

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WATCHUNG HILLS RHS HALL OF FAME INDUCTS NINE

Nine names were added to the Watchung Hills Regional High School Hall of Fame at its annual induction ceremony, held on May 9 in the school's performing arts center.

The honorees, selected from nominations by the community at large, represent a variety of professions. Some are graduates of Watchung Hills Regional High School who have attained distinction in their fields, others have served with dedication as teachers, coaches, Board of Education members.

The Hall of Fame was established in 2008 as part of the school's fiftieth anniversary commemoration, and since its inception (including this year's nominees), 64 persons from fields as varied as public service, education, athletics, the arts, science have been honored.

Plaques highlighting the 2014 honorees' contributions, with abbreviated biographies and photos, will be added to those already on display in the atrium. This year's plaques were donated by: Mrs. Tina Cecala, Mario Diez, Jr., Dr. Tom DiGanci, Mr. & Mrs. Terry Mac Connell, the Warren Township Committee, the Watchung Hills Diamond Club, and the Watchung Hills Physical Education & Health Department.

THE 2014 HALL OF FAME HONOREES ARE AS FOLLOWS:

William Apgar (Class of 1962), public servant, Warren Township mayor, Board of Education president, US Army Legion of Merit, could not be present but was introduced by his nominators, Bonnie Plotkin and Gail Tafaro.

Mary Commune (Class of 1971), pianist, composer, was introduced by John Commune, who attributed his cousin's success to her passion for excellence, her belief in herself.

Edna D'Elia (1967-1985) caused some 4800 students to become better parents or successful early childhood teachers by initiating the nursery school education program some 40 years ago, said Hills present pre-school teacher, Julie Jaran. Mario Diez (1979-2013) Following in his father's footsteps as a phys ed teacher and coach, Mario Diez Jr. spoke of some of the attributes contributing to his father's success, such as patience, optimism, good humor.

Gary DiNardo (Class of 1971) was introduced by Warren Township committeeman Victor Sordillo, who cited the many instances when DiNardo had gone beyond the call of duty as a public official. "You fall a lot," said the mayor. "You have to get up and move on—the Sandy experience made me the person I am today," said DiNardo modestly.

Roy Kortman (Class of 1976), now a winning college softball coach at Long Island University was represented by his daughter, Ms.Fallon Kortman.

Christopher Lenzo (Class of 1987), an eminent labor and employment attorney,was introduced by Dr. Tom DiGanci, recently retired Hills principal.

Brian Penn (Class of 1972), is still remembered at Hills for his track record. These days, as a geospatial software engineer for the National Ecological Observatory Network in Boulder, Colorado, he is deeply involved in Hyperspectral remote sensing having helped establish a NASA-based university center.

Nicholas Yonezuka (Class of 1981) was introduced by Mr. Ed Williams, who called the honoree "an athletic prodigy" whose career began at nine years of age. His extreme focus and discipline contributed to his status as US. National Judo champion from ages nine to fourteen, the youngest Olympian ever Needless to say, along the way, representing Watchung Hills, he was also district and regional wrestling champion.

The evening's activities concluded with a buffet prepared by the cafeteria staff under the direction of Ms. Lisa Martins. The event, including the nominating procedure, was under the direction of Vice Principal Terry Mac Connell. Nomination forms for future candidates will be available at the school's main office.

Although the annual Teacher of the Year program is no longer sponsored by the state, it is still a highly-regarded recognition program in many of New Jersey's school districts. Watchung Hills Regional High School is one of those districts that yearly honors a teacher who is considered outstanding, a model for the profession, recognized as such by students, parents and fellow teachers alike.

This year that honor has been bestowed on ⁸ Brian Brown, a 10-year member of Watchung Hills Regional High School's Science Department. A plaque, presented to $(a^{\overline{a}})$ surprised) Brown at Hills' April faculty meeting, 볼 expresses the high regard in which Brown is held:"...For generating intellectual energy and momentum from small sparks or curiosity, for being a positive force for learning and growing in our school community, for having compassion and commitment as strong and steady as gravity's pull, we honor you as Teacher of the Year.'

Brown teaches four honors sections of physics. In the two-plus decades during which Brown has taught, he has seen many changes, both in the curricular emphases of his subject and in the students themselves. Obviously, the use of the computer, which two decades ago was little more than a word processor, has become the prime tool for physics students - but one that is nevertheless only a tool - that needs to be balanced with hands-on skills and understanding of the subject matter. With some of the more tedious operations now processed by computer, today's students are allowed to delve more deeply, become more analytical.

His students, says Brown, are "genuinely talented, and what's more, push themselves." But that doesn't mean they can't have fun while doing so, as evidenced, for example, by their early fall physics-oriented trip to Disney World, during which they explored some of the principles of physics behind the park's fun façade.

An exceptionally interested group of parents, says Brown, supports his students.

Brown himself attended West Essex High School, received his bachelor's degree from the M.I.T. and has his master's degree in Materials Engineering from University of California / Santa Barbara - where he was a member of the tennis team. He taught briefly at Columbia H.S. (Maplewood) before coming to Hills.

From physics to physical: Brown lays aside the texts and experiments of the academic year during the month of July to teach tennis and conduct a tennis clinic on Watchung Hills' courts (brianbrowntennis.wordpress.com). Unlike his AP classes, there are no exams, no term papers! He's also a serious bicyclist, a sport he shares with his sons, 15 and 17.

His peers are not the only ones to acknowledge Brown as both teacher and person. At its December 5th Induction Service, newlyselected members of Hills National Honor Society recognized Brown as the teacher who most nearly symbolizes the four standards of prestigious honor group: scholarship, the character, community service and leadership.

And those are the very qualities of a Teacher of the Year.

STAGECOACH RUN

If you were standing at Washington Rock late in the afternoon in the 1860's or 1870's you probably would hear the clip clop of horses' hooves pulling the stagecoach up what is now known as Cardinal Lane from the Plainfield Train Station to the Washington Rock Mountain House. A 2 1/2 to 3 story resort hotel that sat behind what is now the Green Brook Company Fire House #2.

The hotel had many owners and financial problems but catered to city folks who wanted fresh country air and wonderful views from the Rock. Hotel was there from 1852 until a fire claimed it until in March 1883.

Volunteers with the Green Brook Fire-EMS still carry vivid memories of that day 15 years ago, when Hurricane Floyd ripped through the town and filled their headquarters with 10 inches of rainwater. The recliners that had been used for squad meetings were destroyed and discarded, as the volunteers began the task of remodeling the building on Greenbrook Road. Luckily, at the time, a local furniture store, now out of business, stepped in to donate some replacement recliners.

All was well, once again. But after 15 years of day-to-day use, those once pristine recliners are now facing the hands of time. Will Schafer, owner of the new Ashley Furniture HomeStore in Green Brook, heard the need. As part of his grand opening, he has donated three new leather recliners to the 50-member squad, to officially kick-start a recliner replacement campaign. Schafer, who recently dropped off the brown leather recliners at the squad building and placed them prominently in the front of the room of old, worn recliners, said the company philosophy is to learn about local need and figure out a way to give back. "Not only do we have a welcome new business in town," said Darlene Breen, EMS Chief of Green Brook Fire-EMS, "but they're already becoming active citizens and are willing to help us."

"Our team is so gracious of Ashley's donation," she added. "We always work to promote Green Brook's local businesses and it means a lot that they turned around and helped us when we needed it."

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
