MAX GLAZER HONORED FOR VOLUNTEER SERVICE

Max Glazer, a senior at Cranford High School, was recently honored for his exemplary volunteer service with a Certificate of Excellence from The Prudential Spirit of Community Awards, and with a President's Volunteer Service Award granted by the program on behalf of President Barack Obama.

The Prudential Spirit Community Award honors young people across America for outstanding volunteer service. Certificates of Excellence are awarded to the top 10 percent of all Prudential Spirit of Community Award applicants in each state.

The Service Awards recognize Americans of all ages who have volunteered significant amounts of their time to serve their communities and their country. Cranford High School nominated Max Glazer for national honors this fall in recognition of his volunteer service.

Max founded a non-profit organization called "Books for the Bayou" which has ensured that tens of thousands of books (more than 3 tons) have streamed into the Lower 9th Ward of New Orleans to help replace what that community lost to Hurricane Katrina, and in an effort to support rebuilding. This project began when Max was 12 when his Synagogue sponsored a trip to New Orleans, working to rebuild from Hurricane Katrina. An avid reader, Max was dismayed that few books could be saved and there was no longer a working library. Max came up with the idea of getting books for these people. He started with a collection at his middle school in 2010 and was able to send 20 boxes of books for the children and adults in the Lower 9th Ward. Max has not stopped since. He has held many community collections, created a partnership with a publishing company, and has written grants to help pay for shipment of the more than 3 tons of books. Max has returned to New Orleans every year since his first visit. Max's most recent book collection has been to support schools and communities in New Jersey devasted by Hurricane Sandy. Congratulations to Max Glazer for going above and beyond in his volunteer service.





- Sister Aloysius The head nun and principal of St Nicholas School. In her fifties or sixties, she is watchful, reserved and unsentimental. She's a no-nonsense, hardened administrator. determined to maintain order and tradition.
- Father Flynn A new priest at St. Nicholas. His background is working class. In his thirties or forties, he is well-liked and particularly popular with the boys that he coaches in basketball. He's rather liberal and "modern" in his religious views.
- Sister James A young nun in her twenties who is an enthusiastic but inexperienced eighth grade teacher at St. Nicholas. She is reserved, but cares about her students and wants to think the best of everyone.
- Mrs. Muller The mother of St. Nicholas student Donald Muller. She is an African-American woman, late thirties to forties, working class, weary and wary of the world. She has learned to accept what she has to accept and work with it.

CRANFORD SCOUTS FINISH FIRST AND THIRD IN WHITE CASTLE SPONSORED CHESS TOURNAMENT

America hosted their first Chess Tournament open to all registered Boy Scouts, Venturers and Explorers. The tournament was generously

The Munsee District of the Boy Scouts of sponsored by White Castle and was held on February 22, in the Cranford Community Center. This was the first tournament since the Boy Scouts of America introduced the Chess merit badge. Thirty-one players participated, playing four games each. Twelve players were from the host town of Cranford.

Nicholas Riggins of Cranford's Troop #80 won all four of his games and finished in first place, beating out second place finisher Thomas Brockman of Millstone. Brockman also won all four of his games but lost to Riggins in tiebreaker points. Third place with three wins was Cranford's James Sweeney.

White Castle purchased 20 sets, boards and clocks for Munsee District. The company also covered expenses for running the tournament including trophies for the top three winners and ribbons for participants. They also supplied lunch for all players and spectators along with gift bags. White Castle will continue to support the Boy Scouts and the Chess program.





TOMKOVICH AND CHESS TEAM TIES FOR FIRST IN WORLD TOURNAMENT

Greg Tomkovich of Cranford plays third board on the The Kenilworth Chess Club Niners. The team tied for 1st among U1900 teams at the World Amateur Team Championship, duplicating their 2013 result.

Since 2007 the tournament has grown in size and is now the biggest amateur team tournament in the world, about 1,300 players and almost 300 four-player teams participate. The tournament was recognized by the World Chess Federation (FIDE) as a world championship.

