at the John T. MAYOR ENCOURAGES RESIDENTS TO PARTICIPATE IN THE CENSUS

The United States Census 2010 will be classification and that designation increases the mailing forms to every household in mid March, this questionnaire has 10 questions and takes approximately 10 minutes to complete.

By law, the Census Bureau cannot share an individual's responses with anyone other than the applicant; this includes all federal, state and municipal agencies including the IRS and law enforcement entities. All information is kept confidential for 72 years.

Mayor Gerbounka is encouraging all Linden residents to fill out this 2010 Census form. It is important to Linden because it not only counts persons who are naturalized citizens but any person residing in our city.

Every year, the federal government allocates \$400 billion to states and communities based on Census data. If the city of Linden can reach the 50,000 person count, we will receive Urban City Status. This will put Linden into a higher monies we will receive.

Mayor Gerbounka would also like to remind individuals that are undocumented that by filing the 2010 Census they have a permanent record of residency in our city, state and country. In 1986, President Reagan granted amnesty to undocumented individuals that resided in the United States prior to that date. Many undocumented residents used their past Census filings to prove their residency status so they could eventually qualify for citizenship.

It is important that every Linden resident participates in the 2010 Census so that Linden can receive a complete count on each and every individual residing in our great city.

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
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TALE OF TWO CITIES - LINDEN, NEW JERSEY & ALLEN, TEXAS

In the early hours of September 11, 2001, students and teachers across the United States had just settled into a new school year, when the day's tragic events began to unfold.

Now nine years have passed since Americans heard those first unbelievable reports that a plane, and then another plane had crashed into the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center in New York City. Soon this was followed by a crash from a hijacked jet slamming into the Pentagon and another into a field in southwest Pennsylvania. The United States was under attack, killing nearly 3000 Americans. Who would have thought that these tragic events would link two high schools over 1500 miles apart in what has evolved into the Tale of Two Cities program?

Prompted by curiosity, concern, and caring, students from Allen, Texas High School expressed a desire to converse with students in the northeast, within close proximity to New York City. Students felt a need to share their emotions, find out how the events were affecting daily life in the northeast, and search for answers to the many questions they had. Allen staff members contacted Linden High School, located less than 20 miles away from ground zero, and a unique videoconference meeting was arranged. During that initial connection students shared their fears, anxieties, and personal accounts of the disaster. They spoke of school security, religion, and simply hugging their moms before leaving for school. From that first, powerful, electronic meeting, bonds and friendships between the students and staff grew and

everyone felt a connection and need to continue the dialog.

One year later, 20 students and faculty members from the Allen Texas PAL's program (Peer Assistance Leadership) visited their new friends at Linden High School. While in Linden they exchanged gifts with Linden police and fireman, shadowed their peers at Linden High School, visited Ground Zero, and the Statue of Liberty, and set in motion plans to establish a biannual joint scholarship fund. But one of the most touching moments was connecting via videoconferencing technology, a young widow and her three small children from New Jersey to a Dallas car dealer whose family befriended her after her husband perished.

Nine years later students from Allen, Texas PAL's and Linden High School have maintained their videoconferencing relationship. Students use technology like cell phones, text messaging, Facebook, Twitter, and email to stay connected. Linden students have traveled to Allen, Texas twice and Allen students will be returning to Linden for their third visit on March 19 through the 21st. Nearly all expenses have been covered both in Allen and Linden through student fundraising and private donations.

Students get to experience first hand the culture and climate of two very diverse schools, communities, and states. Joseph Cataline, Linden's videoconferencing coordinator and program originator explains, "Since 9/11 the long distance partnership has evolved to promote among students an understanding of global issues, has fostered multicultural

diversity, promoted teamwork, provided an understanding of regional differences and created friendships half way across the United States. The partnership has created opportunities for Linden students that they may never have had." Even with students graduating and with new faces coming into the program every year the close connection between the high schools continues. As one Linden student sums it up, "One terrible tragedy, one amazing connection."

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INJURED SOLDIER VISITS LINDEN SCHOOLS TO SAY "THANK YOU"

On February 16, 2010 the Linden Public Schools played host to a very special visitor: Corporal Joseph Whipple, United States Army. Corporal Whipple was injured in Iraq on April 1, 2009 when the vehicle he was traveling in flipped over after swerving to avoid a bomb in the roadway. He was ejected from the vehicle and the 8,000 lb gunners' turret came to rest on top of him. He sustained multiple severe injuries: 17 broken bones including both arms, both shoulders, his back in 6 places, a collapsed lung and severe head trauma. He awoke 9 days later at Walter Reed Military Hospital in an amputee ward where he was told that he would lose his right arm. It was at this point that the story began to make its way to Linden.

