

Message from the President

HOW READY ARE WE FOR THE NEXT POWER FAILURE?

How'd we'd do if it lasted 2 weeks in January?

As I write this month's message, it's been nearly two weeks since that freak Northeast snowstorm of Saturday, October 29th and there are still

thousands of homes without electric power in New England. Fortunately for most, autumn temperatures have been mostly above freezing which protected us all from even greater stresses and hardships and perhaps even catastrophe.

This has been a year of record breaking firsts for Rahway. Off the charts: heat; rain; snow; an earthquake and a devastating flood. My sense is that we best fasten our weather seatbelts as these extremes may become closer to the norm.

For a number of years now I've been trying to consider the consequences of a natural or manmade disaster if it came during a January deep freeze and knocked out our region's electric grid for an extended period of time. Your heat won't work, the gas station can't pump gasoline, running water stops as the emergency backup generators at United Water run out of fuel, our hospital struggles to provide even basic medical services and on and on.....Oh My Gosh!

I believe that our best strategy to deal with the possibility of some major debacle is to plan and prepare and try to become much more self sufficient. As for me, during the year I stock up my larder at home buying non-perishables like soups when they're on sale in October and then the following October I'll buy them again and gift last year's extras at Christmas to Food for Friends. I'm buying a generator and will store some fuel so that I can keep some basics like my furnace and refrigerator operating a few hours a day. I'm buying extra batteries and candles and lamps and of course potable water....and the list goes on.

Living life in our densely populated area is so dependent on the things that we take for granted; the things that come so easily and operate at the touch of a button, the turn of a key or the flick of a switch. Folks living out in the country are much more accustomed to roughing it and doing without and they're much more prepared than us city folks. Let this last "freak snowstorm" remind each of us that all life is fragile; that we are all part of a larger family and in this world together and that we need as individuals to rely upon our own wits and actions and remember that government can only help us if we first help ourselves.

CHILDREN'S GHOST STORY NIGHT AT TAVERN

The Merchants and Drovers Tayern Museum Association (MDTMA) will once again host their very popular Children's Ghost Story Night at the Tavern on Saturday, November 19th with three tours, the first beginning at 6 p.m. All children from ages 6 through 14 are invited to step back in time to the early 1800's to hear true tales of ghostly happenings in an era of candlelit taverns and stagecoach inns. Parents are also welcome to join this eerie, but fun and exciting family event at the 215 year old Rahway landmark. Visitors will be guided by "ghosts" of innkeepers and travelers past through the period rooms to hear about local, mysterious legends, and perhaps witness supernatural events that cannot be explained.

Anne Hoener, MDTMA trustee and event chairperson stated that "Before the advent of TV and the telephone stagecoach inns and taverns were the communication hub of each town, and very often the location of local legends and mystery. Hosting this event in a real 18th century inn and telling the ghostly tales of real travelers of long ago allows our organization to present historical programs that are both educational and entertaining for all ages."

Tours for the November 19th event will be

held every hour beginning at 6, 7 and the last beginning at 8 p.m., and reservations are required. They can easily be made by calling Alex Shipley, at: 732-381-0441. Refreshments will be available to all the hungry "ghosthunters". The fee is \$5 for children (ages 6 through 14), and \$7 for accompanying adults. Interested participants are encouraged to call early due to the increasing popularity of this twice-annual event.

The Merchants and Drovers Tavern Museum Association is dedicated to preserving the Merchants and Drovers Tavern (c. 1795), the Terrill Tavern (c. 1735), developing the site as a tavern inn museum and to interpreting the important role played by taverns and inns in early American history; to provide a regional education, cultural and historic resource; and to preserve local history. The museum building, located at St. Georges Avenue (Rt. 27) and Westfield Avenue, is recorded in the Historic American Buildings Survey and listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

FORMER RAHWAY HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT **RETURNS TO TEACH HER TEACHERS**



FRESHMAN TRANSITION INITIATIVE HIGHLIGHTED IN RESEARCHER VISIT AND TOWN MEETING

Washington University addressed the faculty of Rahway High School regarding her research on how Freshman Transition programs build academic persistence among students. Rahway High School has implemented such a program this September. The goal of such program is to increase academic success among incoming freshmen throughout high school and during post-secondary education by helping them to develop a vision for success. Professor Dedmond also spent time directly with the school's Freshman Transition teachers.

Rebecca Dedmond is Assistant Professor and Director of the Master of Arts in School Counseling Program at The George Washington University where she has also written and validated the Freshman Transition Standards and established the Freshman Transition Initiative. Previously, she has sponsored school and career initiatives both in the United States and abroad, serving as consultant to The World Bank and The British Council and Career Counseling Supervisor for the Commonwealth of Virginia. She also worked with the United States Army Recruiting Command, where she wrote and implemented a successful marketing campaign, "Planning for Life."

