Daphne Lee, a Rahway High School Class of 2009, was recently appointed to the Alvin Ailey Dance II Company located in New York. As a member of the Alvin Ailey II Company, Daphne will be traveling across the world. Ailey II is universally renowned for merging the spirit and energy of the country's best young dance talent with the passion and creative vision of today's most outstanding emerging choreographers. Alvin Ailey personally appointed former Ailey member, Sylvia Waters, as Artistic Director in 1974. Under her direction, Ailey II has flourished into one of the most popular dance companies in the country, combining a rigorous touring schedule with extensive community outreach programs.

Daphne was also a scholarship student at The Ailey School and a regional gold medal winner in dance for the NAACP ACT-SO competition. She has won summer intensive places to Alvin Ailey and Dance Theatre of Harlem both in New York. Originally from Rahway, NJ, Daphne Lee, 21, began her dance training at the Rahway Dance Theatre under the direction of Ms. Jay Skeete-Lee. A student in the Rahway schools from Madison Elementary through Rahway High School, Daphne has completed her academic courses at Fordham University a year early and will graduate with her class 2013.

They Helped Send Lindbergh to the Skies and Al Capone to the Slammer But without your volunteer and financial support we are at risk

My buddies and I were having breakfast last Tuesday at Big Al's on Elizabeth Avenue. It was awkward to drive to Big Al's. Construction barricades that had been put in place before Labor Day at Elizabeth Avenue and West Scott were still up and still detouring northbound traffic.

Big Al's owners, Rahway residents Al and his wife Ching, had been suffering a loss of business for weeks since the construction had begun and were trying to tough it out. Toughing it out in a tough economy ain't easy and the strain showed deeply in the faces of these two hard working people.

I asked Al and Ching how much longer traffic might be diverted. They looked at me with an unknowing look and shook their heads. So I said let me make a call. I called our City Hall and spoke with Director of Community Development Cindy Solomon. I've known Cindy for years and quickly was able to explain how this ongoing hardship had been placed upon Big AI's luncheonette as well as all the other businesses on that section of Elizabeth Avenue. Cindy Solomon told me that she would find out the status of things and get back to me.

About an hour later Cindy called me and said that somehow this situation had gone under



the radar and she was so glad that I had called. Seems that the construction project was undertaken by the City of Linden and that proper notification had not been given to Rahway. Cindy Solomon was upset and said that something would be done very soon to help the plight of the local businesses.

Two days later the barricades came down and Elizabeth Avenue traffic was open in both directions.










RAHWAY HIGH CELEBRATES HISPANIC HERITAGE

In honor of Hispanic Heritage Month classes at Rahway High School have been engaged in activities to learn more about Hispanic cultures and the achievements of American citizens with ancestors from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America.

Each year, we in the United States observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from September 15 to October 15. The dates were chosen because September 15 is the independence day for Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua, while Mexico's is September 16 and Chile's is September18. In addition, Columbus Day or Día de la Raza, falls on October 12.

parents in the gym, making them aware of exciting changes taking place this year. Construction under the Referendum Project is proceeding with new science and home economics classes already in use, while music and dance facilities, the auditorium, and more science classrooms will be completed later during this school year.

In addition, Rahway High School was named one of the "Top 10 Most Improved High Schools" by New Jersey Monthly, moving the school to a rank in the middle of New Jersey public high schools. Also, tenth grade students this year will be the first to have the opportunity to join selective "Academies" for Science and Technology, Teaching, or the Arts.

Finally, Rahway has added two more Advanced Placement (AP) courses in French and Spanish. PTO President Sam Weakland also greeted parents and encouraged their participation in the PTO.

After the introductory remarks, parents followed their child's daily schedule, moving from class to class with the help of uniformed Marine Corps Junior R.O.T.C. cadets stationed throughout the building to guide lost parents. Teachers presented the curriculum taught in their classes and had an opportunity to get to know parents. During lunch periods, parents were able to meet with Yearbook representatives and enjoy snacks from the PTO and French Club members stationed in the cafeteria. Like students after a busy day at school, parents ended an evening of learning and building new relationships tired and ready to return home.

