On Saturday May 4th, the Rahway Chamber of Commerce will host the 2nd annual Rahway Day. The celebration will take place from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., rain or shine, at the Rahway Public Library, 2 City Hall Plaza.

A scavenger "Race Around Rahway" organized by the Friends of the Library, will also take place starting at the Public Library and continuing around the downtown area. The event, similar to television's "Amazing Race," pits teams of contestants against each other in a search for items hidden around the downtown area. Each team must solve the nine clues, gather needed items from various locations, and return to the starting point before any of the others.

"The purpose of Rahway Day is to showcase our spectacular Public Library and all that this community has to offer to residents and businesses while at the same time welcoming new comers to our town," said Bob Markey, President of the Rahway Chamber of Commerce. Message from the President THE TALKING #48 BUS... URBAN NOISE POLLUTION HITS A NEW HIGH!

I live in our downtown on the corner of West Main and Elizabeth Avenue. About 5:30AM each morning the NJTransit #48 bus passes by on its way north from Carteret to Elizabeth. I know its schedule well because the bus generally wakes me up. I don't get out of bed: I reach over and turn up the volume on my Brookstone white noise machine and try my best to get back to sleep for another hour or so. You see, bus engines are really noisy and they are smelly too. I don't smell their exhaust in the cold weather cause' my balcony door is closed. In warmer weather I get a double whammy, as my balcony door is generally open and the noise from that diesel engine becomes even noisier: its engine fumes make me catch my breath.

So you might think "hey Markey ... what's the row, you wanta live in downtown, you gotta expect that". I may have to agree to an extent with that thought, however having said that, there really must be limits cause my story ain't over yet. Get this, there's a new element to the racket now the #48 bus also talks out loud announcing by a pre-recorded blurb to passengers and to the people on the street that "the bus is turning" and just in case you didn't get its message in English, it repeats the same in Spanish too not just at my corner but the blurb repeats at every corner that the bus turns throughout its route!

I haven't yet seen the 2007 film "Noise" starring Tim Robbins portraying Henry Bean, the real life batterer of NYC car alarms on whose life the movie was based. Bean could not stand the sound of car alarms blaring for up to four hours in his Manhattan neighborhood, and when car owners didn't address their blaring alarms soon enough, Bean took matters into his own hands. I can certainly sympathize with his frustrations.

Urban Noise pollution has become in NYC the number one complaint. According to the World Health Organization, in Europe traffic noise alone is harming the health of almost one in three people. Noise pollution is more than an annoyance, it's become a critical health problem effecting all ages from our children to our seniors.

I'm not moving back to the farm country to escape this problem so I best do battle here in our old urban core. I'll fight the talking buses as well as the loud motorcycles, the airplane noise, the indiscriminate honking of horns and the rest of the noisemakers: not with sticks and stones but through our political system, as best I can. Hey, your help is needed so let's get together and all make some NOISE too!



BIRD BATHS

You can easily attract many birds during the spring and summer months by supplying a source of clean water. Garden centers offer a wide assortment of baths from the traditional pedestal bird baths to those with newer 'water features'.

A bird bath doesn't have to be big or expensive. Even a simple plant saucer filled with clean water will be used by many birds. There are a few things you can do to make your bird bath more user friendly. Since birds come in many different sizes, a stone placed in the bath creates levels for the birds to enter the water. This will make it more attractive to many birds from smaller wrens and sparrows to the larger colorful blue jays and cardinals.

Many migrating birds are attracted to the sound of moving water. These water features have the added advantage of a relaxing sound which is enjoyed as much by people as it is by animals. I'm going to be honest; they are harder to clean, but the extra effort is well worth the rewards. Most garden centers and stores place these baths on sale in the autumn, a good time to buy one.

Protection from cats and hawks is a major concern. Keep your bath about ten feet from shrubs or a fence that can be used for a quick escape. This will give birds time to hide but

prevent cats from using the bushes to hide and wait. Cats are born hunters.

