STUDENTS MAIL 15 LBS. OF LETTERS TO VETS

Students in Social Studies classes at Watchung Hills Regional High School wrote and mailed 15 lbs. of letters to retired veterans, wounded warriors and active Armed Service personal. The letters were timed to arrive during the holidays, and were sent through a program sponsored by Operation Gratitude, the national program that assembles care packages to deployed service men and women out of Van Nuys, Calif.

Social Studies teacher Michelle Krupsky, who was assisted in organizing the letter-writing effort by Social Studies teacher Jessica Kelly, said that this year's response to the request for letters was overwhelming. The previous years' totals had been about 9 lbs.

Each letter included a genuine, personal message of gratitude for the service member, Krupsky said. Some included insight on the letter writer's lives, and how the service of the veterans has contributed to the freedom of United States students to pursue their education

Students in Social Studies classes at beyond high school. Some included personal atchung Hills Regional High School wrote information and gratitude as some of their own d mailed 15 lbs. of letters to retired veterans, family members have served.

Operation Gratitude reports that the troops have said the most cherished items in the care packages that are sent to them from the United States are the personal letters of appreciation from Americans, Krupsky said.

Other helpful hints from Operation gratitude include: Keep the message upbeat and positive; be thankful; feel free to share a little bit of yourself; do not discuss death or killing; avoid politics completely and religion in excess.

All letters were hand written, as per suggestion from Operation Gratitude. Recommended letter openings include: Dear Hero, Dear Brave One and Dear Veteran. All letters are written on regular 8x11 paper. No greeting cards were used.
