I am excited to announce that we have been chosen as the recipients of two great programs for Somerset Intermediate School. The first program is called Girl Circle and the other is a Gang Awareness Assembly. Both programs will provide information and support on two important topics here at Somerset School.

Countless hours of communication, research and persistence with Empower Somerset during the summer has officially paid off. After writing a letter in support of the grant and programs, Brenda Esler, from Empower Somerset, happily announced that we would be acquiring a mentoring program for female students called, Girl Circle. Girl Circle is a grant funded program providing mentoring for girl's which targets topics such as body image, socialization skills, and peer pressure. Our male students currently have a mentoring program in place and we now have one for our female students as well.

"WALL OF HOPE"



In October, North Plainfield's cheerleaders spearheaded a charity initiative in which the raised funds for the South Jersey Breast Cancer Coalition (the SJBCC). In addition to raising money for breast cancer awareness, the cheerleaders also erected a "Wall of Hope" outside of the cafeteria. This display included messages of hope and well wishes for the families of North Plainfield that have been touched by this horrendous disease. Our goal is to continue this initiative next year and hopefully expand the project throughout the community!

BLUE STAR MEMORIAL HONORS VETERANS

War II, a small group of New Jersey residents were trying to devise a unique way of honoring America's service men and women. Instead of a stone monument or a bronze plaque, these New Jerseyans wanted to create a living memorial. And so, members of the Garden Club of New Jersey arrived at a plan to plant a five-mile long section of U.S. Route 29 (now Route 22) with flowering dogwood trees, which would produce white blossoms in the springtime and red berries in the autumn. This corridor was chosen because many of the troops returning to the U.S. from Europe would arrive in New York City and then begin their stateside travels home on Route 29. The selected length of highway, between Mountainside and North Plainfield, was designated, "Blue Star Drive" and planting of the dogwoods was begun in the fall of 1944. The name for this section of road was taken from the banner that families would hang in their front windows to show that someone from that house was on active duty during the war.

In just a few years similar Blue Star Memorial Highways began to spring up across the U.S and it was decided they would honor all the men and women who served in the American military, not just those who had fought in the Second World War. It remains a point of pride that the first of these highways runs through North Plainfield and that one of the signs announcing the Blue Star Drive has been located at the intersection of Route 22 and North Drive.

Over the years, the sign and the area around it had been cared for by several groups and

While combat was still raging during World individuals, namely the Watchung Garden Club. Although the site was spruced up and rehabbed by NJDOT in 2004 and a grant for new plantings was awarded by the Garden Club of New Jersey in 2012, money was not available to repair or replace the Blue Star Drive sign until this year. As a result of the renewed attention the memorial began to receive, a plan was drawn up by NJDOT that would radically redesign and improve the site and finally replace the weathered sign. After assistance from the Mayor's Office and North Plainfield DPW, the old sign was removed and work began at the intersection. Dozens of hollies, redbuds and dogwoods have recently been planted and a new sign is nearly ready to be installed. As work nears completion, travelers on Route 22 will be able to see the new memorial take shape. The improved Blue Star memorial will really come alive in spring though, when the new plantings bloom in a profusion of purple and white. It should prove to be quite a site!

This rejuvenated living memorial is a wonderful, fitting way for North Plainfield to honor and show gratitude towards our veterans. While driving on that stretch of Route 22, near North Drive, take a moment to look at the Blue Star Drive site and to reflect on its meaning.

classes have been working very hard to master their multiplication facts. They have played games, such as Multiplication Bingo, Around the World with flashcards, and many others. They have now found that they can practice their facts and help fight world hunger at the same time. The students have been practicing their facts at www.freerice.com! At freerice, the students earn 10 grains of rice for every correct answer they get. The faster they answer the fact the more rice they earn. This has become their new favorite way to practice their facts. Mrs. Castro said, "It is amazing to watch them. The students understand that the rice is helping areas where people do not have enough (or any) food. The students are even competing with each other

The fifth grade students in Mrs. Castro's Math to see who can earn the most rice during the time frame they are working on the website!" To date, the students have earned 136,880 grains of rice. One student in the class researched and discovered that it takes 19,200 grains of rice to feed one person for a day. This is a win/win situation. The children are practicing their multiplication facts and doing a community service project at the same time. They are very proud reporting the number of grains they have earned each time they get to use freerice. Mr. Sainte-Rose, the school principal, is very pleased with the students' efforts in light of the typhoon in the Philippines and with Thanksgiving right around the corner. It is a great way for the students to help others and also help themselves.

