LIBRARY HONORED FOR BEST PRACTICES IN EARLY LITERACY

The Watchung Public Library, a Branch of the Somerset County Library System, is one of four libraries honored by New Jersey State Library with the 2015 Award for the Best Practices in Early Literacy Programs. New Jersey State Library Youth Services Specialist, Sharon Rawlins, presented the award to Watchung Library's Youth Services Librarian, Sharon Orlando, at the New Jersey Library Association Annual Conference.

The four winning libraries include Watchung Public Library for its Mini-Maker Art Space Program, Cherry Hill Public Library for a Busy Bags Learning Activities Program, the Otto Bruyns Public Library in Northfield for the B.Y.O.B. (Bring Your Own Baby) interactive program, and Franklin Township (in Somerset County) Free Public Library's Reading Connection Program based on the letters of the alphabet.

Watchung Library's Mini-Maker Art Space coordinated by Orlando, and supported by the Friends of the Watchung Library and the Watchung Library Advisory Board, is a self-directed art space for children and their families. Studies have shown that expressive arts can foster emergent reading through symbols, feelings and words. Started in 2008, the Mini-Maker Art Space offers young artists an array of supplies and books related to a theme. Families can stop by whenever the library is open to make a project, as well as read and tell a story about what they created.

"Art inspires children to expand their ideas, and visualize what they are thinking about. Wonderful words and stories follow what they've made," says Orlando. She also added that the award really honors all the young artists and the grown-ups who visit and participate in the art space.

Katie Panzarella, and her children, Natalie and P.J, regularly come to the library and work in the art space. "Art and story telling are very important to the library, my children are a great example of that. They love coming to the Watchung Library mainly because you have a different craft every week. Though they may not do the actual craft

Along with a certificate, Watchung Library received an award for \$1,000. The funds will be used to support the program. This is the second time that the New Jersey State Library has honored Watchung Library for Best Practices in Early Literacy Programs. The first was in 2012 for the library's Family Reading Incentive Programs.



32, led a team of volunteers to build four colony bat houses to help support the local bat population, which has been compromised due to white nose syndrome. Bats are beneficial to the environment because they devour a third of their body weight in nuisance bugs per night particularly mosquitoes. This in turn can reduce the amount of mosquito pesticides used. The bat houses also encourage the animals to nest away from homeowners' attics and roof eaves.

The bat house Eagle project was sponsored by the Watchung Environmental Commission, with additional donations from a private donor and the Watchung Home Depot.