The average of all four players is used to determine the team average. Aside from the overall open winner, prizes are awarded for each 100 rating level from under 1000 to U2100. All teams must enter with an average rating of under 2200.

Each team plays six times over a three day period. The Kenilworth team lost just 4 games out of the 24 they played in the tournament held in Parsippany, NJ over the President's Day weekend. They did not suffer a single defeat in the last 3 rounds.

Life Master Mark Kernighan led the way on board one by drawing GM Larry Kauffman in the opening round and winning his last 5 games. Third board Greg Tomkovich and alternate Dan Komunicky also turned-in plus scores. Second board John Moldovan struggled in rounds 3 and 5 but nicked FM Allan Savage for a draw on Saturday afternoon and finished at 50%. Fourth board Geoff McAuliffe also finished with an even score.

BOY SCOUT TROOPS 80 AND 75 REPRESENT CRANFORD KLONDIKE DERBY

A 65-year Boy Scout tradition continued this year at Watchung Reservation on February 8th. The Klondike Derby is a yearly competition between area Boy Scouts that allow them to showcase their scout skills as they travel from town to town in a rustic winter theater. The Klondike Derby is based on the heritage of the Klondike gold rush and the Iditarod sled competition in Alaska.


The Boy Scouts, 150 in all representing 11 local troops, traveled by sleds being pulled by the scouts themselves. At each town the scouts were given a task that required them to perform the many scout skills that they have acquired throughout their scouting life. Veteran and new scouts are joined in their sled teams to allow on

the job training for the rookies. Some skills that they pulled their sleds over plenty of frozen were tested at the 10 towns are: primitive fire building, with no matches, knot tying and lashing, winter rescue, map and compass skills and cooking. The scouts must pack their sled strategically as they can only use the items on their sled to perform each town's task. Points are awarded at each town in accordance with their proficiency. After the grueling 6-hour course the points are tallied and the winning teams are awarded medals for their efforts.

Many years the course is done on mud and gravel when Mother Nature has not provided the winter bed of snow that we would usually expect in February. However, the extreme cold this winter provided the Scouts with less friction as ground cover in the loop area at Watchung Reservation.

Each Boy Scout Troop has a home base set up to support their boys. A warm camp fire and hot food are a welcome reward for the hard working scouts. The event is a strong opportunity for the boys to show team building and leadership as well as their scouting skills. The Kondike Derby is one of many tools that Boy Scouts of America offer their membership as they advance in rank toward Eagle Scout and ultimately become productive members of our communities and society.

Start The New Year With A "Top Doctor" Practice

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CRANFORD'S HISTORY IN COLOR

The Cranford Historic Preservation Advisory Board has created a fascinating map providing a new perspective of Cranford. The map shows each lot in town and is color-coded according to the era in which each building was built. Houses built in each 25 year period are assigned a different color.

"You can really see how the town developed" said Maureen Strazdon, chair of the Cranford Historic Preservation Advisory Board. "The center of town – the bull's-eye - is predominantly shades of blue, meaning it was developed between 1825 and 1899. The next circle around the bull's-eye has a lot of brown, indicating construction between 1900 and 1924. Then the next circle out is chiefly orange and yellow, meaning it was developed between 1925 and 1963."

Only one house, the Norris-Oakey House at 1119 Orange Ave. near the Kenilworth border, is red, indicating it was built between 1700 and 1799. It is the oldest remaining house in Cranford, first built in 1750, but changed considerably with an addition in 1820.

Cranford was laid out by brothers Alden, William and Charles Bigelow of the firm Dayton, Eastman, and Bigelow in 1865. It consisted of a two block square between Holly St. (named for the Bigelows other brother, Theophilus) and Union Ave. Alden St. (named for Alden Bigelow) bounded one side and Springfield Ave. the other. The developers built more than 30 residences within this area and on the map they are light blue, indicating they were built between 1875 and 1899.

