Each night features a different big attraction besides the regular Bingo game plus several smaller side games like Horse Racing Cards, Box Drawings, and Dabbers. The Bingo hall is popular for other reasons besides the fact that there are several ways to win. The hall offers the use of computers that players can place in front of them that shows all the action on the screen. Players do not have to worry about missing a called number or not being able to see the big board. Players like to come to Union also because it offers games every night of the week. Some take advantage of that and play several nights. There are many regulars that have their special place to sit. 

Sunday, February 24 **Caldwell Parsonage** 909 Caldwell Avenue, Union Open to the public from 2 to 5 pm.

Rebuilt on its original foundation in 1782, the home had been burned by the British in 1780, during the Battle of Connecticut Farms. Now a museum, it had served as the residence of the "Fighting Parson," Rev. James Caldwell, and his wife, Hannah, who was killed during the battle in the presence of two of their nine children.

The Parsonage is listed on both the National and State Registers of Historic Places. Lore Ullrich and Anita Centeno, members of the Union Township Historical Society, will be dressed in authentic colonial attire and will serve as docents.


HISTORY OF THE JERSEY SHORE TO BE PRESENTED AT LIBRARY

RESTORATION PHARMACY DELIVERS GOOD OLD PERSONALIZED SERVICE

When it comes to pharmacies, few of us think of anyone other than Walgreens, CVS, or Rite-Aid and Union certainly has several of those. However, for a different customer service experience, a place to consider is the Restoration Pharmacy at 1385 Stuyvesant Ave.

The owner, Charles Ezeonyim founded the business in 2007, after having worked with large companies like Rite-Aid for twenty years. While pursuing his degree, he realized that he was fascinated with the packaging of drugs and the environment of a pharmacy. Coupled with his penchant for chemistry, he decided that pharmaceuticals was where he needed to be. With twenty years of experience in the industry, and Charles feeling that he wanted something to call his own, Restoration Pharmacy was opened two years after he moved to Union. In choosing our lovely town as the location for his home and business, he comments that while New York might have brought in more money, Union was just as beautiful, but much safer and calmer.

The most difficult part of his job is competing with the bigger chains, who can provide lower prices, and insurance companies offering to send medications directly to the customer's home. In constant competition, Charles says that what sets Restoration Pharmacy apart is the very personal service he and his staff provide; the customers are treated like family. He recounts the example of a woman whose co-payment on her medications sometimes reaches one hundred and fifty dollars each. So he offered to let her pay in increments of twenty dollars a week, until her bill was covered. The pharmacy also offers free blood pressure checks every day.

When asked about his advice for future entrepreneurs, he says the three things that made him successful are working hard, being honest, and trusting God. He plans on remaining a permanent fixture in Union's business community as long as he has the strength.
