CIVIL RIGHTS VOLUNTEER SHARES EXPERIENCES WITH STUDENTS

The Rev. Brooks Smith, a retired pastor at Watchung Avenue Presbyterian Church, North Plainfield, spoke on Friday, Feb. 27, to English and Social Studies students at Watchung Hills Regional High School about his experiences as a student civil rights volunteer during the 1964 "Freedom Summer."

He spoke at the invitation of English teacher Laura Goodson, who said Smith was invited in part to celebrate February as Black History Month, and in part to give a broader context to the subject of this year's Academy Award-nominated movie, "Selma." Selma is about the struggle in the 1960s to help Black Americans in the South

register to vote. "Jim Crow" laws had for decades made it virtually impossible for blacks to vote, Smith said.

Smith recalled how dangerous it was for young civil rights volunteers in the South during the summer of 1964. Three of his fellow student volunteers that summer were murdered by members of the Ku Klux Klan. Two others were kidnapped. And many, including Smith, were arrested.



5TH ANNUAL GREEN FAIR APRIL 25

On Saturday, April 25, 2015, from 10 a.m. to the Watchung Borough Website at: 1:00 p.m., the Warren Township Green Team and the Watchung Green Team will hold a Regional Green Fair. The rain date is May 2, 2015.

The event will take place in the parking lot of the Warren Municipal Complex at 46 Mountain Boulevard adjacent to Bardy Road. There will be activities, environmental information, and recycling collections of hard-to-dispose-of items.

Participants at the Fair will include: the Lions Club, Wagner Farm Arboretum, Dean's Natural Food Market, Newtech Recycling, Warren and Watchung Girl Scouts, the Environmental Club of WHRHS, Windsong Farm, Camp Jotoni, NRJ Homes Services, Watchung Garden Club, Regional Pollinator Partnership, Morris/ Somerset County Beekeepers Association, Arbonne International and Guardian Paper Shredding.

Over the past two years, the recycling collections of the Green Fair have brought in approximately 36,000 pounds of electronics, 6,275 pounds of shredded paper, and 700 pounds of medicines which were all recycled and properly disposed of with the least impact to the environment. In addition I2,000 pounds of books, textiles, eye glasses, and shoes were directed to those in need.



CHICK HATCHING WELCOMES SPRING!

For the past fifteen years, Woodland School first graders have experienced an egg-citing, hands-on learning opportunity. First grade teachers, Anita Brower and Dorothy Stolfi, were able to coordinate efforts and bring the farm to school for these youngsters. Thanks to funding from the Warren Lions Club, students participated in the Quiver Farm Chick Hatching Project.

Beginning March 16th, Farmer Eric brought two incubators with twelve candled eggs in each, to Woodland School. He explained that students were responsible to turn the eggs three times a day, ensure a 99.5 degree temperature and keep the incubator humid. The waiting was the hardest part. As they left school on March 20th, the first day of spring with the snow falling, students were already excited to return the following Monday in anticipation of the hatching. By March 24th, the chicks had emerged. Students recorded their observations in journals and cared for the chicks in the brooder boxes, feeding them seed, giving them water, and providing layers of wood chips.
