



## "RUN FOR RUNAWAYS" EVENT ON NOVEMBER 7

Local 5K/Walk Helps Raise Awareness and Provide a Hopeful Future for Homeless Youth

Each day, more than 1,200 youth run away from home because of issues such as abuse and neglect. Many find themselves homeless or at risk of human trafficking. November is National Runaway Awareness Month – a time to raise awareness on this issue that impacts youth in our communities. Since 1973, Somerset Home, a non-profit organization that provides abused, neglected and homeless youth ages 13-21 with housing, a stable environment, and supportive services, has been making a difference on this issue every day.

On Saturday, November 7, Somerset Home will host its 17th Annual "Run for Runaways" event. The 5K Run and family event, which will take place at Colonial Park in Somerset, is designed to raise awareness about the dangers runaway and homeless youth face. Events include a 5K run, a fitness walk, kids' sprints and activities, entertainment, food, and lots of fun. Proceeds will benefit Somerset Home's Arts and Recreation program to provide an avenue for self-expression and physical activity for homeless youth.

"Somerset Home is a safe haven for vulnerable youth who are taken out of their homes or runaway from issues at home such as abuse and neglect", said David Walker, executive director. "Not only do we provide the basic needs of food, clothing and shelter, we also provide counseling, medical care, and independent-living skills education to help our youth be successful and self-sufficient. Our Run for Runaways event brings people of all ages together to raise awareness and funds for us to



provide support and services for our youth such as combatting human trafficking. We hope we can count on the community to help make this year's run the best one yet."

Advance registration fees are: 5K Race, \$25 (\$20 for USATF members); youth (ages 12-18), \$20; 2-mile walk, \$12; kids' sprints (ages 2-11), \$10. After October 15, registration is \$30 for runners, \$15 for walkers and \$10 for kids' sprints. Onsite registration is \$35.

### **DICTIONARIES ARE COMING TO NORTH PLAINFIELD**

The dictionary has a place in every school child's library and is useful from early elementary school through college. One of North Plainfield's service clubs is helping promote that ideal with their annual Dictionary Project.

The Rotary Club of Plainfield-North Plainfield has just ordered enough dictionaries to give one to every third grade student in North Plainfield and in Plainfield, at a cost of over \$3500.

"We hope to recoup some of the expenditures with grant awards," said club president Ravenell Williams. "We have already received an award of \$860 from our own Rotary District 7510."

Teams of Rotarians and volunteers visit every elementary school in the two communities, visiting third graders in their classrooms or in an assembly setting.

"We always tell the children a little about Rotary and what it means to belong to a service club," said Tom Reedy, chair of the Dictionary Project Committee. "It's amazing to hear them explain the concept of service and of clubs."

Hundreds of smiling children will receive their books sometime beginning in late September. Each school gets one visit of an hour or two from teams of Rotarians and volunteers. The presentations are scheduled at the schools' convenience during morning hours, which sometimes stretches the schedule of visits into November. Volunteers are welcomed, and should contact the club via email at secretary@rotarypnp.org.

# NP FIRE, POLICE & COUNTY EMS CONDUCT DRILL TO KEEP CHILDREN SAFE

Over the summer, the North Plainfield Fire Department jointly participated in a large scale "active shooter drill" with our local police





department at the North Plainfield High School. This mutually beneficial drill was conducted on two days to test the operational effectiveness of the Somerset County Police Emergency Response Plan. Having the opportunity to participate in this drill allowed our fire department to also test and train in the area of mass casualty response for our EMT's, along with our mutual aid EMS agencies.

Due to the logistics involved, the drill planning spanned over several months and was headed by Lieutenant Ciempola of the North Plainfield Police Department. This included many meetings with all of our surrounding emergency response agencies and incorporated various student "role players." From the Fire/EMS aspect, after setting various goals at our planning sessions, our ambulance staffing and fire personnel were able to measure and

assess our effectiveness at this mock scenario. It also tested our on-scene incident management plan where it is necessary to establish a Unified Command structure when multiple agencies are involved. The mock scenario involved an "active shooter" perpetrator who "injured" a number of school students, leaving multiple casualties. Our Fire/EMS personnel would then simulate the appropriate response/treatment/transport for this type of incident, along with mutual aid EMS agencies, all in coordination with the police department after they declared the scene safe.

For the Fire and EMS branch of this drill, the other agencies who participated included, the Watchung Rescue Squad, JFK Hospital BLS and ALS, RWJ-Somerset Hospital BLS and ALS, Atlantic Hospital BLS and Somerset County Emergency Management staff.




