
CHAMBER THANKS SPONSORS FOR HOLIDAY EVENTS



With the New Year upon us, many of us are 3. Volunteer alongside your children. Most kids thinking of ways to improve ourselves as well as our family's wellbeing. Parents not only start the year with the usual dieting and exercise resolutions, but also look to decide how to sharpen those parenting skills so important to the development of their kids!

The Cranford Municipal Alliance wants to help so here's a top ten list we've pulled together from various sources around the world. Pick one, a few or all ten. Focus on what you think will help your kids best. But first, set your objective. Parents have all different objectives or goals for their kids. Whether they are spiritual, academic, social or even sports related; know what you are trying to bring out in your kids so you can help bring out their best.

Second, don't let the daily routine get in the way of your goals. Keep the bigger picture in mind as the day-to-day grind wears on. Whatever your specific goal, the ultimate reward will be someday seeing them stand on their own two feet. Know how your day-to-day words and actions either help or hurt that goal.

Third, don't get discouraged. Some days you will wonder why nothing is working. Daily stress and strife will make it look like you are taking two steps back for every one step forward, but don't despair, they will thank you when they're 35! So, here's a list. We hope it helps in your most important journey - raising your children. Top 10 Parent's New Year's Resolutions

- 1. Make time for family dinner. The importance of family dinner can't be underestimated. Children learn resilience from family stories, knowing they have a long history of ancestors who made it through life despite hardships... and if the family made it, maybe they can too.
- 2. Commit to regular attendance at your house of worship. - 6. Phones off. Don't lower your child's selfesteem by placing your phone ahead of them. Commit to turning the phone off more when children are present.
- 7. TV off. The average American watches over 5 hours of TV a day and over 3 hours on social media. If you're looking for time to keep to your resolutions, you may find it here. Also, commit to keeping your TV and social media age appropriate.
- 8. Commit to being an age appropriate household. Children can't un-watch an image or concept they are too young to process. Violent, overly sexual or other inappropriate material should be reserved for the adults, not children.
- 9. Dance less, demand more. Children learn the dance quickly and know what buttons to push before middle school. Cut through the dance and demand their best. Children live up to expectations.
- 10. Commit to NOT condoning alcohol and being a role model. Children cannot escape the dangers of alcohol just because they are served by parents in a home. Slower reaction time on playing fields, teen depression and increased chance of addictions later in life occur no matter where they drink. Parents

who serve children are committing authority abuse. It's very difficult for children to fight peer pressure and "unspoken" coercing from a parent is virtually impossible. Teach them to listen for code words of authority abuse... 'don't tell your parents', 'it's OK in my house', 'I want to make sure I know what you're doing' are all excuses parents use to pressure kids. Role-play how to say no and report all abuse to authorities. Be a leader by calling out parents who serve.
