PROUD TO BE AN AMERICAN DAY HONORS WAR VETERANS CAPTAINS THOMAS JEROME HROMISIN AND DANIEL DONNERSTAG

Kawameeh Middle School conducted its 5th annual Proud to be an American Day on May 23, 2012. Captain Thomas Jerome Hromisin and Captain Daniel Donnerstag were the honored guests. The event was organized and led by history teacher Mr. Ed Graf. The entire student body, school band, chorus and numerous guests assembled on the school's parking area for the event.

Honored speaker and war veteran Daniel Donnerstag, a former Kawameeh student, told the assembly that Kawameeh is an excellent school and that he had some of the same teachers they had. He was also the Grand Marshal of this year's Union Township Memorial Day parade.

Donnerstag went on to be a Roselle Catholic graduate, became an EMT and served as a volunteer with the Union EMS for seven years until he graduated from college. During all four years of college, he was enrolled as an Officer Cadet in the United States Marine Corps.

Donnerstag went on to serve two tours of duty overseas, in September 2008 in Iraq and then November 2010 in Afghanistan where five months into his tour, he was severely injured when his vehicle struck an Improvised Explosive Device. He spent the next several months in various hospitals where he underwent numerous surgeries and physical therapy for injuries sustained.

Captain Donnerstag told the students it meant a lot to him to be honored at his former school. He quizzed the students on quotes from the Declaration of Independence, including "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." Donnerstag told the students "That's what our country was established on. United States citizens are free to do what we want because of our unalienable rights, that's why I love this country."

KAWAMEEH SCHOOL ROCKIN' TO FULL HOUSES



The Township of Union School District held its first ever Youth Entrepreneurial Challenge in May at the Washington School auditorium. This event provided a showcase for students from the fourth and seventh grades who are in the Gifted and Talented program to present some of the work they've done during this past school year.

These students were responsible for creating their own original businesses including a business plan, a budget, a logo, a slogan and several forms of advertising. During the event students utilized PowerPoint slide shows to display their ideas to a panel of judges in a Shark Tank-like format hoping to "lure" potential investors. These judges included business and

educational leaders from around the community who generously donated their time and expertise to this event.

Of the ten business that were entered into the competition trophies were presented for first, second and third place finishes. The first place winner in the fourth grade division was Hannah Caldwell School with a business entitled Cupcake Couture, a designer gourmet bakery. The first place winners in the seventh grade division was Burnet Middle School with a business called Teen Club SMV. The district is hoping to make this an annual event to showcase some of the great work of the Gifted and Talented program and its students.

KAWAMEEH WINS BATTLE OF THE BOOKS

Kawameeh Middle School's sixth and eighth identify those books and their authors based on grade Battle of the Books teams both placed first in their regional, grade-level Battle of the Books competitions in Chatham on May 17. Chief Readers, Kawameeh's sixth grade team, earned 72 points, defeating teams from Burnet Middle School, Chatham Middle School, Gold Och Academy, H. B. Whitehorne Middle School, and St. Vincent de Paul. Kawameeh's eighth grade team, The Cookie Monsters: the Last Straw, scored 64 points to beat Burnet, Chatham, and H. B. Whitehorne.


Battle of the Books is a competitive reading program for third through eighth grade students throughout New Jersey. Some other states have Battle of the Books programs as well. New Jersey's Battle of the Books programs are generally run by school librarians within their individual schools. Teams are composed of four to six members who must collectively read a list of fifteen books and must distinguish and

details included in the books. The fifteen books for each grade are selected by a committee of librarians from around the state, who also write the competition questions. The lists of books change each year. Some schools compete only within their school or district, and some form competitions with other nearby schools. Union Township's two middle schools, Kawameeh and Burnet have been participating in regional Battle of the Books competitions for more than a decade. Burnet Middle School Librarian, Linda Bykowski, chairs the committee that selects the books and coordinates question writing.

