### GIVING PLANTS AS GIFTS

Evidence exists that giving flowers has been a significant part of our culture since the Middle Ages. Nowadays, thanks to multiple advancements, including air travel, we can include hundreds of living plants to the list, many of them that flower.

Flowering houseplants make a wonder gift, brightening the home during the drab winter season. Most of our flowering plants are from tropical countries around the world. Sadly, even a short blast of winter cold is enough to send these beauties into a slow death spiral. The trick to success is get the plant safely to where it has to go, so they will thrive though the holiday season or for some plants, years to come.

Orchids and Poinsettia, both popular gifts are very sensitive to drafts and temperature

fluctuations. It is important to get your plant home from the shop without damaging it. Cover the plant with plastic or a paper bag, then move it from the store to a warm spot in your car, not the cold car trunk. Once home remove it immediately from the wrapping (which will now hold the cold) and check the soil for moisture. When taking your gifts to their lucky recipient repeat the process. This care will avoid your orchids from dropping unopened blooms or your poinsettia from wilting away in just a few days. If the cashier is busy, they will quickly move you along. Step to the side and properly cover the plants before leaving the store.

The final step to good plant giving is supplying proper plant care information. The instructions are the tag are basic and can be easily supplemented. If you have a good houseplant book make a copy of the plant care page for your gift. If you don't have a book it is easy to find information and print it from the internet. Now your receiver not only knows sunlight and water requirements, but also knows where your plant comes from and how to propagate it.



#### **NEW WORKSHOP COMBINES PRESENTATION SKILLS** WITH HANDS-ON MS **POWERPOINT TRAINING**


### **RAHWAY HIGH SCHOOL AP ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE STUDIES LOCAL MACROINVERTEBRATES**

recently was the destination of Rahway High School teacher Jessica Merrill's Advanced Placement Environmental Science class. Students spent an entire day collecting macroinvertebrates from the shoreline and small

The shoreline of Rahway's Lake Milton creeks behind the lake. Macroinvertebrates are small animals without a backbone, visible without magnification; examples are crayfish, leeches, and snails. The presence of indicator species is an inexpensive and simple method to enable scientists to evaluate the health of an ecosystem. It was important for students to find, count, and classify the various invertebrates. From their data collection, they were able to calculate the biodiversity of the area.



### **RAHWAY'S BOLAND BROTHERS WERE FIRST TO FLY OVER N. J.**



One hundred and four years ago, on December 6, 1909, three Rahway brothers captivated the countryside by building and piloting the first airplane to fly over New Jersey soil. The Boland brothers, Frank, Joseph, and James had been building bicycles and motorcycles in the later part of the eighteen hundreds and by 1901 were designing and doing experimental work on automobiles, airplanes and aircraft motors.

After formal schooling in the Rahway public schools and graduation from Rahway High, the boys became interested in the mechanical workings of the bicycle. Frank and Joe were mechanically inclined and Jim was astute in the areas of selling and finance. Together the well balanced team established a profitable part-time business in their backyard repair shop. By the mid 1890's the young men were building more complex motor driven vehicles and in 1907 Frank began tinkering with airplane engines. When his interest turned to obsession he leased a garage on Milton Avenue at the corner of St. Georges giving him more room to work on his flying machines. His brothers saw the possibilities in this new endeavor and joined Frank in his garage workshop.

Building a plane and engine was fascinating to the Bolands but the real excitement came when they were ready to see if it could actually fly. In the winter of 1908 Frank planned to make test flights on Milton Lake once it froze over but the site was never used due to an especially mild winter. Frank would eventually find a large, flat, open field in the neighboring town of Iselin called Correja Farm.

As the months of 1909 wore on and Frank's work progressed, more and more curious spectators began to loiter around the field hoping to see if the strange looking machine could get into the air. On the afternoon of December 6, 1909, the crowd got their chance to



witness history. Frank's first two attempts were unsuccessful. Both tries ended abruptly when just moments after becoming airborne the plane brushed against tree branches and fell to the ground. Fortunately there was little damage to the plane or the pilot. The third attempt was made with brother Joe sitting next to Frank to help work the controls. Number three was the charm and the two pilots gave the crowd the show they wanted by making a circuit of the two-hundred acre field gradually rising to a height of thirty-five feet. They remained in the air for approximately twenty-five minutes. The flight was historic considering it was the first conducted in New Jersey and the first with a passenger on board.

Frank and Joe would go on to develop the first plane powered by a fifty horsepower Altham two cycle engine controlled by a Boland patented control system. When news of the Boland engine spread Thomas Edison and Wilbur Wright came to Rahway to check if the Bolands had violated their patents. After looking over the machinery and designs the two inventors left satisfied that the work was original. A scale model of one of the Boland planes is in the Smithsonian Museum, Washington D.C. By the summer of 1912, flying exhibitions were becoming popular and Frank was invited to perform in Central and South America, a schedule that would include exhibitions in Venezuela, Columbia, Costa Rica, and Trinidad. Just how far his abilities might have taken him would never be known. On January 23, 1913 while performing in Trinidad his plane crashed and he was killed instantly. He was thirty-eight years old.

Joe Boland continued to work on flying machines concentrating on modifying and improving the design and workings of flying boats. He became so reputable in his knowledge of seaplanes that the United States Navy contracted his services during World War I. Joe passed away in 1964 at the age of eighty-five.

Jim Boland enlarged the Milton Avenue garage and established the area's first Cadillac dealership. He remained in the automobile business for fifty years becoming one of the most successful dealers in Rahway. When he retired in 1954 his Cadillac dealership and showroom became the home of Miller Pontiac/Cadillac. Jim passed away at the age of eighty-five in 1967, the last of a team of ingenious brothers who helped the world learn to fly.

### HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR TELLS HIGH SCHOOL AT RAHWAY ABOUT REALITY OF THE HOLOCAUST

Allan Farkas, a Holocaust survivor, was only 14-years-old when he was sent to a concentration camp with his whole family. Recently, he told what he experienced to students not much older than that who attend Rahway High School and are members of Debra Maller's Holocaust and Genocide class.

When Allan Farkas arrived at the concentration camp, the line split in two. His family told him to lie about his age and say he was 17 since he was strong. Therefore, he did not go to his death like the rest of his family but into the line where he was taken to work for a factory making airplane parts for Germany. Only in his later years, has he spoken of his experiences according to his daughter Elizabeth who accompanied him.




