Jim and Karen Zilinski - On Aug 10, 2006 Janet Zilinski was running laps at the ECP. She collapsed and went into cardiac arrest and died later that evening. October of that year the Janet Memorial Fund was started by her parents, family and friends. Their sole mission is to raise awareness for vouth AED (Automated External Defibrillator)

readily accessible training in CPR. Their big accomplishment was passing the "Janet's Law" which requires every school K-12 private and public to have onsite staff training and an Emergency Action Plan in an event of cardiac arrest. This went into effect September 1, 2014 and is credited with saving seven lives since. The Janet Zilinski Memorial Fund is the largest nonprofit donating defibulators in NJ. Over 200 AED's were donated and over 3000 people have been trained in CPR. In 2008 Warren Township was the first to recognize Janet's Law and have AED's donated by the Fund for our playing fields. Jim & Karen Zilinski are commended for their tireless efforts through the years which have finally resulted in the passing of Janet's Law.



Bruce Vitale – This year is the 30th anniversary of Warren Township's fishing derby. It began by one person because of his love for fishing. Every year for 30 years Bruce Vitale orders the fish to stock the pond, picks up the bait plus gathers donations and prizes. He is very involved in helping the children and parents learn all about fishing on this day. Throughout the

day Bruce makes sure he walks around the pond helping the children and parents with tangled lines, adding hooks & bait or instructing the correct way to cast. He is truly dedicated to fishing and wants to make sure every child gets to enjoy the sport as he has for over 60 years.

GET TO KNOW YOUR TRAILS HIKING SERIES

Warren Twp.area. Then come to Warren Twp Recreation's3rdinstallment of Get to Know Your Trails Hiking Series on Saturday, October 3 from 9-11am.

There will be two choices of hikes to take. One is led by Naturalist & Recreation Commissioner Joe Filo who will lead a slower paced walk & talk hike about nature along the trails. And the other is led by Recreation Director & avid hiker, Eleanora Hermann who will lead a more brisk hike.

This hike is for adults, kids and families seeking an interest in improved health and enjoying a walk along Dealaman Pond and Stransky trails. Learn about the growing bird watching activity. Enjoy woods, plants, flowers, ponds, frogs, and turtles plus more.

Dealaman Pond is a 25 acre woodlot, wetland and pond/picnic area. It is named for George Dealaman, a long time Warren Public Servant and benefactor. It has been enhanced with a parking lot, wood-chipped trail loops, benches, and a restored dam holding a large shallow pond

Want to learn more about the trails around the use for the township fishing derby each May. A half-mile trail loop winds through a young hardwood grove to older groves along Cory's brook, marsh and pond; a small open field surrounds the dam location.

> Stransky Farm is a 21 Acre farm and woodlot purchased in 1998 from the Stransky family. Behind this, the mowed trails loop around the large meadows in both open and shaded areas, connecting with blazed wooded trails along Cory's Brook. A wide variety of wildflowers, shrub and trees, aged and young line the level, generally smooth trails. A few large old farm equipment items add historical interest. A variety of species and settings, plus convenience and ease of walking, combines to make a popular outdoor retreat.

> This is a free event, just show up and sign waiver when you arrive. Children under 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

The Warren Township Volunteer Fire Department will be holding their 10th annual car show Sunday, September 13th (rain or shine) at the fields behind the Warren Township (Somerset County) municipal complex, located at 46 Mountain Blvd. The hours of the show are from 9am-3pm. Registration fee for show cars is \$15.00, if registration is received by August 28. Registration after August 28 and on-site registration will be \$25.00. Spectator admission and parking is free. However, donations are gratefully appreciated. The car show is an annual Warren Township Volunteer Fire Department fundraiser. Proceeds from the car show go towards the purchase of equipment for the fire department.

Running from Tuesday after Labor Day weekend through late September, with the opening reception on Sunday, September 13 from noon to 2:30pm, the 2015 New Art Group Invitational highlights key works from a variety of New Jersey based artists. Varying greatly in medium, visual approach and subject matter, the exhibit is an opportunity to see the works of some members of the New Art Group members alongside the works of other artist friends whose artist endeavors they admire and respect.

Artists rely heavily on other artists for influence, support and for how others are executing in a medium or style that is similar to theirs, or even radically different from theirs. New Jersey is increasingly the home to a large number of artists who are experimenting with visual media in new ways. There are many examples of how artists worked stylistically with or off on one another, artists such as Pablo



Picasso and George Braque. This exhibit gives the viewers a chance to see how those influences can be obvious or subtle or sometimes not even apparent.

> Statement of Mr. James Sena, President Warren Township Board of Education August 25, 2015

I would like to take a few minutes to talk about Monday afternoon that Ms. Errickson was one of the tragedy that took place in Warren a week ago yesterday. In that incident, Heidi Errickson and her brother Fred died in what can only be described as an act of senseless violence. Heidi was an employee of the Warren Township School District for 13 years. She worked at Central School where she was a multi-duty paraprofessional. She was a dedicated educator who loved children, and who, in turn, was loved by the students at Central. Heidi was a highly valued employee and she will be greatly missed. Words are inadequate at this time to express our deep sorrow, our sadness and our sincere condolences to Heidi's family. I know everyone grader at lunch or watching over a group of joins with me in remembering Heidi and her family in our thoughts and prayers. It is in times like these that you get to see the heart of a professional," said Central School principal Janet community. Having lived here for over 20 years, I can say with certainty that Warren has a very big heart.

> Our community has already come together and, with time, the wounds from this tragedy will heal and our pain will subside. Immediately following the shooting, the school district made counseling available to staff, students, and parents who may have had difficulty dealing with the enormity of this incident. In addition, guidance counselors at each of the schools will be on standby for all those who may need counseling at the start of school.
