THE WATCHUNG HILLS JR. **WARRIORS HOCKEY CLUB MITES IMPROVE RECORD**

2013/2014 DEER MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

BOROUGH OF WATCHUNG - PUBLIC NOTICE

The Borough of Watchung wishes to inform all Borough residents and non-resident Borough property owners that a Borough-controlled deer management program will begin on or about December 2, 2013 and may continue until February 15, 2014. The program will be conducted under the same format as that previously utilized under the Community Based Deer Management Program.

The deer management program will be conducted as follows:

1. Controlled hunting via firearm by Warren Blue Ridge Sportsmen, Inc. on three tracts of municipal land from December 2, 2013 through February 15, 2014, as permitted by State regulations. The three tracts include 19.81 acres on the west end of Mountain Boulevard, 9.56 acres on Sequoia Drive and 6.4 acres between Route 22 and Johnston Drive.

2. Controlled hunting via firearm by Warren Blue Ridge Sportsmen, Inc. on three tracts of privately owned land from December 2, 2013 through February 15, 2014 as permitted by State regulations. The three tracks are identified below.

There are a total of six tracts of municipal or private land within the Borough of Watchung approved for this season's deer management

program. Shooting is limited to the six sites designated in the program and will only be done from elevated tree stands.

A 24 hour telephone hot line will be in operation at the Watchung Borough Municipal Building and will be maintained by the Borough to provide timely and regularly updated advance information to residents as to which dates the tracts are scheduled to be used. WATCHUNG HILLS STUDENTS EARN 2013 'AP SCHOLAR' DESIGNATION

Two-hundred-and- twenty-four Watchung Hills Regional High School students who took Advanced Placement (AP) Exams in May of 2013 have won distinction as "AP Scholars," according to the College Board, creators and sponsors of the Advanced Placement (testing) program.


