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ROTARY CLUB SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

The Rotary Club of Plainfield- North Plainfield recently presented scholarship awards to twenty-three graduating seniors at North Plainfield High School and at Plainfield High School..

The Rotary club awarded \$11,000 in scholarships to graduating seniors at North Plainfield High School, \$16,860 to seniors at Plainfield High School, and another \$11,000 through the Adele deLeeuw Scholarship Fund.

The local club sponsors its own F. S. Mathewson Rotary Scholarship, awarding a total of \$8,000 to students in the two high schools in its service area. "Eight scholarships were awarded in memory of Matty Mathewson, the first member of our club to serve as District Governor," said club president Ravenell Williams IV.

The Rotary club targets the Mathewson Scholarship award to members of the North Plainfield High School Interact Club, the youth service club of Rotary.

"Members of Interact work very hard on many service projects of their own, including highly successful blood drives, community youth activities, food bank support, and many others," said Mr. Williams. "The members also work at our Club's garden plots at the Giving Garden in Warren, helping us raise fresh vegetables for the hungry. They also help us raise money during the year for our scholarship program, giving rise to recognition of that hard work with these special scholarships."

The Mathewson Rotary Scholarships were presented to Brenda Okereke, Molly Appezzato, Marisol Hernandez, and Helen Pazmino Nunez. Brenda Okereke also received the Paul Henry Memorial Scholarship, a late member of the Rotary Club. The award was presented by Paul's widow, Joan Henry, and their two sons.

Three North Plainfield high school students both current and former graduates received a total of \$7,500 in scholarships from the Adele DeLeeuw Scholarship Fund at a dinner held Wednesday, June 8th, at the Spain Inn in Piscataway. The scholarships are financed by a bequest from Adele DeLeeuw, longtime Plainfield resident, author of 75 books, journalist, and arts activist.

Brenda Okereke was the scholarship recipient from the graduating class of 2016. The Scholarship Fund also provided a continuing scholarship to college student Melody Njoku. This year's Adele DeLeeuw Senior Scholars, college students who were recognized as a scholarship recipient from the Fund for each of their four years in college included Charlotte Brockway. An additional nineteen students from area high schools received scholarships from the Fund.

The Club also awards scholarships on behalf of the Plainfield Foundation, a community-based non-profit that awards funding to benefit local community groups. This year, the Rotarians awarded \$4,000 from the Leo Albert Friese Scholarship Fund to North Plainfield High students Jasmine Chavez and John Hatala. The Friese Scholarships are awarded to graduating seniors who will pursue a major course of study in science.

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

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RECORDS BROKEN AT ROTARY TRACK AND FIELD MEET

The Rotary Club's meet has been held annually since 1924, with a three year break during World War 2 and several meets cancelled due to weather. Started as an organized meet for elementary school students, the meet shifted to the high school level to provide a friendly competition for area students. Later, when high schools began competing through a statewide system of athletic events, the Rotary meet shifted to the middle school grades.


Invitations went out to area schools in early May, with nearly 300 students registered for the Meet. Due to a scheduling snafu, two schools were unable to attend and one arrived late, after the coaches and athletes walked to the meet. "We were unable to wait for them to arrive and started the Meet on time," said Meet Director Michael Townley. "With buses scheduled for specific pick-up times, it was imperative that we stayed on schedule. The good news is that a number of the late arrivals were still able to compete in their scheduled events, winning twenty-five awards and even setting one new record."

Several of the judges were able to re-arrange the order of events to accommodate the late arrivals. One beneficiary of that juggling was Cadene Rose of Maxson Middle School. Cadene set a record in the long jump for twelve year old girls with a jump of 15' 3.5", breaking the previous record of 15' 2" held by Danielle Jensen of Valley View School that stood since 2004.

Another record-setting effort occurred in the high jump, where Vincent Rizzi of Valley View School cleared the crossbar at 5' 4", a full four inches over the record held since 2002 by Kenny Miller of Maxson Middle School.

"Over the years, we have had the privilege of hosting a number of young athletes who have gone on to set state and national records and win medals in Olympic competitions, including the late Milt Campbell, Olympic decathlon champion," said Meet Director Townley. "More recently, Nicole Sims and Kim Hicks were two outstanding athletes who achieved state championships in the shot put and went on to even more awards.

