DAN IS THE THIRD EAGLE SCOUT IN THE KENNY FAMILY

On Saturday, June 20, 2013, the Eagle Court of Honor for Daniel Kenny of Troop 235 took place in North Plainfield's Vermeule Center. Congressman Leonard Lance and the Honorable Michael Giordano, Jr., Mayor of North Plainfield, presented special commendations. As a resident of Hunterdon County, Congressman Lance spoke of his own family ties to North Plainfield - his father was a teacher at North Plainfield High School in the 1930's - and compared this to the Kenny family's experience as both Hunterdon County residents and a strong Eagle family in North Plainfield. Dan is the third Eagle Scout in the Kenny family, following in the footsteps of his older brothers, Mark and Ryan. Their mother, Maria was a Den Leader in Pack 149 in Middlesex until all the boys graduated to Troop 235 where their father, Tim, has been Committee Chairman since 2000. Even after moving to Readington in 2004, the family remained in the North Plainfield troop.

Mark became Eagle and graduated from St. Joseph HS in Metuchen in 2007, received a BA in Film and Video from Drexel University in 2011, has a Production Assistant credit on Star Trek Into Darkness and is currently working in the Art department of the next Star Wars film. Mark's Eagle project was to refurbish a gazebo and build and install bird houses in Middlesex Park.

Ryan was awarded Eagle Scout in 2011, graduated early from Hunterdon Central in January 2012 and is living with his brother Mark in LA while he attends NY Film Academy at its Burbank, CA campus. Ryan's Eagle project was to resolve an erosion issue and beautify the area on the slope between the entrance to the North Plainfield Library and the parking lot, as well as to replace the railroad ties at the

bottom of the slope with a block curb. He fund raised over \$3,000 from local residents, community organizations and businesses.

Dan was awarded Eagle Scout this year, graduated from Hunterdon Central on Friday, June 19 and will be attending Roanoke College in Salem, VA in the fall, majoring in Creative Writing. His goal is to work for DC Comics. Dan's Eagle Project was to dig 2 dry wells behind Vermeule Mansion in North Plainfield, where 4 drain spouts were diverting rain water onto the sidewalk and into the parking lot, causing dangerous conditions – especially in the winter. After digging the wells and diverting the down spouts underground with perforated drain pipe, 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ tons of stone were used to fill the wells and cover the drain pipes. Then 3 tons of farm clean soil covered the area where 14 boxwoods were planted and grass see was spread.


CUB SCOUTS' ROCKET DERBY TAKES OFF



NORTH PLAINFIELD FARMERS MARKET VOUCHERS AVAILABLE FOR OLDER ADULTS

News from the Somerset County Board of Chosen Freeholders

Starting Monday, July 8, eligible seniors can obtain \$20 worth of vouchers to buy New Jersey fresh produce such as fruits, vegetables and herbs. These free vouchers can be used at participating farmer's markets in Somerset County until November 30 this year.

People interested in applying may visit the Somerset County Office on Aging & Disability Services, located in the Human Services Building at 27 Warren Street, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 1 p.m., Monday through Friday. Vouchers will be given out on a first-come, first served basis while supplies last.

Eligible individuals must be residents of Somerset County and be at least 60 years old. Income guidelines require that an individual's annual income not exceed \$21,257, and a married couple's annual income not exceed \$28,694.

Applicants are requested to show proof of age and residency such as a driver's license or other documentation. To be automatically eligible, an applicant can provide a Medicaid or SSI card or show proof of participation in a food stamp program. Otherwise, individuals will be asked to sign a Self-Declaration of Income Statement, which lists monthly or annual income, address and phone number. Office on Aging & Disability Services staff will be available to assist residents when they apply for their vouchers.

If seniors are unable to visit the Office on Aging & Disability Services to apply and receive their vouchers, they may send a representative, who is at least 16 years old, has personal identification and the identification items listed above for the eligible senior. The representative must provide a proxy statement or letter that is signed and dated by the eligible senior, which states that the proxy is authorized to pick up the vouchers. A proxy form can be obtained in advance by contacting the Office on Aging & Disability Services at 1-888-747-1122.

For more information, including the closest voucher distribution location, contact the Somerset County Office on Aging & Disability Services toll free at 1-888-747-1122.

A supply of vouchers are available at Borough Hall for distribution. Seniors can get vouchers during normal business hours to the Mayor's Office or the Borough Clerk's Office.
