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CRANFORD DAR ESSAY CONTEST

The Cranford Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) awarded prizes to twelve 2014 American History Essay Contest winners at the close of the school year. Four students also won at the State level NJDAR contest, more than any other DAR chapter in NJ. Statewide there were 1,476 essays from 49 schools participating.

Essay contest chairwoman, Barbara Krause, indicated "The students seemed to enjoy the required topic 'The Lives of Children during the American Revolution'. They used creativity, understanding of and insight into various hardships families endured." The judges praised excellent writing skills that were very improved

over previous years.

Each essay is read and scored by three non-DAR judges at the local and state level. Cranford had a total of 180 entries in grades 5 through 8; and 50 students scored 90 and above. The first place Cranford winners receive a DAR History Medal. State winners, along with their parents, were honored at a NJDAR award luncheon in April in Princeton.

Mary Leonard, essay contest co-chairwoman, said "We appreciate the hard work and enthusiasm of the students and teachers to bring such excellent results. We are proud of all our participants."

Mr. Colicchio is the author of two other novels, High Gate Health and Beauty (Creative Arts, 2000), and The Trouble with Mental Wellness (Bridge Works, 2004). High Gate Health and Beauty was named top-ten novel of the year a by MostlyFiction.com, and The Trouble with Mental Wellness was designated a recommended book by Library Journal. Mr. Colicchio grew up in Jersey City, which is the setting for all three of his novels. He has completed two residencies at the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts, received two Geraldine R. Dodge grants, and two New Jersey State Council on the Arts grants, including the Distinguished Artist Award, the highest the state bestows. He is an Associate Professor of English at Hudson County Community College in Jersey City. Copies of Mr. Colicchio's novels will be available for purchase and for signing. 31 TITLES ADDED TO LIBRARY'S DVD COLLECTION



The film tells the story of Wadjda, a 10-year-old Saudi girl, who is determined to acquire a bicycle of her own despite the various societal and economic obstacles lying in her way. In his

review of the film in the New York Times, A.O. Scott noted, "With impressive agility, Wadjda finds room to maneuver between harsh realism and a more hopeful kind of storytelling. There is warmth as well as austerity in Wadjda's world, kindness as well as cruelty, and the possibility, modestly sketched and ardently desired, of change." Admission to the screenings is free and all are welcome.



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JOHN DAQUINO AWARDED \$1,000 SCHOLARHIP

The Friends of the Cranford Public Library recently awarded a \$1,000 scholarship to John Daquino. The Friends have been awarding scholarships to Cranford residents pursuing post-graduate degrees in library studies since 2005. Mr. Daquino is currently enrolled in the Masters of Library and Information Science (M.L.I.S.) program at Rutgers and expects to receive his degree in 2015. Upon receiving his M.L.I.S., he hopes to work in the area of digital collections. Mr. Daquino holds an M.A. in Art History from Purchase College. In addition to pursuing his library degree at Rutgers, he works as both a Library Associate at the Rahway Public Library and an Alternate Format Text and Assistive Technology Assistant at Rutgers' Office of Disability Services. The next application period for the Friends' library studies scholarship will begin in March 2015.

Applications will be available at the library's Reference Desk. In addition to awarding an annual library studies scholarship, the Friends of the Cranford Public Library, founded in 1979, support the library in many other ways. They fund nearly all of the library's adult programming, as well as the library's highly popular children's summer reading program. They purchase equipment for the library and materials for use by the public. Some recent examples include passes to ten area museums, including the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum and Ground for Sculpture, Nook e-book readers, and The Great Courses DVDs. 
BOOK SALE AUGUST 6TH

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- 4. Plan Ahead: Know the water you are paddling. Be aware of tides and dangerous currents and have a float plan. Tell people where you are going and when you plan to return.
- Have proper Safety Kit gear on board (alarm, light, paddle leash, etc).
- Never paddle alone. A buddy can come to your aid if you get in trouble. New paddlers should paddle with someone more experienced.
- Learn skills necessary to maneuver your boat. Practice how to get out of, hang on to, and re-enter if capsized. Don't overload and keep your balance.
- 8. Do not exceed your paddling ability. Know your limits.
- Learn to recognize potential hazards and use good judgment to avoid them.
- Check your equipment prior to each use for signs of wear or failure.





CRANFORD OFFICERS DEPLOY NARCAN IN EFFORT TO PREVENT OVERDOSE DEATHS

program, Cranford Police officers began carrying a powerful medication capable of reversing the often-fatal effects of heroin overdoses. The medication, Narcan, was distributed to police officers countywide, acting Union County Prosecutor Grace H. Park said Tuesday in a joint announcement made with the Union County Police Chiefs Association and its various members.

The Prosecutor's Office distributed a total of 200 Narcan kits among the county's 21 municipal departments, with all of the kits available for immediate use. All front line patrol vehicles in Cranford are equipped with the medication kits. An aerosol form of the drug naloxone, Narcan is administered to sufferers of a heroin overdose nasally through use of a device known as an atomizer.

The kits were priced at approximately \$30 per unit, and federal forfeiture funds used to cover the costs. Officers in every department already have undergone training illustrating precisely how to administer Narcan, and the kits are being deployed in patrol vehicles countywide.

"The Union County Police Chiefs Association applauds and supports the aggressive approach by Prosecutor Park in addressing this growing problem," association president and Roselle Park Police Chief Paul Morrison said. "This Narcan procedure reverses the effects of a heroin overdose and will surely prove to be a lifesaving tool in the fight against heroin addiction.'

Union County recorded 42 fatal drug overdoses in 2013, with 45 occurring in 2012 for a two-year total of 87. Thirty-nine of those 87 fatal overdoses involved heroin, according to records compiled by the Union County Medical Examiner's Office.

Cranford Police Chief James Wozniak believes that the program gives his officers another tool to save lives. "Our community is

On July 1, 2014, as part of a countywide certainly not immune to the reality of heroin and prescription drug abuse and the detrimental effects it has on families in our community," he stated. "If by deploying these Narcan kits one or more of our residents benefits, then tragedies are averted and locally the program is a success."

Plans for police to utilize Narcan in Union County started being formulated early this year. During a press conference held last month, Governor Chris Christie said that police in all 21 New Jersey counties soon will start administering Narcan to overdose victims, as a pilot program launched in April in Ocean and Monmouth counties has been credited with reversing more than 40 overdoses to date. Acting New Jersey Attorney General John Jay Hoffman announced during the press conference that the New Jersey State Police also are moving forward with the Narcan initiative, with 900 kits having been ordered to ensure that every State Police patrol vehicle is equipped.

The distribution of the Narcan kits will supplement continuing outreach efforts by the Prosecutor's Office to spread awareness about the harmful effects of heroin addiction and addiction to prescription painkillers - office representatives have organized or participated in informational forums addressing the topic in half a dozen Union County municipalities during the last year.

"During these forums, we routinely hear firsthand accounts of how addiction of this nature destroys lives and leaves entire families devastated. In a word, it's heartbreaking," Park said. "The use of Narcan has proven to save lives. And although it's not a cure to the powerful disease of heroin and opiate addiction, it gives us a chance to prevent the many tragic and senseless deaths that stem from this addiction. This is one step toward fighting the growing epidemic of heroin overdoses in this state."

As in the past, members of the Cranford PBA Local #52 will be on hand to provide refreshments to all in attendance.




