OSAGE ORANGE-THEMED DECORATIONS REMAIN UP AT CALDWELL PARSONAGE

The Caldwell Parsonage, still decorated for an for about six months. 18th century-style Christmas, will host open houses on January 10 and January 17 from 2 pm to 5 pm. The house is located at 909 Caldwell Avenue, Union.

The decorations include Osage oranges (a round, green fruit) from an old female Osage orange tree on the Parsonage grounds. (See third picture above.) Osage oranges have a citrus fragrance, are a natural insect repellent, and last



Osage orange trees are not native to New Jersey. Immature Osage trees, planted close to together to form a thicket, were used as windbreaks on the prairies; their wood was used by Native Americans to make bows because it's strong but flexible. Settlers used the Osage orange wood to make wagon wheels for the same reason.

The Osage oranges will be available to visitors while supplies last.



Ask any seventh grade student at Kawameeh Middle School and he or she will tell you that they are both themes in the novel Hoot, by Carl Hiaasen.

The novel, which is about an endeavor to save the environment from a greedy pancake chain restaurant, served as the perfect opportunity to challenge the students to take a stand themselves. After reading the book, Language Arts teachers proposed a deal to their students: raise enough funds to contribute to a worthy cause for the environment, and be rewarded with a pancake breakfast! Students eagerly accepted the task and decided that their donations should go to the Nature Conservancy. As the donation money poured in, a question emerged-where to get enough pancakes to feed over two hundred and fifty children? The answer to this came from a generous manager at the IHOP of Union (Route 22). After hearing about the project, the restaurant jumped on board to support not only the environmental cause, but also the students of Kawameeh Middle School. IHOP provided five hundred pancakes, butter, and syrup for the students to enjoy as a result of their efforts in raising almost two hundred dollars for the Nature Conservancy.










STUDENTS SPREAD HOLIDAY CHEER WITH POSITIVITY