EL PODER

Somerset Medical Center and Somerset Intermediate School have worked together in organizing a new program,"El Poder", for the community of North Plainfield which successfully started on October 12, 2013. We prepared flyers and informational booths to promote the program to our community and the program was able to reach full capacity two weeks before the classes started. As the program begins, we hope to continue to carry out that level of enthusiasm for the next ten weeks.

"El Poder" which is translated to "The Strength" is a Diabetes management program that is being held in the community room at Somerset Intermediate School. The first day began with a sign-in, receiving informational folders and sitting with facilitators to fill out any additional health assessment paper work. As part of the initial assessments, health screenings were provided with results on personal medical cards. This assessment will act as a baseline and will provide participants with initial results indicating their cholesterol, blood sugar, and HDL levels. HISPANIC PARENT NIGHT

On November 5th, 2013 Somerset school hosted their 3rd Hispanic Parent Night. The event is geared towards our Spanish speaking parents but open to all to attend. The objective of the event is to strengthen the communication between our Spanish speaking parents and Somerset school through disseminating information about our district, school, and out of district services. It also provides an informal setting for parents, children, and teachers of Somerset School to congregate over traditional homemade foods. Hispanic Parent Night featured four non-profit organizations which provided parents information about resources that are available for them. The four agencies invited were Maria Luisa de Moreno Foundation (MLMIF), The Family Support Organization (FSO), The Women's Health & Counseling Center (WHCC), Resource Center of Somerset, and Healthfirst NJ.

MLMIF offers support through social programs that will give immigrants access to a higher education; so that they could obtain a better quality of life and ultimately become less dependent on governmental aids. The FSO is a partner within New Jersey's Division of Children's System of Care. This system was created to help children with complex emotional, mental health or behavioral issues. The WHCC has been an integral community resource for women and teens since 1973 and works to reduce financial, ethnic, language or other barriers that prevent people from obtaining the services they need. The Resource Center of Somerset provides Help & Hope for people

affected by domestic abuse. All services are provided free-of-charge. Lastly, Healthfirst NJ is a not-for-profit managed care organization dedicated to providing low- or no-cost health insurance to eligible individuals and families in various New Jersey service areas through Medicare Advantage plans and NJ FamilyCare.

The event was a success in fulfilling our goal of creating an environment conducive to community awareness and communication. Parents did convey to the staff how informative and important events like this are for them in the North Plainfield School District. All parties are looking forward to the next event and the potential Hispanic Parent Night has to offer.

EAST END SCHOOL'S WALKING SCHOOL BUS

East End School, along with Ridewise of Somerset County, sponsored a "Walking School Bus" event. A walking school bus event involves walking with students from a designated time and start point to school. The Peterstown Book, Published by Joe & Tina Renna


The Peterstown Book is the 100-year history of an Italian-American neighborhood told through stories about the people and families who lived there. The book records the oral history in danger of being lost and illustrates the traditions and customs of the community through thousands of photos, hundreds of recipes, and anecdotes shared by residents past and present.

The book has mass appeal to anyone interested in American history and how the rich Italian culture was weaved into it by those who arrived since the turn of the 20th century and their descendants. Every aspect of life is represented in its chapters, especially the dynamics of the family, social clubs and of the church. The book shows the contributions that were made to society in the arts and entertainment fields, sports, science, humanities and of course "the food." Over 200 recipes accompanied by background stories fill a hundred-page chapter.

People of all ethnicities can relate to universal themes addressed in the book highlighting the struggles and triumphs of families in search of the American dream, which was achieved through hard work, a strong family value system and dedication to the church.

This book is not only about the greatest

generation but also of those who gave rise to them and the generations that followed. It is a nostalgic look at The Great Depression, WWII and Baby Boomers. It also serves as a guide to future generations who, sadly, will not experience the sense of community that was prevalent in these old-time neighborhoods. The Peterstown Book intends to preserve the great Italian-American culture of the past century.
