IMAGINE SUSTAINABILITY AND NEW SPACE CAMPAIGN

Over 60 guests and volunteers turned out Thursday evening February 11th, despite the frigid cold, for the Public Kickoff of Imagine's Campaign for Sustainability and New Space, a \$3.5 Million 3 year campaign. The event was held at 1154 Rt. 22 West in Mountainside one of the possible new locations for Imagine's future dedicated space of its own.

In attendance were Marilyn and Lou Stiglitz who have made a three-year pledge to Imagine in memory of their daughter Susan Lang who died of leukemia at age 14. "I feel it is a wonderful place for young people to express themselves. It gives them a place to belong and to heal after losing a loved one in their family," said Mrs. Stiglitz about her pledge of support. "In my own case in losing my daughter, it would have been wonderful to have a safe haven for my son to have friends with whom he could relate some of his feelings of loss."

"We are so grateful to the Stiglitz for their extraordinary gift and pledge of support. The Opening Circle Room at Imagine will be named after Susan Lang. This is one of the most sacred spaces at Imagine and is where all of the families meet on each Night of Support for pizza supper and the important Opening Circle Ritual. It is also where all the families gather at the end of the evening for the closing circle ritual. This incredible donation, our first Naming Gift, comes at critical time in our organization's growth. Imagine currently serves over 200 children and adults every two weeks in its peer support groups for children coping with loss due to death at our

current location at First United Methodist Church in Westfield. As it became apparent we would out grow our space within the year, last year Imagine's Board of Trustees launched the silent phase of our Campaign for Sustainability and a Space of Our Own" said Mary Robinson, Imagine Founder and Executive Director. "In order to be able to serve more families and keep up with the need for grief support we knew we would need to find a new location."

"First United Methodist Church has been our home for three and a half years and we have been incredibly fortunate to have been able to launch our program there, right in the heart of Westfield, said Stuart Arnold, Imagine Board Chair. Imagine was launched in 2011 with an initial grant from Dr. Gerry Glasser through the The Glasser Foundation, whose vision it was to make grief support available and accessible to the children and families in his beloved town of Westfield and all surrounding communities. The Foundation has continued to provide extraordinarily generous annual support to Imagine, which has been instrumental in our ability to grow and thrive. "As we get ready to move to a new space dedicated to serving grieving children and families, we invite everyone's participation and encourage you to contact Imagine to find out how you can help."

Imagine is a free year-round peer grief support center located in Westfield, NJ and serving all of Union County and beyond. Imagine serves children age 3-18 who has had a parent or sibling die, with concurrent support groups for their

LOCATING HIDDEN MARITAL ASSETS IN DIVORCE

One of the greatest concerns to individuals who are divorcing or contemplating divorce is the possibility that their spouse is hiding or dissipating assets. While such conduct may be the exception rather than the rule such actions on the part of one spouse can have extreme financial consequences to the detriment of the other.

In those cases where there is a basis for suspicion, as experienced matrimonial attorneys we at Lindabury can take the initial steps to investigate whether a spouse is attempting to hide marital assets. In those divorces were the suspicion is confirmed, we may recommend the use of a forensic accountant, investigative expert, or an "IT" (information technology) professional to discover the extent to which this conduct has occurred Lindabury's Family Law Group has decades of experience advocating on behalf of clients involved in contentious divorces.

KNOW THE SIGNS Hiding marital assets can be an attempt by one spouse to gain the upper hand in a divorce. Some of the more common signs are regular and consistent withdrawal of cash from a checking account or at an ATM, unexplained travel expenses, payments to unknown parties or representing clients in divorce and other serious New Jersey debt for reasons of which you are unfamiliar or unaware.

When a divorcing spouse senses that the hiding or dissipating of assets is occurring, it is important to obtain

copies of any and all financial records and documents. Such documents often disappear or are destroyed soon after attorneys are engaged and can sometimes be difficult or expensive to obtain from their original source. Bank account statements (checking or savings), brokerage statements and tax returns can indicate to an attorney or forensic accountant whether or not assets are being unfairly depleted.

The use of electronic discovery has made it significantly easier to uncover this type of covert behavior by a spouse. But be aware that there are proper and improper methods to obtaining electronic information. While it is permissible to conduct Internet searches and review the public social media sites of spouses, it is illegal to "hack" into a spouse's password-protected bank account, social media page or other similar account or page. There can be criminal penalties for doing so. Moreover, a spouse would lose all credibility before the Court if they attempted to introduce evidence consisting of illegally obtained information. It is best to obtain this information after consultation with an attorney and/or through the use of an IT professional.

Journalism II teacher Nicole Scimone explained that her class decided to produce the commemorative issue by writing about "the biggest story trends from the last 80 years, with a page for each decade of Hi's Eye existence."

In comparing the articles which have appeared throughout the decades to now, teacher and Co-Advisor, Warren Hynes, describes the current Hi's Eye approach as "getting more into the how and why behind the news."

With the exception of this special edition, Hi's Eye is produced by Journalism III students, who are seniors who have completed Journalism I usually in 10th grade, and Journalism II typically enrolled by 11th graders.

Hi's Eye annually is the recipient of top medals by the Columbia and National Scholastic Press Associations awards.

"Celebrating 80 years of a curriculum that strengthens writing skills, encourages communication and debate, and earns awards is a great accomplishment, "stated Superintendent of Schools, Margaret Dolan. "I congratulate past and current students and staff of Hi's Eye on an anniversary worthy of celebration," she added.