"But more important than hosting future greats



is our ability to give any interested student athlete the opportunity to compete against their peers, sometimes for the very first time. I have been doing this for over twenty-five years, and one of the joys of that long history is meeting young men and women who tell me that they competed in our meets when they were in high school or middle school. Even in their thirties and forties and older, their smiles are just as big as the day they competed at the Rotary Track and Field Meet."

Members of the Club and their friends offered their services as officials and judges for an afternoon of friendly, but determined competition by the young 12, 13 and 14 year-old athletes. They were supported by members of the Interact Club at North Plainfield High School who also filled key roles, such as judges, timers, and field event assistants. Interact is the youth-based service club sponsored by Rotary International.

"We are so grateful to our family members and friends and our Interact Club members who come out to help us with this youth service project," said Ravenell Williams, president of the Rotary Club. "There are so many positions to fill that we could not do it without their help. And our Interact members are just wonderful!"

Medals were awarded to first, second and third place finishers in all events except the relays, where ribbons were awarded to second and third place finishers. All participating schools took home medals or ribbons.

The Track and Field Meet was held at the Hub Stine Athletic Complex in Plainfield through the cooperation of the Plainfield Board of Education. "We have to commend the groundskeepers at Hub Stine for their help," said Tom Reedy, a Rotarian and the chief judge of the high jump events. "Every year they go above and beyond to prepare the fields for us and to help us bring in our materials and set up for the events. We sincerely appreciate their hard work." Coincidentally, the complex's namesake was a longtime member and secretary of the Rotary Club.

The Rotary Club of Plainfield-North Plainfield expects to offer the 90th Annual Track and Field Meet next year at the Plainfield site on the first Wednesday of June. The public is welcome and encouraged to attend and support the young athletes.

GRANTS TO HELP ADULT LITERACY AWARDED

Somerset County Library System of New Jersey has been awarded a \$99,084 grant from The New Jersey Department of Labor and Workforce Development to provide 84 adult community members with basic skills training through an Adult Literacy and Community Library Partnership Pilot Program.

SCLSNJ, in partnership with The New Jersey Department of Labor and Workforce Development, identified a need to provide adult basic skills training that would lead to greater employment opportunities and/or career advancement for NJ residents in need of jobs, as well as those in low-wage, lower-skilled occupations. According to the grant, "To effectively maintain sustainable employment, entry-level workers must be equipped with the skills necessary to meet the increasing demands of the workplace." With that in mind, the goal of the Adult Literacy and Community Library Partnership Program is to provide adults with educational opportunities to acquire and improve the literacy skills necessary to become selfsufficient and to participate effectively as productive workers, family members, and citizens.

In order to expertly provide these adult basic education classes, which will prepare students to take a high school equivalency exam, SCLSNJ will work closely with the Hunterdon-Somerset Title II Consortium, an organization that includes Hunterdon County Educational Services Commission, The Jointure, and Franklin Township Board of Education.

Designed to improve the English language proficiency and adult basic education skills of those adults who are unemployed, underemployed, or needing remedial instruction in Somerset County and the surrounding area, the program will emphasize preparation for high school equivalency testing. Additionally, the program will promote life and workplace skills, family literacy, civics, digital literacy, and job readiness skills. English for speakers of other languages classes will focus on conversation, grammar, citizenship, and life skills.

The Adult Literacy and Community Library Partnership Pilot Program will take place at SCLSNJ's Bound Brook Memorial Library, Manville Library, and North Plainfield Memorial Library branches. A summer session and a fall session will be offered. Summer session dates and times are:

Tuesdays and Thursdays, July 5th-August 25th, 6-8:30 p.m.at SCLSNJ's Manville Library branch, located at 100 S. 10th Avenue in Manville. Registration and assessment will be held July 5, 6-8:30 p.m.

Tuesdays and Thursdays, July 5th-August 25th, 6-8:30 p.m. at SCLSNJ's Bound Brook Memorial Library branch, located at 402 E. High Street in Bound Brook. Registration and assessment will be held July 5, 6-8:30 p.m.

Mondays and Wednesdays, July 6th-September 12th (no class July 11), 6-8:30 p.m. at SCLSNJ's North Plainfield Memorial Library branch, located at 6 Rockview Avenue in North Plainfield. Registration and assessment will be held July 6, 6-8:30 p.m.

Fall session dates and times will be announced at a later date. All classes are free and participants ages 18 and over will be able to register the first day of class on a first come, first served basis.
