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

On Sunday September 21st the Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church in North Plainfield hosted an important event for all of the people living in the Plainfields area. Organized under the banner, "Common Ground," the five Presbyterian churches have begun a year-long program to help fight hunger and its many causes in our local communities. The churches, Watchung Avenue, along with Bethel, Crescent Avenue, United, and Nuevas Fronteras – all in Plainfield – have partnered with Princeton Seminary's Food Justice Program to engage the services of Ms. Stehpanie C. Merryfield as Fellow for Food Justice. Merryfield is also a Masters of Divinity degree candidate. Ms. Merryfield brings a vast background of experience in this area and will facilitate the development of a common ground of expectations among the churches. The thrust of our effort can be summarized as, "assisting the communities in becoming involved in the relocalization of food production management, as well as empowering the economic enterprises

needed to accomplish this goal." In practical terms we are intent on providing more food in more ways to those who are in need, as well as focusing more attention on the importance of following good nutritional guidelines for better health.



"We're just one color- we're maroon," says North Plainfield High School senior, Anthony Lafond, when questioned about the racial incident between the high school football teams of North Plainfield and Summit. North Plainfield's football team, who are largely made up of African Americans, believe this was a racial joke, in which they are not taking very lightly. This offensive incident is not only affecting the town's football team, but the high school, nevertheless, the entire community. North Plainfield is filled with so many nationalities and this scene has only brought up the idea of the town's diversity and their uniqueness compared to many of the surrounding towns.

NPF POLICE TURN TO NARCAN TO SAVE LIVES

Police Chief William Parenti announced that hope the kits are never needed but are glad to the Department is deploying "Narcan" kits in all patrol units. Narcan is the trade name of Naloxone, an emergency nasal spray for opioid overdose. Chief Parenti said the program is part of a county wide initiative coordinated by the Somerset County Prosecutor's Office and that the antidote kits were provided by Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital Somerset. Chief Parenti reported that all North Plainfield patrol officers were trained in administering the antidote which has been successfully administered by police officers in Ocean and Monmouth Counties and has been credited with saving the lives of numerous persons that had overdosed on heroin. The Chief added: "we

have them if they are".
