We are facing some challenging times with

increased expectations in student performance

on very rigorous assessments. As a result of

higher expectations, we must change our

instruction practices. Last year, the Harding

School Kindergarten through Grade 2 staff

began implementing the Balanced Literacy

approach. Balanced literacy is implemented

during the Literacy instruction period. The

teacher begins by modeling the reading strategy

that is the focus of the lesson. Subsequently,

students are engaged in practicing the focal

strategy in small groups or independently as the

teacher monitors and provides guidance. Then

students read a Guided Reading book

independently for an extended period of time as

the teacher circulates amongst them to observe,

record observations and confer. Guided reading

levels are based upon assessment and then the

teacher works with a small group of students on

that specific reading level. The teacher models

specific strategies before reading and monitors

students while they read independently. While

the teacher is working with the small group of

students, the remaining students engage in

learning center activities in word study, fluency,

word-knowledge, comprehension, and fluency.

The levels range alphabetically from A to Z,

with level A representing the lowest level and

level Z the highest. This allows the teacher to

work closely with students to help them become

KENILWORTH SCHOOLS EMBRACING GUIDED READING

- These guided reading categories are:
 - Genre: The type of the book
 - Text Structure: How the book is organized and presented
 - Content: The subject matter of a book
 - Themes and Ideas: The big ideas that are communicated by the author
 - Language and Literary Features: The types of writing techniques employed by the writer
 - Sentence Complexity: How challenging the syntax is of each sentence
 - Vocabulary: The frequency of new words introduced in the book
 - Words: The ease at which the words in the book can be figured out or decoded by a reader
 - Illustrations: The correlation and consistency of images and pictures in the books to the words printed on the page
 - Book and Print Features: The physical aspects of the printed word on the page.

Even though most children truly learn how to read in school, it does not diminish the importance of reading in the home. Children need positive role models for reading in their home. The most significant factor in determining a child's success in reading is the parents' attitudes about reading. Therefore, it is up to the parents to provide an environment for children in which they are surrounded by books and reading. If children see the importance of reading in their homes through their parents' actions, it will most likely transfer to their own life.

Reading at home aids children in developing important skills and habits that will lead them to success in school and in life. When reading out loud to children, they will be able to develop knowledge about language, context, sentence structure, grammar, syntax, and other components of language. Also, reading to children promotes the value of education and knowledge. The children will learn how

important it is to succeed in school and will have a stronger desire to do so. Reading at home encourages a special bond between the parent and child. Through reading with a child, a parent is able to impart their thoughts and feelings, lessons, and beliefs to their child. The child and the parent are able to develop an emotional bond through reading and sharing their thoughts on stories. This emotional bond gives children precious memories to reflect on and fosters positive thoughts on the stories read to them.

Finally, reading at home allows children to practice what they have been learning in school. Throughout the school day, children may not

receive ample time to practice what they are being taught in class. At home, parents can help provide one-on-one instruction.

In this time children can be free to ask as many questions as they want without infringing on anyone else's time. Reading with a parent allows them to explore what is being taught in class in an in-depth manner in order to maximize the potential of knowledge.

I believe there are four important reasons that reading at home is vitally important to children. Without reading at home, it is difficult for children to develop a love for reading. It is a simple way for a parent to contribute and ensure success for their child in the classroom and beyond.

We can help our children find the tools they need to succeed in life. Having access to information through the printed word is an absolute necessity. Knowledge is power, and books are the pathway to that knowledge. But reading is more than just a practical tool. Through books we can enrich our minds. We can also relax and enjoy some precious leisure moments. With your help, your children can begin a lifelong relationship with the printed word, so they grow into adults who read easily and frequently whether for business, knowledge or pleasure.


