Fourth graders at Angelo L. Tomaso School were treated to a lively demonstration of gravitational pull, Newton's Laws of Motion and other scientific fun on Jan. 6.

"Gravity doesn't care how massive an object is," said Joe Talento of the Franklin Institute's Traveling Science Show, as he tossed balls of different sizes and weight to a willing volunteer.

Talento recruited additional 4th graders from an enthusiastic gathering to help him illustrate inertia, action-reaction and the scientific formula, F=ma (Force = Mass times Acceleration). "Sir Isaac Newton had three special rules or laws of science," he explained.

The Franklin Institute in Philadelphia offers traveling shows covering a wide variety of scientific topics, including astronomy, energy, the human body and flight. The ALT PTO has sponsored visits by the Traveling Science Show for several years. This year's interactive assembly focused on the basic physics of motion.

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WARREN MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN A MOCK TRIAL

Warren Middle School students received a real life lesson on the judicial system as they took part in a mock trial on Dec. 21 at the Warren Township Municipal Court, presided over by the Honorable Mark Adler.

Thirty-four 7th and 8th graders – who participate in the Enrichment Education (E2) program at the middle school – presented two civil cases before Judge Adler, who shared expert advice on courtroom procedures and the legal process.

Some of the students acted as prosecutors and defense attorneys in the courtroom, while others served as trial jurors or took the stand as witnesses in the two cases written by the E2 group. The first case focused on racial discrimination and was followed by arguments surrounding the issue of faulty vehicle seatbelts and the resulting death of a child.

"Our students receive a developmentally appropriate introduction to law through the mock trial process that culminates at the Warren courthouse with a real life court experience under the guidance of Judge Adler," says E2 teacher Dr. Susan Cooper.

This early exposure to the justice system also helps the group as they create an original mock trial case this month to enter into the Law Adventure, a free educational mock trial competition held each May by the New Jersey State Bar Foundation (NJSBF). Warren Middle School E2 students have been among the contest's winners 6 times in previous years.

ROLLER COASTER PHYSICS AND FUN

Seventh graders in Mary Pat Brown's Innovation and Design class at Warren Middle School recently were faced with a unique challenge... to save the failing amusement park in Warren by designing and building a roller coaster guaranteed to boost revenue by coaxing thrill seekers back to the park.

The amusement park, of course, is fictional. But the assignment is very real. Students worked in pairs to draw a plan to scale, using a requisition form to calculate the cost of their paper roller coaster's framework and tracks.

Working within a "budget" of \$35, (the cost of a column, for example, was 50 cents while each stretch of track was \$1.00), the budding engineers were given certain construction and design criteria, then set free to figure out the right combination of fun and physics.

"We started here with straight red track to get the most kinetic energy possible," said 7th grader Hunter Miller, as she and Kaitlyn Loia presented their coaster to the class on Jan. 8.

According to "A Framework for K-12 Science Education," the foundation for the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) which New Jersey plans to officially implement next September in grades 6-12 and in grades K-5 the following year, "the practices of engineering have much in common with the practices of science, although engineering design has a different purpose and product than scientific inquiry."

Each of Brown's 7th grade teams took a turn demonstrating their roller coaster while classmates listened and critiqued, providing positive feedback on ways to improve upon the design.

"The 7th Grade Paper Roller Coaster project is new curriculum that I developed and piloted during the 3rd (elective) cycle. The project was designed to challenge students as they used the Engineering Design Process," says Brown, about the series of steps engineers take to come up with a solution to a problem.

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BOARD OF EDUCATION APPROVES NEW SUPERINTENDENT

The Warren Township Board of Education at its Jan. 19 meeting approved Matthew Mingle as the new superintendent of Warren Township Schools. Mingle, currently Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction for Madison Public Schools, will begin his new position on July 1.

"Having spent most of my career in Somerset County, I was well aware of the excellent reputation of the Warren Township schools. The opportunity to join a community that believes in the power of a strong public school system is very exciting," says Mingle. "With so many great things already in place, I know there are high expectations for everyone involved and I can't wait to be a part of that energy."

Mingle began his career in education as a social studies teacher at Ridge High School in Bernards Township and later, in the Montgomery Township School District. In 2010, he became supervisor of social studies and the Reach program at Hillsborough Township Public Schools, a K-12 administrative position he held for three years.

The New Jersey native, who has lived in Somerset County for more than a decade, has a Bachelor of Arts in History Education, a Master of Science in Educational Administration and expects to receive his Ed.D in Teacher Leadership in May from Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, where his research has focused on gifted education.

"We take great pride in appointing Matt Mingle to the position of Warren Township Superintendent," says Board president Tia Allocco. "Our decision was guided by the Leadership Profile which was generated by feedback from administrators, staff, and community members. Matt is a highly motivated professional with particular expertise in communication, curriculum development and classroom instruction. "

As Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction in Madison, Mingle developed a five-year curriculum renewal plan, implemented a new professional development model, oversaw the implementation of new teacher/administrator evaluation systems and supervised PARCC testing while creating a monthly newsletter called Submitted by Mary Ann McGann

"A Walk in the PARCC" to communicate with staff and the community.

"I am proud of these efforts because they have opened an incredible dialogue not only in Madison but across the state," he says. The New Jersey Department of Education shares his PARCC newsletter via Twitter each month.

"Matt is a proven leader who has successfully implemented continuous improvement initiatives in high achieving districts," Allocco says. "The Board of Education has every confidence that working together with our staff and community, Matt will build on our many strengths and move us to new heights."

Mingle believes strongly in "the whole child as a fundamental guidepost in my educational world."

"Despite constant reform efforts, we know what works in public education," he says. "The Whole Child approach provides a framework and a name for what all educators know in their hearts – 'Each child, in each school, in each community is healthy, safe, engaged, supported, and challenged.' When that aim is the reality, students thrive. As a guidepost, the Whole Child provides a lens through which we can examine challenging situations and make critical decisions with the best interests of the children we serve in mind."

This means that "a narrow focus on academic achievement, especially when it is measured only by standardized test scores, is insufficient," Mingle adds. "Instead, we must think about the long-term development of children and how our educational system is preparing them to be good citizens."

Mingle holds leadership positions in several professional organizations, including as president-elect of the New Jersey chapter of ASCD, an international association devoted to professional development, educational leadership and innovative programs. He loves to travel, both as a chaperone for seven summers with the People to People Student Ambassador Program and on his own. And he's an avid supporter of marching bands.

"The day I was offered my first teaching job in May 2003, I asked the principal of Ridge High School to introduce me to the marching band director. Since that day, I have not gone a year

without being involved with marching bands in New Jersey. I find the arts in general and marching band more specifically, provide the structure and commitment requirements needed for many adolescents to grow and develop as leaders and good citizens,' says Mingle. "My career has rapidly taken me from the classroom to higher levels of district administration; however, I still love being active on the marching band field every fall."

Mingle succeeds Dr. Tami Crader, who resigned last July to accept a position as superintendent in the Neptune Township School District. In the interim, longtime administrator and educator Dr. Elizabeth Nastus has been serving as superintendent of Warren Township Schools.







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