Chief Readers team members include spokesperson Priten Patel, Jeric Brual, Simon Fontanilla, Anthony Geronimo, David Lewchuck, and Tyrique Mahadeo. Members of The Cookie Monsters: the Last Straw are spokesperson Charisse De Los Santos, Olivia Corveleyn, Veronica DelValle, Evelyn Eugene, Hanson-Lee Harjono, and Sofia Zimmerman. Both teams won Kawameeh's Battle of the Books competition in April to represent the school regionally. The Cookie Monsters have been competing in Battle of the Books competitions at Kawameeh and in Chatham since they were in sixth grade. Last year, as seventh graders, The Cookie Monsters defeated an eighth grade team and two teams of Kawameeh staff members in the annual Kawameeh Middle School Student-Staff Battle of the Books. They are looking forward to a chance to repeat their win at this year's Kawameeh Student-Staff Battle on June 8.

Honored speaker and war veteran Captain Thomas Jerome had been chosen by Kawameeh Middle school students as their "sponsored veteran. The students wrote to him throughout the year and raised funds to bring him and his parents to Union for the event. Captain Jerome thanked the students for all the thank you letters and cards they had sent "They meant a lot to me and my parents especially" he stated.

Captain Thomas Jerome sustained a single gunshot wound to the head by an Iraqi sniper while on duty in Iraq on May 29, 2007. He suffered a severe traumatic brain injury and is completely blind. In the following years, he participated in intense rehabilitation and was discharged to live at home with his parents.

Kawameeh Middle School raised over \$4,000

for the Thomas Jerome House TM, a charity founded in May 2009 for wounded servicemen suffering from traumatic brain injuries. Captain Jerome thanked the students and community at large for the donations, time and sacrifices they made on behalf of this charity. Students organized a dinner at Café Z Restaurant in Union as well as bake sales.

He instructed the students to "Continue being proud of who you are and where you come from, appreciate your freedoms every day, lead a free life, continue on your way, continue to be proud to be an American."

The veterans groups fired a 12 gun salute, a wreath was presented to honor them at Union High School and taps was played by students from the band.

Police Sergeant Michael Boll was nominated by the Union Police Department. Boll was appointed t the Union Police Department in July of 1994. During his career as a police officer, Boll served in Patro, the D.A.R.E. and Bicycle Units, and Street Crimes. Michael was promoted to sergeant in April of 2007. Sgt. Boll is a graduate of Union High School and holds a degree in Criminal Justice from Rutgers University. He has received 4 department commendations and 20 PBA Awards.

Michael entered the armed services in 1989 and served in the US Marie Corps. He served in Operation Desert Storm and was honorably discharged in good standing from the Marine Corps in 1992. Boll is a member and former state delegate of PBA Local 369. He is also a member

During his time at the Union Police celebrates Loyalty Day by honoring people who have distinguished Department Michael has helped in organizing several fundraisers to raise themselves by some heroic or especially patriotic act or group of acts. money and awareness towards Autism and Multiple Sclerosis. He also runs the departments Santa-In-Blue Program which is able to provide less fortunate children with toys for Christmas. > Fire Captain William T. Votapek was nominated by the Union Fire Department. Votapek retired on September 1, 2011 after 30 years and 1 month of service to the Township of Union Fire Department. He began his career in the Union Fire Division on August 1, 1981. He was promoted to Lieutenant on August 1, 1988 and to Captain on April 25, 2001. He is a graduate of Union High School and served in the National Guard from December 1969 to December 1975 with an honorable discharge. Bill is followed by his son, Bill Jr.

> Bill is a dedicated and skilled firefighter who performed his duties in a highly professional manner over the years to the benefit of the entire community. He has made many significant contributions to both the Township of Union and the fire fighting profession.

> Fire Captain William Votapeck has been highly decorated for bravery and heroism and received a Valor Award in April, 1992.

> Bill received the Valor Award rescuing an elderly woman that was trapped in an upstairs room in fully involved car on fire in the garage. Bill, along with other fire personnel searched the extreme heat and heavy smoke when they heard screams. After searching most of the house, the only place left was the stairs going down to the garage, but the stairwell was acting like a chimney with superheated gases, smoke, zero visibility and a fire glow from the bottom. Bill and the other fire personnel advanced down the stairwell without the protection of a hose line and located the collapsed and disoriented victim on the bottom landing just outside of the garage which was on fire. She was carried to safety.

> Fire Captain William Votapek has served his community, in which he has been a life-long resident, with pride and dignity and has brought honor t the Fire Division and has been a role model for his fellow firefighters. He has been an asset to the Department but also has impacted on the quality of life of the residents of the Township of Union.
