

RAHWAY POLICE DEPARTMENT COMMUNITY CERT PROGRAM

The Rahway Police Department is looking for people who want to make a difference in our community. Community Emergency Response Team (Cert) program is designed to train people to be better prepared to respond to emergency situations in their community. When emergencies happen, CERT members can give critical support to first responders, provide immediate assistance to victims, and organize spontaneous volunteers at a disaster site. CERT members, currently 40, can also help with non-emergency projects that help improve the safety of the community.

The CERT program is designed to train and set up communications between First Responders and the community to save lives following a major disaster. There will be 8 sessions (20 hours) consisting of the following topics: Disaster Preparedness, Disaster Fire Suppression, Disaster Medical Operations Part 1, Disaster Medical Operations Part 2, Light Search & Rescue Operations, Disaster Psychology & Team Organization, Terrorism, and a Final Practical exercise realistic to this community.

The Rahway Police Department is now accepting applications from people within the Rahway Community who are at least 21 years old and interested in becoming a part of the Rahway CERT Team. The training will be held at the Rahway Police Department on Wednesdays from September 8th, 2010 until October 20th, 2010 from 6:30 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. The program will consist of 7 classes and a practical exercise. The practical exercise date will be announced at the start of the program.

ride on a bus that ran from Westfield to downtown Rahway.



"ONLY FORTY-FIVE MINUTES FROM RAHWAY" Like my father, and uncle and brother before me I attended St. Benedict's Prep in Newark. Every day after school like they had done, I'd take the local train for the twenty minute ride back to Rahway. In fact my grandparents moved to Rahway in 1918 in large part because of the train. Great Grandfather Flaherty moved with them. He had worked for the Erie Lackawanna Railroad. I

was fascinated as a child by the fact that Pop Flaherty's right ring finger was missing in that it blew off while he was dynamiting for a railroad tunnel in the mountains of Pennsylvania. Pop Markey was a telegrapher and worked for the Pennsylvania Railroad. Being a telegrapher meant Pop Markey was on call and he was told by his bosses that "you need to be within a forty-five minute train ride from New York's Pennsylvania Station in case of emergencies so pick a town with a good train station and don't move any further out into the country than Rahway". So Pop and Grandma Markey with their two sons in arm and Pop Flaherty trailing behind moved out of their Jersey City flat and bought a home on Broadway in Rahway close to Ryan's Corner Garage on Madison and Westfield Avenue. My Dad told me that growing up he used to hunt small game with his shotgun in the fields where the Middle School now is. In good weather Pop Markey walked from his new "country" home to our Rahway Station in order to catch the train to work in NYC. In bad weather or maybe when he wasn't quite up to it he'd catch a

RAHWAY'S RAILROADING PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE

Less than one hundred years ago the train tracks running through Rahway were at grade level. Today as you ride along Fulton Street and Broad Street pause to consider that when many of those homes were built, coal fired steam locomotives were puffing dark black smoke and roaring by their front or rear yards at street level. In fact the railroad tracks were first laid in Rahway in 1833 connecting Jersey City with New Brunswick. Rahway was considered a main stop. Many of those old neighborhoods bordering the tracks were home to railroading families. Some of their descendents still live there today.

Every work day hundreds of commuters are standing on the Rahway Station platforms waiting for the next train to get them to work. NJ Transit and the City of Rahway with a "green eye" to the future teamed up about ten years ago and built a fabulous new Train Station and Plaza. Our downtown received the designation Transit Village which is helping to fuel our city's economic engine and making Rahway a more attractive and convenient place to call home. Today our station serves thousands of commuters each week. On the weekends the riders are more apt to be riding for fun and heading off to be entertained in NYC or maybe to Princeton for some of the same or to the Jersey shore and our lovely beaches and seaside resorts. They're all close by and "Only Forty-Five Minutes from Rahway".

convenience to local small business owners.

In the most tangible sign of benefits from the combination of Wachovia and Wells Fargo, Wachovia ATMs throughout New Jersey have been replaced with Wells Fargo state-of-the-art ATMs, which will especially benefit small business owners. Although the new ATMs are Wells Fargo-branded machines, they have a plastic cover over them with the Wachovia brand, which will be peeled away when the Wachovia name changes to Wells Fargo in early 2011.

"We've basically gone from the oldest technology to the newest," said Rahway store manager Sandra Saravia. "Users can stick a stack of 50 cash bills of various denominations or 30 checks into the machines with no envelope or deposit slip. The ATM automatically counts the bills and scans the checks, giving the user an image of each check on a paper receipt," she continued.

"These ATMs are especially helpful to small businesses because all transactions made before 8 p.m. will post to the customer's account that day. Formerly, the ATM cut-off was 4 p.m., and the store cut-off is 3 p.m., so this is a real benefit to them - as well as to consumers depositing paychecks or government checks," Saravia said.

The old ATM machines required a person in the branch to open each deposit envelope and process each transaction by hand, and that's where the "green" comes in. Because the ATMs don't use envelopes or deposit slips, companywide these machines have already saved an estimated 600 tons of paper or 11,681

A new ATM at a Rahway Branch brings added trees, based on estimates from the Environmental Defense Fund Paper Calculator, http://www.papercalculator.com.

"I think consumers and businesses will really appreciate our new ATMs," Saravia said. "They save our customers time and hassle - the ATM does all the math and all the work."

THE VALUE OF A NOSEY NEIGHBOR

It's 2 O'clock in the afternoon and you're home from work early relaxing on the couch, suddenly you see someone walking around the outside of your next door neighbors home, you watch curiously, the person is someone you're not familiar with. Hmm, perhaps he's the meter reader, maybe, but why wasn't your house checked? Maybe he's delivering a package, could be....but maybe he isn't!

You know your neighbor well, this isn't his son or any friend you recognize, you ask yourself "maybe I should call the police?" then you think "no, they'll think I'm a nuisance, crying wolf". Well we can't ask any stronger MAKE THE CALL!

MAKE THE CALL each and every time something arouses your suspicion. The Rahway Police Department is here to serve you and all of your neighbors. We cannot stress enough the importance of early detection when it comes to crimes like burglary or theft. Even with motorized patrols, the odds of being able to spot a criminal in the actual act of breaking into a home are rare. Sure, heavy patrols can deter someone from committing a crime in the first place and we are often successful in apprehending someone after the fact. Often diligent investigative work, tips and contact with the suspect shortly after a crime can lead to an arrest. But NOTHING works as well as early information.

As responding police, we are trained to arrive, assess and decide which is a real crime or incident and which isn't. Maybe the person you saw does have a legitimate reason for walking around the perimeter of your neighbors' home. If they do, being checked by the police is easily explained to them and rarely causes resentment.

It's 2 O'clock in the afternoon and you're If they're not there with good intent, it can and has stopped a crime and better yet, led to the arrest of criminals bent on entering a home.

Perhaps the best advice is this, CALL and don't delay calling. We are ready and trained to take action. NEVER take action yourself, it can be dangerous. Timely notification is the key. Remember this advice: If it looks or sounds suspicious, it probably is. Providing us with a good description of the person(s), direction of travel, vehicle information and any other details you can, will help us tremendously. You can even do so anonymously if you feel awkward, we encourage providing your name in case of future or follow up contact, but we will never turn away your call in either case.