USING LEAVES IN YOUR GARDEN

At this time of year we are very fortunate to live in an area with spectacular leaf color. We don't have to go far to enjoy it, often looking right out of your own window. A walk at the lake, park or a short drive west towards the mountains will offer views that millions of people travel many miles to enjoy.

As the leaves begin to fall they offer one of the best amendments any gardener can give to his vegetable garden, brown leaf compost. Oak leaves are the very best for this use because they break down the fastest.

There are several ways leaves can easily be used in your own garden. One of the simplest is to chop leaves with a lawn mower and dig them in to the top six inches of your vegetable beds. Over the winter they will continue to break down and by spring planting will add nutrients and texture to you soil.

Whenever I plant I add a few handfuls of

chopped leaves to the soil. As leaves break down they help keep our clay soil loose and are slowly utilized by the plants. This is great when planting daffodils and bulbs we hope to have bloom for many years to come. Both daylilies and roses love soil rich in leaf compost.

There are many more ways leaves can be used to enhance your garden and save money at the same time. Put leaves in plastic bags in a corner of your yard. Some folks put a few holes in the bags to enhance quicker decay. Slugs dislike the acid in oak leaves which make them an excellent mulch for hosta. I also like to sprinkle fine leaves into delicate plants like coreopsis which don't grow well though thicker mulches. If you compost during the growing season, adding layers of chopped brown leaves produces a more balanced mixture. My problem isn't finding ways to use leaf compost; it is not having enough until next autumn.

HIGH SCHOOL OPENS, CELEBRATING ACHIEVEMENTS, LOOKING AHEAD

Rahway High School began classes this year celebrating a number of accomplishments and aiming to continue in this trajectory to excellence. The September issue of New Jersey Monthly named Rahway High School as one of the top 10 most improved high schools, with its rank moving up 70 places from 2010 to 2012. Advanced Placement (AP) scores increased 38%, and the number of students attaining grades of 3, 4, or 5 doubled over the past two years. (Grades of 3, 4, and 5 are considered passing scores, indicating college level proficiency.) New Jersey State High School Proficiency Assessment (HSPA) scores increased 5.2% in language arts literacy and 8.6% in mathematics, while scores on the state biology exam went up 7.7%. Administrators, teachers, and students have set their sights for this year still higher.

One way of accomplishing these purposes will be the efforts of staff to implement Excellence by Design, the accreditation process for Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. According to the Middle States organization, Excellence by Design leads schools to establish objectives for improving student performance and organizational capacity based on its vision of a preferred future for its students...In addition, the protocol provides for a continuous review of programs and services and of the results of student performance.

Another major focus last year, the Freshman Transition Initiative, will move to the next stage.

The Freshman Transition Initiative is comprehensive advisory, financial literacy, and career-planning class where each student has an opportunity to develop meaningful academic and career goals and publish online action plans for the next ten years of their life. All members of the current sophomore class were enrolled in this course last year and completed ten year plans. These plans are now available online to all members of the faculty, who can use them as advisory tools when working with their sophomore students. In addition, the current freshman class members will be engaging in the process, refined after one year of experience on the part of faculty. The impact of this course on students has been gratifying. Maria Hennessy, course coordinator who also taught one section last year, had nearly 20 of her 30 past class members seek her out on the first day of school to comment on how much they were looking forward to engaging successfully in school this vear in order to attain their goals.

Another new event, Club Day, took place during the lunch periods. Leaders in all student organizations from the Thespian Society and Speak-up the debate club, to sports teams staffed tables in the gymnasium and presented displays in order to attract new members. This was a special opportunity for incoming freshmen and other new students, but also served to inform upperclassmen about opportunities for cocurricular and athletic endeavors.

this year to the completion of the referendum construction project. Home economics and some new science classrooms and labs have been completed and are in use now, but as the year continues, construction workers will finish more science classes, arts studios and classrooms, and the auditorium. Staff and students have been very flexible in dealing with all the modifications required by ongoing construction, but are excited to see the progress, which will allow for greater achievements in the future. We look ahead to a wonderful year of achievement with expectations of excellence.

