





SECOND MEMBER OF ROBOTICS TEAM RECEIVES \$ 24,000 STEVENS INSTITUTE SCHOLARSHIP

Stevens Institute of Technology recently awarded a FIRST merit scholarship to Ryan Secor because of his involvement with the Rahway High School US FIRST Robotics Team 1228. Ryan plans to major in Mechanical Engineering and is considering a minor in Naval Engineering. He has chosen Stevens because of its strong mechanical engineering program and its top rated co-op program. He is the second member of the Rahway High School Team 1228 to win a USFIRST scholarship from Stevens Institute, joining teammate Robert Dinocento in receiving this honor.

Secor attends the Academy for Information Technology School in Scotch Plains, but as a Rahway resident he participates in Rahway High School's Robotics Team. He has been involved in the program since he was a student at Rahway Middle School, where he was on the Botball Team and also used to visit RHS after school during the robot build season. Participation in US FIRST Robotics has made Ryan aware of practical aspects of mechanical engineering and helped him learn how to create a competitive edge, a valuable skill when he joins the work force. Each year in January, a 45-day build season begins. During that period the robotics teams throughout the country build a robot that fits the requirements for that year's competition. Since his sophomore year Ryan has been the captain of Team 1228 and served as the lead builder. Ryan was also responsible for some of the behind-the-scenes work required when applying for grants, for setting up the team registration and for the delivery of the robot to the competitions.

For the last four years, Ryan has faced a time challenge because he has also pitched for the Rahway High School Junior Varsity and Varsity baseball teams. Baseball spring training typically starts at the same time that the first Robotics tournament takes place. He is grateful to the baseball coach and the robotics instructors for having worked with him during scheduling

conflicts. On many occasions Ryan would go to baseball practice at 8 a.m. on a Saturday and then directly to the robotics shop in his practice outfit, working on the robot until the custodial staff would ask the team to leave so that they might close the building at the end of the day.

Ryan found that his background in FIRST was definitely a plus in college admissions since colleges look for well-rounded students. In support of the US FIRST mission, many colleges offer FIRST Scholarships. The Stevens scholarship is merit-based and awarded to a high school senior who has participated on a FIRST team during his or her junior and/or senior years and plans to study engineering, science, or math at Stevens. The scholarship is renewable up to a total of \$24,000 over four years, contingent upon maintenance of good academic standing. Ryan was also awarded the Edwin A. Stevens Scholarship for \$36,000 payable over four years. This scholarship is given to students who have a demonstrated record of excellence in high school as evidenced by GPA, class rank, SAT scores, and recommendations.



RAHWAY HIGH SCHOOL'S YOUNG WOMEN LEADERS PRESENT CHECK FOR \$1,000

to Rahway's Healing and Helping Women

On Friday, June 14, 2013, Rahway High School's Young Women Leaders (YWL), sponsored by teacher, Annette Goodman and vice-principal, Chey Rivera held a breakfast at the school for representatives of Healing and Helping Women, a local non-profit organization and presented them with a check for \$1,000 raised during the annual fashion show, "A Day in Paris," held in May. Healing and Helping Women, located on 1441 Irving St in Rahway, works to support women, children, and families, including those in shelters. The head of this organization, Deborah Daids, explained the work of the organization in meeting needs in the area. She spoke of the desperate plight of families they are currently helping who are being displaced because they live in apartments in Plainfield that are being torn down. She talked about additional areas YWL could serve next year by collecting diapers, children's pajamas, and toiletries. Also, she invited the

RAHWAY REMEMBERS: TWO-WAY TRAFFIC RETURNED FIVE YEARS AGO!

It's hard to believe, but it's been five years since Main and Irving, the two major streets in the downtown district were opened to two—way traffic. A one—way loop since 1941, the new traffic pattern was introduced on Tuesday, July 1, 2008 to improve circulation, to reduce the speed of motorists, and to be more conducive to retail.

Ironically, sixty-seven years ago, the two streets became one-way for the very same reasons. In the 1930's with the increase in the number of automobiles, downtown merchants were becoming concerned with traffic congestion, speeding, and a lack of sufficient parking. The elected officials were aware that these problems were acute and wanted to work out a solution for the benefit of all concerned. Merchants and residents on both streets were consulted, a Friday-Saturday one-way experiment was conducted over two weekends, and angle parking was instituted. Although there was some opposition, the experiment satisfied most, and an ordinance was passed on April 23, 1941 making the one-way traffic pattern and angle parking permanent.

