RIBBON CUTTING AT THE CENTER SCHOOL

Assemblyman Upendra Chivukula and representatives from The Somerset Country Business Partnership and the Tri-Country Chamber were on hand on September 10 to cut the ribbon for The Center School's new facility at 2 Riverview Drive.

The Center School, founded in 1971 as a private, non-profit state-accredited school for bright, learning-disabled students, has finally found their "home" in Franklin Township after operating in temporary quarters in Branchburg after a fire claimed their building in Highland Park.

Executive Director Marcie Fiorentino welcomed all the guests and gave a short, heartfelt speech on the difference The Center School made not only in each child's life, but how they also made a difference in the lives of each family.

"We really want to thank everyone involved in making this wonderful new facility possible," said Fiorentino. "Everyone has been so welcoming and we are looking forward to becoming part of the community."

Children with learning disabilities and school adjustment problems experience difficulties in all aspects of their lives as well as in school. These disabilities affect academic achievement, peer relationships, family life, and the development of a positive self-image.

The Center School provides a supportive educational environment in which each student may reach his or her potential for academic, emotional and physical health and this is accomplished by carefully selected, dedicated staff working in unison with the student, the parents/guardians, and the sending district.

The Center School offers complete education

Franklin Township Mayor Brian Levin, from K through 12-PLUS, serving between 55 and 65 school districts each year and they are committed to helping each student become as self-sufficient and successful as possible.

> Disabilities served by The Center School include:

- Asperger's Syndrome
- Anxiety Disorders/OCD, PTSD, School Phobia, etc.
- Dyslexia Spectrum disorder: reading, spelling, written language

BEN FRANKLIN JOINS FACULTY TRAINING AT WATCHUNG HILLS

Benjamin Franklin, educator and one of this nation's founding fathers, shared an hour of his time with the faculty at Watchung Hills Regional High School on Wednesday, Sept. 4, as part of their back-to-school preparations, imparting his knowledge, postulating his theories of the importance of curiosity, practicality and collaboration, and sharing with the faculty their common thirsts for lifelong learning and problem-solving invention.

Franklin was also author, printer, inventor, statesman, political theorist and politician, diplomat, postmaster, inventor, scientist, founder and trustee of the University of Pennsylvania and its hospital, and mentor to no less than Thomas Jefferson, Thomas Paine and Marquis De Lafayette. He acknowledged that he was sharing his time with the teachers on what must seem to them to be the real New Year's Eve of the year, the night before the start of the school year. "I've been asked to speak to you about the real importance of public education," said Franklin. "That is a subject near and dear to my heart."

Franklin's alter ego is Christopher Lowell of Colorado, 38 years a teacher of high school French, and another six in acting at the University of Colorado, not to mention 11 years portraying Franklin.

From the time he walked into Watchung Hills on Wednesday afternoon in colonial garb, sporting a distinctive hairstyle and wearing his self-invented spectacles, until the time he left, he never stepped out of character. He said he had portrayed Franklin in 35 states and across Europe. He has spoken to students of all ages, from grade school to college faculty, and he adapts his talks to make them age appropriate to his audience.

He said he particularly enjoys speaking to younger students who may not have yet been inspired to have a thirst to learn about the founding of their country, or its founding fathers and mothers. "It is up to each generation to excite young people about learning about history," he said. "We have to make it come alive so they become engaged."

After introducing himself in character as Franklin to the audience of teachers, giving them a thumbnail sketch of his biography and some of his overriding principles, he continued in character to answer questions.

He also shared Franklin's opinion about some of his fellow founding fathers. His favorite were clearly the author of the Declaration of Independence, Thomas Jefferson, whom Franklin said was like a son to him. He also had great respect for general and first president, George Washington. He said Washington once was a house guest of his for two weeks leading up to one of the consequential meetings of the Continental Congress.

Franklin was blunt in his appraisal of fellow founding father and second president, John Adams, whom Franklin characterized as holding decidedly more puritanical views than Franklin.

Franklin was asked about his views on slavery and the fact that the founding fathers allowed it. He said he regretted that to win approval from colonies which were already dependent on the slave system for labor, the founding fathers had to compromise. However, he said his scientific approach to learning eventually led him to realize the truths that abolitionists he met in England were telling him about slavery. Back in Philadelphia, he opened a school for black students and discovered they can and did learn the same as white students, and that they were not inherently inferior as many at that time thought. He said had there not been a compromise, the new American government would not have been formed. He said once the new government was formed, however, he tried to have enacted laws to abolish slavery and give full benefits of American life for all. Unfortunately, his efforts to pass such laws were unsuccessful.

Franklin grew up in Boston, Mass., and said his father sent him as a 9-year-old to Boston Latin School in anticipation of him going onto to Harvard and becoming a minister. He said he read everything he could at Boston Latin, but he did not want to become a minister. By 10-yearsold, he was out of Boston Latin, working as an

apprentice printer to his half-brother, who beat him. He ran away to New York City, and then to Philadelphia, Pa., where he continued as a printer and where he settled. There, he continued to read, to repair, and to invent.

That philosophy led him to form the first library in Philadelphia, not only for the wealthy and the wealthy class, but also for his fellow leather apron citizens and families. He saw the need for a hospital and formed the hospital. He saw the need for a university, but didn't want it to be only for men who wanted to be ministers, like at Harvard, Yale, Princeton and William and Mary. He wanted the university to also teach practical skills. He became trustee for life at that university, and it is today called the University of Pennsylvania.

He also invented the Franklin Stove and the bifocal glasses. Plus, with the use of a kite and a key attached to the end of a string, he demonstrated that the electrical current in a bolt of lightning could be directed. This led to the invention of the lightning rod, with which human beings can direct the electrical current in a safe manner. Franklin was able to use his writing skills to publish a report of his scientific findings about lightning in Europe. As a result, he was the first American scientist to win his time's equivalent of the Nobel Prize for science. In his lifetime, Franklin made eight Trans-Atlantic voyages, with the average voyage taking four to 6 weeks, he said.
