D'AMORE SWORN IN NEW DEPUTY CHIEF

Over the past month, the department said goodbye to a long time member and Deputy Chief, Lane Solon, who recently retired and we swore-in his replacement, Deputy Chief Frank N. D'Amore Jr.

During those 26 years, he has made many positive contributions to the department and has earned many departmental awards, citations and commendations over his career. For the last 11 years, he has served as Deputy Chief overseeing the department's day-to-day operations.

Our new Deputy Chief, Frank N. D'Amore, Jr., was promoted to Captain in 2001 and since then has run our Fire Prevention bureau as the Borough's Fire Official and has been the EMS Supervisor. In 1995, Frank was instrumental in getting our EMS program up and running as one of the department's first EMT's. He was sworn in by Mayor Giordano at the November 12th council meeting amongst friends and family.

At that same council meeting, the fire department held its annual awards ceremony and 26 members of the department were recipients.

Awards included multiple CPR saves, a child delivery by our EMTs and rescue efforts made during Superstorm Sandy. Congratulations to all of our awardees.

I would also like to take this opportunity to remind everyone to please be extra attentive to fire safety around the holidays. Overloaded electrical outlets from decorations, unattended cooking and candles are some of the common causes of fires. Please use basic safety practices to avoid any holiday tragedies. Some recommendations are as follows:

• Don't put your live Christmas tree up too early or leave it up for longer than two weeks. Keep the live tree stand filled with water at all times.

• Place trees away from heat sources, including fireplaces or heat vents. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks.

• Use only nonflammable decorations.

• Don't link multiple light strands, unless the directions indicate it's safe. Connect strings of lights to an approved, UL listed multiple outlet device rather than an extension cord, before plugging into the outlet.

• Avoid using lit candles; consider using battery-operated flameless candles, which can look, smell and feel like real candles

• Ensure that Christmas trees and other holiday decorations don't block an exit way.

HOILIDAY DRIVING SAFETY CONCERNS

North Plainfield Police Chief William Parenti advises all motorists and pedestrians to exercise caution as the Holiday season approaches. Concerns for driving safety have been amplified due to two recent fatal motor vehicle accidents in the borough; one involved a pedestrian and the other potentially aggressive driving by exceeding the speed limit and changing lanes. Typically, motor vehicle traffic volume expands greatly as Thanksgiving approaches and remains high until after the New Year.


The Chief reminds all pedestrians to exercise safety and caution, and to obey all traffic laws. Pedestrians should never assume that all motorists will see them during night time hours; and motorists should always be alert for

pedestrians doing unexpected and potentially dangerous things such as running out in traffic or disregarding traffic signals.

The Chief reminds all motorists to buckle up; obey posted speed limits; avoid distracted driving, and never ever drink and drive. The Chief said that police departments in Somerset County will be increasing patrols and enforcement of distracted drivers in a joint venture with the Somerset County Prosecutor's Office, the Somerset County Sheriff's Office and the municipal police departments throughout Somerset County. "A goal of all residents should be that no family should have their holiday season destroyed by a needless motor vehicle accident", Chief Parenti said.
