## **RESIDENT RYAN BONK ACHIEVES EAGLE SCOUT RANK**

In scouting, only 4% of overall boy achieve the rank of Eagle Scout (other statistics show 6%). Even though the percentage has been trending upward over the years, the award is still incredibly rare, making the Eagle Scout rank quite a significant accomplishment in a boy scout's life.

Ryan Bonk, a scout from Troop 177 in Mountainside, achieved the rank of Eagle Scout and was formally recognized by Mayor Paul Mirabelli at the Mountainside Borough Council meeting on December 29, 2015. The mayor read aloud the proclamation recognizing Ryan's accomplishment and his Eagle Scout Project. Ryan received a copy of the proclamation commemorating his achievement.

To earn the Eagle Scout rank a Boy Scout must fulfill requirements in the areas of leadership, service, and outdoor skills. A scout must earn 21 merit badges; plan, develop, and give leadership to others in a service project helpful to the community; and demonstrate that he has lived by the principles of the Scout Oath and Scout Law in his daily life.

Ryan earned 33 Merit badges and completed his service project at the Reeves-Reed Arboretum in Summit, New Jersey.

The Reeves-Reed Arboretum, listed on the National and State Registers of Historic Places, has been a site of architectural, botanical, and historical significance since the American Revolution, and fosters a deep appreciation of nature and history. To support this mission, Ryan's service project aided the Arboretum in improving trail accessibility, thus assisting more visitors to safely and comfortably explore the

#### grounds.

Ryan fundraised for project materials with the help of local businesses. Working with his friends, family, and Boy Scouts from his Troop, he renovated a trail at the Arboretum, which involved adjusting trail size and terrain. The existing wooden stairs, which were rotted, dilapidated and inaccessible required to be dug out and disposed of. They were replaced with new sturdy stairs in order to improve the ease of hiking and trail safety. Ryan also designed, built, and installed benches along the Arboretum trail system. A total of 193 manhours were spent on this project.

Ryan greatly appreciated the assistance of fellow Troop 177 scouts and everyone who helped him in his service project. He also is thankful for the support of the Troop 177 leaders. He is greatly indebted to Mr. Brian Kinney, Saverio Zipeto and local business such as Westfield Lumber & Home Center, Barbera & Barbera, Zappia's Delicatessen, Village Trattoria, Doria Pizzeria, Joe's Pizzeria, Vittoria Ristorante, and IRIS, LLC.

Ryan's Eagle Court of Honor will be conducted in the summer, where he will be further recognized by Troop 177, his family and friends for achieving this special status in scouting. Ryan is currently a freshman at Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, majoring in Chemical Engineering.

### **GIRL SCOUTS' "ADOPT-A-FIRE-HYDRANT" PROJECT AIDS FIREFIGHTERS DURING SNOW STORMS**

It began as a project to earn their Girl Scout Jill said. Silver Award, but the more 13-year-old twin sisters Jill and Allie Zimmermann of Mountainside spoke to local volunteer firefighters they realized the importance of their endeavors, the girls decided to continue their work. The girls' project was to ask residents to join the "Adopt-a-Fire-Hydrant" program by committing to shovel out the fire hydrants on or near their properties following a snow storm.

"We have a fire hydrant in front of our house and we always shoveled it out when it snowed. However, often when riding through town, we'd see those fire hydrant markers sticking out of the snow with the hydrant buried," explained Jill. "Allie and I then decided to take this on as our project."

What really convinced the girls that this was a great project was a meeting they had with Firefighter Samantha Grindlinger of the Mountainside Volunteer Fire Department. "She emphasized how important it was for firefighters to have immediate access to the hydrant in the event of a fire and how many times through the years they've come across snowed in hydrants. We knew this was a good project that not only could earn us our Silver Award, but could also save lives and property in the case of a winter fire," Allie noted.

The Cadette Scouts got a map from the Fire Department showing where the hydrants were located and then verified the names and addresses of the property owners at those sites from the Town Hall Tax Office. They reached out by mail to those residents and were able to secure a 35 percent adoption rate.

"We were aware of the fact that some homeowners, whether because of age or disability, would be unable to participate in the program so we asked them if they could ask their neighbor to make the commitment. The project was met with enthusiasm from most people because they realized the importance of having immediate access to a hydrant in case of a fire,"

Allie noted that because of the warm start to this winter, people might not be thinking about shoveling out fire hydrants, but she doesn't expect the warm weather to last and believes the snow will come. "We want to increase our data base of people committed to keeping the hydrants open and accessible to the firefighters. They respond to fires all times of day and night and they cannot do their jobs without quick and easy access to water. It takes between seven and 10 minutes to dig out a fire hydrant buried in snow. Those minutes can save lives and property," she explained.


Prior to the start of the project, the girls attended a meeting of the Mayor and Council to explain their project. Once they received the approval of the town officials, they were able to secure a grant from the Watts Foundation to cover the costs of the initial mailings. "We'd like to thank everyone who helped us get this project off the ground. It turned out to be a great community effort," Jill and Allie agreed.

## **DEERFIELD SCHOOL'S NEW MEDIA CENTER**

Among other referendum project updates...

Wednesday, January 20 the newly renovated Deerfield School Media Center in Mountainside had its Grand Opening. The ribbon cutting took place in the morning and in the evening the Mountainside community was invited to an open house. The media center is part of a three year 19 million dollar referendum project, 40% of which was offset by State ROD grants.

The media center contains five new instructional spaces, including a children's reading room, a state of the art technology lab, and traditional classroom space. All the rooms have wireless internet access that is compatible with the one to one Chromebook program. In addition there is a handicapped accessible bathroom and rear entrance. The media center will be available for use by the community after school hours and in the evenings.

In addition to the media center, both Deerfield and Beechwood have already seen many improvements and upgrades in the last year. Both schools now have new fully insulated roofs (with 30 year warranties), new roof gutters and leaders, new rooftop HVAC units (7 at Deerfield and 11 at Beechwood), a new phone system, new IP security cameras, and a complete replacement of the network infrastructure including a new fiber optic connection between the schools. The internet speeds to the internal servers in both buildings have increased fivefold.

Beechwood now has a new web based energy management program and new gymnasium lighting. Deerfield now has 8 new boys/girls bathrooms, 12 new roof top exhaust fans, a

renovated front entrance and front offices, and brand new boys and girls locker rooms in the gym. Deerfield School is now completely asbestos free with the exception of a few classrooms to be competed in the summer of 2016.

Among the remaining projects in process this year are the installation of new exterior classroom and hallway doors (Deerfield), the card swipe access system (both schools), and window replacement at Deerfield. In the summer of 2016, the corridors at Deerfield will be upgraded. The HVAC unit ventilators, including a web based energy management system, will be replaced at both schools.