Not much attention was given to the new traffic regulations during the war years, but in May of 1945, Irving Street merchants began a campaign to abolish the four year old ordinance and change Main and Irving back to two-way thoroughfares. A spokesman for the group said, "No city of any importance has one-way traffic on its two main streets." It is likely their proposal would have been accepted if not for the fact that the Main Street merchants were very happy with the one-way flow and wanted to keep it that way. The controversy continued into the fall when both factions presented petitions to the City Council at their October meeting. It was a lively session with the merchants debating all aspects of the situation including one-way or two-way traffic flow, angle parking or parallel, the installation of parking meters, the construction and location of parking lots, and

The Mayor at the time was Edward J. Carlin, who put the matter in the hands of the Police Committee. This branch of the Police Department, which no longer exists, was given the assignment to review all the arguments and develop a solution. After six months of study, ready were to present recommendations. The committee's plan included making Irving Street two-way while keeping Main one-way, replacing angle parking with parallel parking and installing parking meters. They were so certain their plan would be approved that they repainted the parking lines on the west side of Main and the east side of Irving changing them for parallel parking. The Main Street merchants were incensed. They had not been warned of the change and no ordinance had been passed to authorize such work to be done. The store owners complained that parallel parking would reduce spaces by 37%.

With the Main Street merchants up in arms, the July meeting was another boisterous one. Mayor Carlin sided with the Police Committee and wanted council to implement their suggestions. Some members of the governing body, however, were influenced by the strong Main Street lobby and a few of the councilmen were upset by the committee's premature painting job. Council was still striving for a plan to satisfy all merchants and the meeting ended without a motion for any action.

Something still might have come from all of this had it not been for the results of the Mayoral election in November, 1946. Mayor Carlin was defeated by Dennis Donovan and the discussion of changing traffic patterns on Main and Irving lost impetus and eventually died out.

In the ensuing years, meters were installed in 1947, three public parking lots were constructed and all on street parking became parallel by 1960. But it took almost seven decades to change Main and Irving back to two-way streets



THE MADISON SCHOOL COMMUNITY GARDEN

Wednesday, June 19, 2013, was the day set aside to celebrate the culmination of garden activities for the 2012-2013 school year, and what a day it was! The students in Mrs. Lewis' kindergarten, Mrs. Reeves' fourth grade and Miss Lund's first grade came together in a "round robin affair" to sample harvested garden vegetables, place their handprints upon our garden wall, channel their energies in yoga, and listen and respond to a garden story. Each center was approximately one half hour long where each student had the opportunity to immerse himself in teacher directed activities related to the garden. How absolutely heartwarming it was to observe friendships continue to flourish just as the garden has flourished throughout this school year! What a delicious and fun way to celebrate the first year success of Madison School's Community Garden!





ORGANIC GARDEN TEA

Many gardeners know the advantages of adding compost to the soil when planting. We mix the ingredients, heat up, turn and tend the pile until we are rewarded with the beautiful rich compost, 'garden gold'.

At this time of year we can still take advantage of this valuable amendment by making a bucket of 'compost tea'. This is as simple as soaking a handful of compost in water for a few days and then using it. Teas are organic so they are healthy for the plants, the soil, and most importantly you.

Dried cow manure can also be used to make 'manure tea'. Before commercial fertilizers, it was common for gardeners to use this on tomatoes. When I make this, I put a handful of the dried cow manure in an old sock - knotted at the end. When the tea is done, I toss the sock away and it is ready to use. Feed this into the soil and avoid putting it on the leaves to prevent burning. When applying any fertilizer, soak the ground first. This will permit the fertilizer to easily move into the soil and the root systems of the plants.

To prevent a breeding ground for mosquitoes brew these teas only a few days and avoid letting them stand for very long.

Liquid Seaweed is another organic which will keep your plants strong and healthy. This is sold

commercially as a liquid which is then diluted in your water bucket. You can also put this in a spray bottle to feed the leaves.

USE AND STORAGE OF GARDEN CHEMICALS

Store all chemicals properly. Always follow the directions on the label. Don't let liquids freeze or get too hot and don't allow dried chemicals to get moist. If you go to a store and their chemicals are sitting in the sun or are not properly stored, go to another store.

Always wear gloves when mixing any chemical and cover your nose and eyes, especially when spraying. Even though your mix may be 100% organic don't breathe it in. "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure".

YMCA SPLASH TEACHES KIDS HOW TO BE SAFER AROUND WATER

200 Roselle kids enjoyed Splash Week with the YMCA!

More than 200 kids were taught how to be safer in and around water by taking part in YMCA Splash Week June 3, 2013 through June 8, 2013. 

- Plan to bring in all outdoor furniture, decorations, garbage cans and anything else that is not tied down.