It is important to keep your bird bath clean and filled with fresh water. This will prevent it from becoming a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Once a week I empty mine out and scrub it with baking soda and steel wool. I keep those items together in zip-loc bags so they are always handy.

When selecting your bird bath, get one which you know you can easily tend. Otherwise the bird bath will become an annoying chore rather than the enjoyable experience it should be.







THE REGINA MUSIC BOX COMPANY

Rahway Remembers by Al Shipley

A new American industry whose products found their way into countless thousands of homes, cafes, hotels, and beer gardens was born in September of 1892 when Gustave Brachhausen left his native land of Germany at the age of thirty-five and arrived in New York. Within the year he established the Regina Music Box Company of Jersey City, New Jersey.

It was Brachhausen's plan to exhibit his music boxes, get a few orders, and then begin production. His venture spread more rapidly than anticipated, however, and the newlyformed company was soon in need of more space. The young businessman found exactly what he was looking for in the city of Rahway. Located across from the rail lines, a twenty-five thousand square foot building at 54 West Cherry Street was vacant and Brachhausen quickly

bought it. The massive three story building became available when the former owner, the successful Mershon Printing Company, moved to larger quarters on Elizabeth Avenue. Brachhausen would also purchase a second building to house his cabinetry shop. 1897 explains how a music box could make a home more cheerful, especially during the long, dreary evenings of winter. "Dullness is unknown in the households that own a Regina, the queen of all music boxes. It is like having a skilled musician always at ones command.

The new facility would be manned by over three hundred workers, many of them skilled craftsmen who came from Europe by way of Brachausen's invitation. In the years between 1892 and 1915 Regina would manufacture more than one hundred thousand boxes. The company handcrafted several dozen models ranging in price from \$10.00 for the very basic model to \$350.00 for the deluxe player.

In a time before radio and television, the music box was an early version of a home entertainment center. An advertisement from



1897 explains how a music box could make a home more cheerful, especially during the long, dreary evenings of winter. "Dullness is unknown in the households that own a Regina, the queen of all music boxes. It is like having a skilled musician always at ones command. Plays 1000 tunes and plays them well. Furnishes music for impromptu dances – amuses the children – soothes the invalid – and is a never-failing source of pleasure to everyone. Runs from 20 to 30 minutes with one winding, is strongly made and does not get out of order. The quality of tone has never before been equaled in a music box."

In 1897 Brachhausen invented and patented an automatic record changer and went into the field of commercial boxes. This automatic disc changer music box was the forerunner of the modern juke box. Company personnel were responsible for the installation and service of the coin–operated machines, the collection of coins, and the periodic changing of the discs.

Unfortunately for Brachhausen the music box business would only last as long as progress would let it. By the early 1900's Thomas Edison was working on a cylinder type phonograph. Although the sound was scratchy and lacked clarity, people were intrigued by the new invention which could bring an entire orchestra and/or a vocalist into their homes. Ironically, Brachhausen had an opportunity to get in on the ground floor of this new medium. When the technology was just starting to change, a visitor came to the Rahway plant and demonstrated his new invention-a machine that played wax discs rather than metal ones. Brachhausen thought the sound was horrible and sent the man away. The stranger would travel to Camden, New Jersey and find a less critical partner and become one of the founders of the Victor Talking Machine Company (later to be known as RCA Victor).

The new technology all but put the music box industry out of business forcing Brachhausen to sell his interest in Regina in 1915. The Regina building was bought by Lannon Mead, a businessman from the west coast who kept the Regina name but retooled the plant to manufacture vacuum cleaners and floor polishers.

In the late 1950's the Regina Corporation left the Cherry Street building and moved into a newly constructed twelve acre complex in another part of Rahway. After being vacated by Regina the old building housed a number of businesses for the next thirty years until it was converted into the Heritage Square Condominiums.

Today, due to the handsome renovation work done to preserve the original exterior, the large building at 54 Cherry Street serves as a reminder of one of Rahway's past industries – The Regina Music Box Company.