On Wednesday evening, November 2, at the Rahway Public Library, the community had an opportunity to learn more about the Freshman Transition program during Rahway Board of Education's Town Meeting. Rahway High School Principal John Farinella and teachers Maria Hennessy, Dawe Peralta, and Linda

On October 26, Rebecca Dedmond of George Weissbrod shared information and videos and answered questions about the new initiative. This is a school-wide initiative, with all freshmen students, guidance counselors, peer leadership team and eleven teachers involved during the initial year. As freshmen, students gain financial literacy enabling them to create online ten year life plans, which are then updated annually in higher level courses and available for advisory purposes to the entire faculty and guidance staff throughout their high school years.



Each year, Rahway High School teachers in all disciplines celebrate the National Day on Writing by having their classes engage in creative writing assignments. This year, Mrs. Jessica DeRose's Biology students used their understanding of the characteristics of living beings to write essays as prosecutor or defense of a Martian who had come to earth and returned to his planet, stating that automobiles were living things. In Mr. Jeffrey Romano's English I class, after studying Edgar Allen Poe's "The Fall of the House of Usher," students used what they had learned to write a scary story. Spanish II students of Mrs. Carmen Sierra created Facebook profiles for themselves, including writing their own personal bio in Spanish. Her other students wrote letters in Spanish to penpals from other classes. Also, Mrs. Patricia Peloso's American History students discussed Randy Pausch's speech, "The Last Lecture," and wrote about their own attitudes and dreams. Mr. David Brighouse's history students challenged themselves to follow Hemingway's example of creating a short, short story, using only 6 words, shades of Twitter or texting. Food critics were the order of the day in Mrs. Patricia Williams' math classes. Ms. Christine McNicholas' students drew a random household object out of a container and had to persuade classmates why this item should exist. Students later read their essays for the class and were videotaped. Drama students of Mrs. Alison Dooley created scripts of events occurring before and after a given

scenario, while dance students wrote detailed letters to administrators explaining their gratitude for the dance program. Mr. Radler's history students dealt with a situation after a nuclear war, where certain hypothetical persons were in a shelter with limited resources and too many people. Students had a timed writing assignment about the process of determining who would be allowed to stay and why.

Many English classes composed creative pieces that may become part of the Ex Animo, the Rahway District literary journal, published each spring Last year's journal may be viewed on the school website at rahway.net. The National Day on Writing celebration is always an exciting opportunity for faculty and student creativity and is organized by School Coordinator Kim Kiefer.

WAITING ROOM GETS GREAT REVIEW FROM "MUNCH MOBILE"

The Wenson family's original Waiting Room opened back in 1979 at the corner of Irving and Lewis Street. "It was then more of a Rock & Roll bar with live music many nights each week. Over the years we added food and then an outside deck and that's when we really started to click" remarked owner Chris Wenson.

"We definitely went through a tough time for awhile as we had to move and find a new location due to the construction of the parking deck and the adjoining high rise building. We got wind that the old McCrory 5 & Dime building on East Cherry was available. The building is historic with its high ceilings, wood floors and tin ceilings with skylight. After a tough negotiation we bought it and re-opened in 2005 and it's been a growing success ever since. I'm really glad that I didn't have to leave Rahway and that we found this Cherry Street location" added Chris Wenson.

The ambiance, the friendliness, the good drinks and the great mix of people are in part what seems to make this business a success. However, in some mind's eye it's the food that demands the most respect. The kitchen serves till midnight and later on weekends. Chris learned how to cook by trial and error back at the old location. In 1997 Damian Ortiz came on as a short order cook and over time honed his craft and today Damian is head Chef. "When I was 17 years old I left my home in Oaxaca, Mexico and came to this country to find work. I

met my wife Galbas, a Rahway girl, and we started our family. Rahway is our home town" remarked Damian. Rahway residents for fifteen years now, Damian and his wife are bringing up their three sons in their home on Union Street.

Neither Chris or Damian have formal culinary training but boy do they have talent. "I guess I have a knack and I understand good food. Damian is the hard worker as I come up with an idea for a new dish and provide a catchy name and then Damian does all the hard work creating something that tastes great and then tweaking the recipe till we've got it right. We offer the new dish as a special, ask for comments and if we had gotten it right it goes on the permanent menu. My part is the inspiration which is about 1% and then Damian's part is 99% perspiration" added Wenson. Damian doesn't seem to mind and when asked what's the hardest part of his job he just smiles and says he likes it all. Damian generally works 55 hours each week and about 35 of those hours are behind the grill.

Muchmobiles Peter Genovese of The Star-Ledger reviewed the Waiting Room in September and reported "The former McCrory's looks like a sports bar; the menu is anything but. One must: the garlic pork chops, seasoned and cooked to near-perfection. Baby lamb chops are a grown-up's delight. Also liked the voodoo chili, bubbling over with meat and cheese". The Waiting Room is expanding to add outside dining with a deck and about 15 tables.