Grant Gutkowski, a Linden resident, former teacher's aide and Linden NJ ROTC Cadet was a 1st Lieutenant in Corporal Whipple's unit in Iraq when he was injured. Lt. Gutkowski took an interest in the plight of his friend Corporal Whipple and his situation that he was in back in the United States. At this point it appeared as if Corporal Whipple would lose his arm and to add insult to injury, the Army classified the incident as an accident since the bomb did not go off therefore Corporal Whipple was informed that he would not receive a Purple Heart or Merit Award of any kind. With his spirits down and more surgeries in front of him, Corporal Whipple was a soldier in need of support. Lt. Gutkowski began to send emails to his brother Burke here in Linden to ask if there was anything that could be done to help Corporal Whipple. Burke is an owner of The Fig Leaf Insurance Agency along with Benjamin Sheedy and Linden Board of Education Member Bryan Tomko. Bryan shared the emails and the request for help with Linden Board of Education Superintendent Dr. Rocco Tomazic in the hopes that maybe a class or a school could adopt this injured soldier and produce some letters of support and encouragement.

Dr. Tomazic, who knows Grant Gutkowski

from his days as Commander of the Linden ROTC program, took this plight very seriously and responded in a big way. Dr. Tomazic brought this situation to the entire district: principals, teachers and students; and asked each school to do what it could to help a soldier in need. The Linden School District did just that. With a sense of community, patriotism and gratitude for our veterans, our schools and our children flooded Corporal Whipple with boxes of candy, notes, stories, drawings, and most importantly special words of encouragement written in their own hand.

Corporal Whipple was very deeply touched by this outpouring of support and kindness and made known his intention to come to Linden and personally thank the students for helping him heal. He arrived in Linden and spent February 16th, 17th and 18th touring all Linden Schools and being received by the students. He was introduced to Linden City Council on February 16th and honored by the Board of Education on February 17th. Corporal Joseph Whipple made good on his promise to come and personally

thank the students and the City of Linden for being there for him and supporting him in his moment of need. In his words, he wanted to personally place the exclamation point at the end of this story. "Having the opportunity to come personally and be a face to the name and let these kids know just how much it meant to me; that was special for me. I wanted to show the kids that the people they write letters to are real and that they do appreciate what the kids do and please keep it up. I have thousands of brothers and sisters still over there that could use some of the same support and encouragement that I received."

As of March 1st, Cpl. Whipple is to be promoted to Sergeant. While doctors were able to save his right arm with about 30% functionality, he is now waiting for his eleventh surgery later this month to remove some plates and try to repair some nerve damage. The scars are real, the pain is real and the people who fight for us are real. The love and support that our community and our students have shown is equally as real and we should all be proud to be a part of that.

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
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A TREE GROWS IN LINDEN

THE FAST AND THE FRUTIEST

The Lunchbox Derby at Linden School No. 6 was a science extension of the fifth grade FOSS science kit Motion and Design. Mrs. Lorenzetti's students had to create a working vehicle out of assorted fruits or vegetables. The Lunchbox Derby was a cross curricular activity which incorporated math, measuring the distance that the vehicles traveled, and charting and graphing the results. A health lesson was infused which reinforced the "five a day" concept of good nutrition, along with the food pyramid. School No. 6 fifth grade scientists used the scientific method to search for cause and effect as they designed their vehicles. Students had to do background research on the process, as a team they constructed and tested a hypothesis by doing an experiment. In the final stage an analysis of the data was constructed where the teams had to draw a conclusion. As a class,

together they had to communicate their team results and answer scientific questions.

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
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Most people have heard about diabetes before and may even know someone who is diabetic. An estimated 23.6 million people in the United States, approximately 7.8% of the population, are diabetics. Of those 17.9 million have been diagnosed but 5.7 million have not yet been diagnosed. Each year about 1.6 million people age 20 or older are diagnosed with diabetes. Diabetes is a life threatening condition in which the body has difficulty converting food into energy for the body. When food is taken into the body it is broken down into glucose which is carried throughout the body by the blood. Without insulin glucose cannot be broken down into energy.

Type 1 diabetes (also known as juvenile diabetes) is categorized as the complete lack of insulin production. This occurs because the immune system destroys the insulin producing cells. Type 2 diabetes occurs when the insulin

produced in ineffective and blood sugar levels (or glucose levels in the blood) increase. Over time the body will stop producing any insulin at all. Type 2 diabetes is typically diagnosed in patients that are 20 years of age or older.

There are several risk factors that are known for type 2 diabetes. Some of these risk factors include family history, history of gestational diabetes, hypertension (high blood pressure), high cholesterol specifically low HDL or "good" cholesterol and high triglycerides, limited exercise (fewer than three times a week), a history of cardiovascular disease, or being overweight.

Obviously as with anything else risk factors are not an absolute, however there are actions one can take to help decrease the risk of becoming diabetic. There is nothing that we can do to change our genetic make-up, so therefore if there are diabetics in your immediate family,

there is an emphasized significance to limit the other risk factors on the list. Maintaining a low fat, high protein diet and limiting salt intake will allow you to maintain cholesterol levels, lose weight, help control blood pressure and maintain steady blood sugar levels. Exercise regularly, mild exercise three to four times a week is sufficient. If your blood pressure is elevated, you should monitor it and treat as advised by your physician. If you are at risk, you are urged to contact a physician. Your physician can work with you to decrease your risk factors and devise a treatment plan that suits you and your medical needs.



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
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
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LINDEN PAL'S 2ND ANNUAL BASKETBALL WEEKEND