The development of Central Ave. by Dr. Phineas P. Lounsbury, inventor of "Dr. Lounsbury's Malt Extract" patent medicine, and Forest Ave. and Cranford Ave. by Sylvester Cahill, followed. Starting in 1888 Eugene


The Cranford Historic Preservation Advisory Austin developed several pieces of real estate on twenty acres near North and Forest Avenues, so there is a lot of blue in that area.

Another thing that becomes apparent are neighborhoods or developments, like Sunny Acres that is solidly orange, having been built in 1940. A total of 170 homes were built on seven streets in the area by Sears, Roebuck and Company, offering 12 designs, oriented differently for different looks. The houses were built from kits shipped in via the nearby railroad. But unlike most Sears houses that were built by owners, these were built and sold by the Company.

"The map also highlights what we have lost" said Strazdon. Yellow patches in the center of town - indicating construction between 1950 and 1963 - show where buildings were torn down and replaced.

The maps are available at the Artist Framer at 17 North Ave in Cranford. They are \$10 unframed, \$50 framed. Money raised from the sale goes to funding other Historic Preservation projects.

If requesting direct deposit of a refund, please bring your bank routing number, and bank account number. A personal check will show this.

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
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BOY SCOUTS' "GOOD TURN" BENEFITS OSCEOLA CHURCH FOOD PANTRY

Osceola Presbyterian Church Elder James Dietze was quite appreciative of the Munsee District Boy Scouts Klondike Challenge "Good Turn". Mr. Dietze is quite familiar with the aims and purposes of Scouting as the parent of an Eagle Scout and committee secretary of Boy Scout Troop 145 and knows firsthand how important the food pantry is to the many individuals and families who depend upon its services.

Patriots' Path Council, BSA proudly provides continuing support to the National Scouting for Food Good Turn. This program embodies one of the highest ideals of Scouting-service to the community-by meeting the local needs of the hungry through the practical application of the "Daily Good Turn."

More than 30 million Americans, including 6 million children, go hungry at some time every month. Today there are more hungry people in our country than at any time during the past 40 years. Emergency food providers across New Jersey report an increased demand for services over the last three years, increasing their distribution from 5%-40% a year since 2000.

"With the downturn in the economy we are seeing more and more working people than ever before coming for food. It is hard to buy food when your limited funds must go for escalating shelter costs, increased utility and fuel costs, childcare, and healthcare because your lowpaying job doesn't have health insurance benefits. At the same time, donations to food pantries have declined. This is a very challenging time for emergency food providers. Many people now struggle with having to make decisions between paying bills or putting food on the family dinner table" said Dietze. The recent delivery of food was an unexpected benefit for the pantry's bare shelves.

The Munsee District Klondike Challenge 2014 was designed as a Scout skills competition set in a winter environment of the Watchung Reservation Loop Area to emulate the conditions of the Yukon Gold Rush. Each Boy Scout Patrol had to carry all of their equipment and to be self-sufficient. As part of the check-in process of each Boy Scout Patrol Klondike Sled, the patrol leader was required to deliver 10 cans of food per participant to the "assayer's office". The food brought by the Scouts was representative of the one-year food supply that the "Klondikers" were mandated to bring with them to prevent starvation in the Yukon while prospecting for gold.

This year's Munsee District Klondike Challenge 2014 organizers Pat Lewis and Drew Baumann, who are also Scoutmaster and Committee Chairman of Boy Scout Troop 68, respectively, sponsored by Connecticut Farms Presbyterian Church in Union, NJ, directed that the food be delivered to food pantries in Union County rather than their own church's food pantry to spread the good will. They recognized the growing needs of food pantries and markedly raised the threshold of expectation from one can to ten cans per Scout with this year's event.

The Osceola Food Pantry accepts donations of canned or non-perishable food on a yearround basis.


