FOUR DAYS OF HONOR, VALOR FOR NORTH PLAINFIELD STUDENTS AT GETTYSBURG

A group of six students from North Plainfield High School will participate in the film "Four Days of Honor and Valor at Gettysburg," which will document their reflections on interviewing Medal of Honor recipients from this year's Medal of Honor Convention. On September 18th, the students spent four days in Gettysburg, Pa., with chaperon Tom Mazur, supervisor of fine, practical, and performing arts at North Plainfield High School.

During the Gettysburg trip, the students toured the battlefields and interviewed Medal of Honor recipients. According to the Congressional Medal of Honor Foundation's website, the Medal of Honor first became an official military award in 1863 during the Civil War, when Congress passed legislation establishing the medal.

All six students are cadets in the NJ ROTC program, which stands for Naval Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps. The NJ ROTC program picked the six cadets, from a total of 120 cadets, for their special dedication to the program. "The six are exceptional students, and reflect the diversity of the school," Mazur said. "Their grade levels range from sophomore to senior."

Lt. Col. Eric Hansen, senior naval science instructor for the school's NJ ROTC unit, said the program emphasizes both academics and life skills. One of the most important things for NJ ROTC cadets is that they be successful students. Hansen said, "They are really held accountable for that. They have to have certain GPA averages in order to be promoted in the program, which has a similar rank structure of the U.S. Navy."

The NJ ROTC program teaches students citizenship, patriotism, and leadership. The program offers many opportunities to demonstrate leadership, such as having more experienced cadets teach younger cadets skills. Hansen also said the program teaches the cadets the Navy's core values of honor, courage and commitment. "We hope that by the time they graduate from high school, those core values and principles will become part of their lives."

Nancy Bahnasy, a 15-year-old sophomore cadet seaman, said she was enthused by the fact that she had the opportunity to speak with Medal of Honor recipients and is excited that the "Four Days of Valor and Honor at Gettysburg" film will document her experiences. "We actually spoke to Medal of Honor recipients on what they did to earn the medal and what their motivations were to do

what they did," she said. "It was a great opportunity to speak to them during the trip. I loved hearing their stories of heroism and sacrifice."

Kyle Pacla, a 15-year-old junior and cadet master chief petty officer, said of the trip: "It's a huge honor, because I got to talk to Medal of Honor recipients."

Jared Ruiz, a 17-year old sophomore cadet seaman, said he loves the NJ ROTC program because it teaches him leadership skills he never thought he would learn. Ruiz also said he has learned other skills, such as how to communicate effectively with people, but developing leadership skills was what stood out the most. "Once the film is edited, it will be premiered at this high school," he said. "The Congressional Medal of Honor Foundation would like to eventually have this screened throughout the country."

"I would like those, both inside and outside the North Plainfield community, to see what this school is all about, which is impressive young people who are polite, disciplined, and aware of what good citizenship is all about," Mazur said. "One of the ways I hope to accomplish this is through this film."

Dr. Anthony Mussari & Kathleen Loftus-Mussari, of Mussari-Loftus Associates, will be the film project's producers as part of the Face of America Project.

prevention tactics. The schools had a wide array of age appropriate activities for their students such as singing songs, reading and discussing books, guest speakers and making a pledge to stop bullying.

At East End Elementary, each class created a collage entitled "Everyone Deserves Respect" that was displayed in their Hallway of Respect. The students practiced showing respect thru good manners, wrote thank you cards to someone who always showed them respect and wrote and illustrated something unique about themselves that will be made into a classroom book to be left in the class library.

The parents and guardians of Somerset Six students also participated in the week by receiving an informative newsletter which discussed signs which may point to a bullying problem as well as definitions of different terms associated with bullying (i.e. Cyberbullying, the definition of bullying, the definitions of upstander and bystander).

BUSY SUMMER FOR ROTARY

Service to others is the hallmark of Rotary International, the thousands of Rotary clubs, and 1.2 million Rotarians throughout the world. It is a mantra that every Rotarian bears through the motto "Service Above Self." For the members of the Rotary Club of Plainfield-North Plainfield, part of their service is providing food for those in need

The members of the Rotary club meet weekly to enjoy friendship and to plan service projects and activities. On the first Wednesday of every month, club members bring canned goods, such as soup and vegetables; peanut butter and jelly; pasta; and cereal for donation to the Star Fish Food Pantry in Plainfield. These donations help supplement the pantry's supplies which are always in need.

But during the summer, the club adds another set of activities by growing their own vegetables at the Wagner Farm Arboretum in Warren. Supported by the Interact Club at North Plainfield High School, the Rotarians plant and care for two plots in the Giving Garden at the Arboretum. This garden area is used solely to raise crops for people in need. This past summer, the club produced lettuce, beets, tomatoes, zucchini and eggplant; most of the over 450 pounds of fresh vegetables grown went to the Star Fish Food Pantry.

Volunteers at the Giving Garden also made weekly trips to the Rutgers experimental farm in Pittstown to harvest their vegetables. The Rutgers farm cannot sell what they grow; they simply make it available to non-profits in the area. Using a van and trailer, Ernie Cottrill, the founder of the Giving Garden, and his helpers bring thousands of pounds of vegetables back to the Giving Garden each week.

Throughout the summer, one of the Rotary club's members collects a portion of these vegetables from Rutgers and those grown at the Giving Garden and deliver them to the Star Fish Food Pantry and to the Salvation Army in Plainfield. Boxes of tomatoes and potatoes and apples and corn flow all summer long to the hungry through the efforts of the Rotary club.



Recently, the Rotary club's weekly delivery for Star Fish and the Salvation Army included boxes of apples and corn. A second trip to Pittstown that same week resulted in a van and trailer full of pumpkins. Two representatives of the Rotary club picked up a load of pumpkins and shared them with Star Fish, a nursery school, and a senior citizens apartment building, all in Plainfield.

Rotary in action! One club member asked the other members to support the Star Fish Food Pantry with donations of canned and dry goods. Another member alerted the club to the opportunity to grow fresh vegetables at the Giving Garden that would be used for the needy in the area. The club then pointed the Giving Garden toward supporting the Star Fish Food Pantry with donations of its fresh produce. The Giving Garden then asked the Rotary club to help deliver produce from the Rutgers farm to Star Fish and the Salvation Army. All of the benefits that arise from this project are a result of following the Rotary motto - "Service above Self."
