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
THE HISTORIC HANSON HOUSE IS ENHANCED BY CRANFORD'S NEWEST EAGLE SCOUT JOHN ROSS

Cranford's Hanson Park's natural and historic charm was given new life with the recent Eagle Scout project by Eagle Scout John Ross of The First Presbyterian Church's Boy Scout Troop 80.

After achieving the rank of Life Scout and completing 21 merit badges, representing crucial life skills, a young man must prove his ability to plan implement and fund a community service project, of a grand scale, that serves his church or community. The selection of this project is carefully scrutinized by the controlling Patriots Path Council.

With the help of Kathleen Murray, John's Eagle coach and president of The Hanson Park Conservancy, John selected for his project the renovation of the detached garage at Hanson house on Springfield Avenue which is an historical landmark. The Hanson House had been recently painted and repaired, the garage was not. The project focused on replacing rotten wood and painting the structure to match the grand home. The windows were totally rotten and were replaced creatively by artistic renderings of charming windows hand painted by Cranford High School student Elizabeth Spiegel. This was truly the finishing touch to a wonderful project.

Achieving the rank of Eagle Scout is an enormous feat completed by less than 5 of 100 boys that start the journey as 1st graders. John enters the fraternity of thousands of fine men that live their lives guided by the Boy Scout Oath, Law, Outdoor Code of Conduct and following the Scout Motto "Be Prepared for Life". John is the 139th Eagle Scout from

CRANFORD POLICE TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

participating in the 32nd Annual National Night Out on Tuesday, August 4th from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. in Patrolman Robert F. Hand Plaza and on the front lawn of the Cranford Police Department headquarters. This free nationwide event, developed by the National Association of Town Watch, began in 1984 as an effort to promote involvement in crime prevention activities, police-community partnerships, neighborhood camaraderie and to send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods were organized and fighting back against crime. The event provides an excellent opportunity for residents to interact with members of the Cranford Police Department in an informal setting. Residents and visitors may also obtain information about the Department's many youth, educational, safety and public awareness programs.

Numerous police and emergency vehicles will be on display, including a marked police patrol car, a zodiac jet powered rescue boat, a police motorcycle, emergency services unit utility vehicles and equipment from the Union County Office of Emergency Management and New Jersey Transit Police Department. Public Safety personnel will be on hand to answer questions or demonstrate equipment.

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
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THE WORLD FAMOUS ZERBINI FAMILY CIRCUS



SELECTIVE SERVICE BOARD SEEKING MEMBERS

The Selective Service System wants to hear from men and women who might be willing to serve as members of local Selective Serviceboards.

Local board members are uncompensated volunteers closely connected with the nation's defense. If a military draft becomes necessary, approximately 2,000 local and appeal boards throughout America would decide which young men in each community receive deferments, postponements or exemptions from military service, based on federal guidelines.

A position is open for residents ofUnion County. Prospective board members must be U.S. citizens, at least 18, registered with Selective Service (if men), not be an employee of any law

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enforcement occupation, not be an active or retired member of the armed forces and not have been convicted for any criminal offense. Once identified as qualified candidates for appointment, they are recommended by the governor and appointed by the director of the Selective Service, who acts on behalf of the president in making the appointments. New members receive five hours of initial training after appointment, followed by two hours of annual training for as long as they remain in the position. They may serve in board member positions up to a total of 20 years, if desired.

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