A PIECE OF RAHWAY ON EVERY U.S. COIN

In the spring of 1776 Christopher Marsh purchased a gristmill and a sawmill, both located on the south bank of the Rahway River on the east side of St. Georges Avenue (opposite the Union County Park). He bought the two structures from a Mr. Abraham Clark who might have been the Clark of Declaration of Independence fame. Marsh operated the two mills for a year and then sold the property to a relative, Daniel Marsh. Nine years later the new owner would convert these mills into the first state mint in New Jersey.

State coinage was established in 1786 and was one of the first demonstrations of sovereignty exercised after achieving independence. The Constitution later gave this right to the federal government, but in the early years of the nation the states had the privilege of producing legal tender.

On May 23, 1786 Walter Mould, Thomas Goadsby, and Albion Cox approached members of the House of the Tenth General Assembly of New Jersey seeking permission to strike copper coinage for the state. When the proposal was brought to the floor it was met with lively interest, and the House immediately ordered a committee to interview the applicants. The interviews were successful and in less than two months the New Jersev Legislature passed an act on June 1, authorizing Mould, Goadsby, and Cox to strike and coin the sum of ten thousand pounds. The act specified that the coins be made within the state, that they be made of pure copper, and that they weigh six penny-weights and six grains each.

In the fall of 1786, the three men came to

Rahway and began the minting process at Daniel Marsh's mill. The method of production was crude and expensive. Dies were hand-cut in soft steel and had little longevity. Stamping was also done entirely by hand, one coin at a time. The obverse side was struck with a plow and a horse head design and the words Nova Caesarea (NJ). The reverse of the copper depicted a large shield with the inscription "E Pluribus Unum" (Out of many, one). They were the first coins in the country to bear the noble Latin phrase.

Unfortunately, the Rahway mint was a shortlived operation. In the spring of 1787 the partners fell into disagreement and following an altercation among the partners, Mould left Rahway and went to Morristown. When word of the trouble reached the Legislature it authorized Cox and Goadsby to make two-thirds of the coinage by themselves. The other third was contracted to Mould who was already setting up New Jersey's second mint in Morristown.

Cox and Goadsby continued to work the Rahway mint but financial difficulties plagued them. By the late summer of 1787 the mortgage on their equipment was foreclosed and their presses and dies were transported to Elizabethtown where the third New Jersey mint was established.

The story of the Rahway mint, however, does not end there. Albion Cox would eventually make his way to Philadelphia and take employment in the Federal mint when it was established in 1792. It is very possible he was the one to suggest inscribing "E Pluribus Unum" on the new United States coins. These certainly would have been considered appropriate words

to describe the formation of a united nation from thirteen colonies. In any event, the motto which first appeared on the Rahway coppers was adopted and used and is still being struck on all our coins.

Sports Author Dan Gutman Visits Roosevelt School

Just about every kid loves sports, but many are reluctant to open a book. That wasn't a problem at Roosevelt School in Rahway recently, when visiting author Dan Gutman used sports to get the students excited about reading and writing.

"I hated to read when I was a kid," Gutman told the students. "But around the time I was ten years old, I became a big sports fan. I wanted to know everything about sports. Reading baseball cards, magazines, and biographies of my favorite athletes made me into reader. My mother was astonished that I grew up and became a professional writer."

Gutman the author of the My Weird School series, Honus & Me, The Kid Who Ran For President, The Million Dollar Shot, and many others, entertained the students with stories of sports past and present.

First, Gutman took students through the steps of the publishing process- the original idea, research, outlining, writing, re-writing, editing, cover design, and finally the exciting arrival of the finished book. He showed kids his original manuscripts; early cover designs and even read a few of the many rejection letters he received from publishers over the years. "I don't care how many times they turn me down", said Mr. Gutman. "I never give up. And I hope you won't if you get rejected."

Next, Gutman put on an amusing slide show, in which he called "A Day In The Life Of An Author." Then he answered questions from the students and their teachers. During the day he also had lunch with a group of children and


signed many copies of his books.

Mr. Gutman, who grew up in Newark and now lives in Haddonfield, New Jersey, said he was short, skinny, and a "terrible" athlete when he was a boy. So if there's something you really love, maybe you can make it part of your career someday, too." 
RESPECT AT ROOSEVELT!
