WARREN TOWNSHIP 9TH ANNUAL CAR SHOW

The Warren Township Volunteer Fire Department will be holding their annual car show Sunday, September 7th (rain or shine) at the ball fields behind the Warren Township (Somerset County) municipal complex, located at 46 Mountain Blvd. The hours of the show are from 9am - 3pm. Registration fee for show cars is \$15.00 by August 23 and \$25.00 after August 23 and on site. Spectator admission and parking is free, but donations are gratefully appreciated. The car show is an annual Warren Township Volunteer Fire Department fund raiser. Proceeds from the car show go towards the purchase of equipment for the fire department.

The car show is one of the largest in the state with over 450 entrants from the tri-state and surrounding areas participating. Antique, classic, muscle, modern muscle, foreign, hot rods, street rods, race cars, fire trucks, motorcycles and other vintage vehicles will be in attendance. There will be a periodic starting of race car engines, sending a thunderous roar throughout the venue. Trophies will be awarded in 33 classes, including a class for fire trucks and military vehicles. There will also be a fully restored 1950's classic ice cream truck complete with an authentic "ice cream man" in his white uniform. A group of professional judges with many years of car show experience will be evaluating the entries. Judging takes place from 10



am - 1 pm and the awards ceremony will begin at approximately 2:45 pm. The day will be a nostalgic and fun filled one for families, car enthusiasts and those who just want to travel back in time to the days when life was simpler. Renowned radio disc jockey "Golden Gup" Gus Gasciogne will be spinning tunes from the 50's and 60"s and providing entertainment throughout the day. Food vendors will be set up to sell hamburgers, hot dogs and other food and beverages. There will also be a 50/50 drawing to benefit the fire department.



With MasterChef Junior as a recent television hit, Cooks and Books has youngsters bubbling over with excitement for cooking. Matching that with students' love of reading, teacher Michele Tanzi said, "Reading has never tasted so good!" Her class is a perfect way to take fledgling chefs on a culinary adventure. With a focus on nutritious and delicious foods, the class utilizes books not only for recipes, but to celebrate diverse cultures.

Gymnastics and P.L.A.Y., taught by Shannon O'Shea and Laura Lamson respectively, are active and engaging. With a certified USGA gymnastics trainer, students cartwheel, tumble, and flip. The focus is on strength training and flexibility. During P.L.A.Y. (Physical & Leisure Activities for the Young), students stay fit through indoor and outdoor sports and games such as waffle ball, Eskimos, and ice castles. The focus is on trust, teamwork, and self-expression.

Working together for the last decade, Coordinator Meryl Lettire and her assistant Eileen Haddican, have seen the program grow and change in many positive and exciting ways. They now allow weekly schedules so students can pick different classes each week. 



The Warren resident will attend Bucknell University as an accounting major and continue to play softball.





On July 17th, 2014 the campers participated in the decorating by putting their fingerprints on the poles of the gazebo. Each child's fingerprint is a flower petal.

This project proved to be a great experience and a lot of fun for both Elizabeth and Jamie. They hope that the Buddy Bench in Bay Head and the Buddy Bench in Warren will make a difference and be safe environments for everyone.