A FOUNDING FATHER IN MORE WAYS THAN ONE

Most people thinking Benjamin Franklin today might associate him with flying a kite during a storm, serving as a key leader during American the Revolution, or as simply the face on a

hundred dollar bill. But anyone interested in our library will surely want to remember him for another reason as well.

Like many of the renaissance men of that time, who spoke multiple languages and had incredibly wide-ranging interests, Ben Franklin possessed a keen intellectual curiosity. But Franklin also had the desire and foresight to foster learning in others, and was instrumental in founding one of the first public lending libraries in this country, in Philadelphia, in 1731.

At that time, most Americans had limited access to books, which were rare and very expensive. Franklin and other members of a philosophical association known as the Junto recognized that by combining their purchasing power, a range of books could be made more readily available to members. So 50 subscribers invested 40 shillings each to start up a library, and pledged 10 more each year to provide upkeep and purchase additional books. Founding members of the library included delegates to the Continental Congresses and future signers of the Declaration of Independence.

By 1741, the library, known as The Library Company, held books in history, geography, poetry, exploration, and science and theology. Unlike university libraries of the time, the majority of this collection was in English rather than Latin. The library was open Saturday afternoons from 4-8, and even non-members could borrow books if they pledged something of value.

Today, here in Rahway, a similarly civicminded group exists to bolster our public library. And though none of our members has any historical claim to fame as far as I know, no eminence is needed, no revolution required to become a member. The Friends of the Rahway Public Library exist to raise funds for and support programs of the library. We meet monthly, and put on several larger fundraising events during the course of the year. Please stop by the library's reference desk to learn more about joining.

LEAF COLLECTION BEGINS NOVEMBER 9

Leaf collection will begin on November 9. Residents are reminded to pile leaves in the curb or to place them in biodegradable paper bags available at most hardware stores for pickup. Leaves placed in plastic bags will not be collected. TOP 5 USES FOR FALL LEAVES

Oh, leaves. There's so much we love about you. The first sight of your flowers in the spring; the sound you make when you blow in the breeze during summer; your brilliant shades of red, yellow, and orange come fall. And then you drop to the ground and become another thing on our to-do list.

LEAVE THEM BE

Why: Leaves act as a home for many different types of beneficial insects (ground and rove beetles, spiders, caterpillars), as well as amphibians such as wood frogs. A layer of leaves also serves as a root protection for trees and shrubs by keeping in moisture and moderating the temperature of the soil. And if

that's not reason enough, you will also attract more birds, which rely on leaves for shelter, nesting material, and water.

How: Leave behind a thin layer of leaves in areas that people don't walk on (you wouldn't want anyone slipping). If you're worried about your grass being smothered, chop the leaves with a lawn mower.

Good to know: Researchers from Michigan State University have found that chopped leaves left on lawns may actually help suppress dandelions.

MAKE MULCH

Why: A less expensive and taxing option to raking, bagging, and disposing, leaf mulch mimics a natural forest ecosystem, making for excellent nutrient recycling.

How: When the leaves begin to fall, mow your lawn as you normally would. This will shred the leaves, making them decompose faster and a bit easier to pack around the bases of plants. In vegetable and perennial gardens, you can keep the leaves whole, and then turn them over come spring.

Good to know: Songbirds love leaf mulch since it harbors lots of nutritious bugs!

COMPOST THEM

Why: Any gardener can extol the merits of compost. Good compost requires a mix of high nitrogen (grass clippings, food waste) and high carbon components. The best bet for the latter? Fallen leaves.

How: Scoop them up whole and add them to your compost pile. Not only do they add bulk but leaves make for good aeration. Don't have a compost pile yet? Leaves are a great way to get started. To speed up the decomposing process, you can shred them a little.

Good to know: Leaves that have been left on the ground for awhile bring useful decomposing microorganisms to the compost pile.

HAVE FUN WITH THEM

Why: There's nothing more thrilling that jumping into a big pile of leaves (and that goes for both kids and adults). Be aware of ticks.

How: In addition to a good old-fashioned leaf pile, you can make a scarecrow, add leaves to vases or window boxes, preserve brightly colored fallen leaves, or make leaf rubbings.

Good to know: It's good luck to catch a falling leaf before it touches the ground. Slap the lucky leaf against your forehead, turn around in three complete circles, and then make a wish!

LEARN MORE ABOUT THEM

Why: Think a leaf is simply just a leaf? Think again. There are compound and simple leaves, broad leaves and needle leaves, leafstalks, leaf teeth, and leaf veins. By learning more about the leaves you see every day, you will gain more appreciation for the natural world around you.

How: Pick up one of the countless books written on the subject. A few favorites, include: The Sibley Guide to Trees, Fall Color Finder, Why Do Leaves Change Color?, and The Tree Book for Kids and Their Grown Ups.

Good to know: While we now know science is behind leaves changing color, countless legends have been linked to this fall phenomenon, including Native American lore that said when hunters killed the Great Bear in the sky, the bear's blood fell on the forests, turning some of the leaves red.
