## **SUMMIT-NEW PROVIDENCE ROTARY AWARDS SCHOLARSHIPS**

The Summit - New Providence Rotary has awarded \$20,900 in scholarships to seven graduating high school seniors from the two communities. It is the 91st consecutive year that the group has awarded scholarships.

Criteria for the awards are academic achievement, community and school involvement, and financial need.

In announcing the awards, Rotary member Ellen Dickson said, "These young people already exhibit high levels of achievement. We're not taking a chance on them; they've already shown themselves to be winners." Ms Dickson chaired the scholarship committee, consisting of five Rotarians. The high school guidance departments coordinate distribution and processing of the students' applications, but the choice of winners is made by Rotary.

These students received Rotary scholarships: Summit High School - Samantha Hanley, University of Indiana; Juliana Nociara, NYU, John Berardi, College of New Jersey; Ife Campbell, University of New Haven; Aila Poticano, Rutgers; ; Lorik Berisha, New Providence High School, Rutgers; and Cindy Weng, Union County Magnet School, NYU.

Summit Rotary was founded in 1922 and later grew to include New Providence. In addition to its community service projects, the club's major thrust is scholarships for collegebound seniors from Summit and New Providence.

### 4TH ANNUAL BIKERS FOR BROOKE

On June 12, 2016 hundreds of bikers gathered at the New Providence Community Pool parking lot, to register and cruise through town and the surrounding communities. These biker enthusiasts revved up their engines and toured through each town, escorted by the Blue Knights NJ VIII Honor Guard for the Bikers for Brooke Ride. This annual event was founded four years ago by the Brooke Healey foundation in memory of Brooke Healey, who was diagnosed with Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma(DIPG).

The bike ride lasted just over 2 hours and ended at the Mount Carmel Hall in Berkeley Heights, NJ, where catered BBQ, live Music, and games were available. The BBQ acts as a fundraising tool. According to staff at the Brooke Healey Foundation, the annual event would not be possible without the Mount Carmel Society.

According to the Brooke Healey foundation "DIPG is an inoperable, very aggressive tumor in the middle of the brain stem." Brooke sadly passed away on January 14, 2013, from DIPG.

Part of the Brooke Healey Foundation's mission is to raise awareness, and this event accomplished its goal and in addition, raised much needed funds for research and assistance to families in need, dealing with DIPG. Since its conception The Brooke Healey Foundation has raised over \$600,000 and as a member of the DIPG collaborative, "a collection of foundations with the common interest of inspiring research into the cure of DIPG with the belief that through a cure for DIPG, significant advances in other cancer research will be made," according to the DIPG.org, The Brooke Healey Foundation has influence where the money is allocated in terms of research.

While the Brooke Healey Foundation started locally and is based out of New Providence it now has, through the DIPG Collaborative, a national reach.z

The foundation holds 3 major fundraising events annually. Their next event is a golf outing to be held at New Jersey National Golf Club on August 22nd, 2016.

While the Brooke Healey Foundation has gained major grounds raising funds and awareness for DIPG research, they believe their work will not be completed until they've accomplish their ultimate goal, a cure for DIPG.

The New Providence Police Department participated in the Law Enforcement Torch Run held on June 10th. The event was sparked in 1982 when Offer Steven Vitale was asked to photograph a local Special Olympics competition in New Jersey. Officer Vitale was amazed by the dedication these athletes displayed, so he challenged his fellow officers to show the same type of determination by volunteering at the summer games.

The birth of the Torch Run came in 1984 with a run that began in Liberty State Park in Jersey City to Rutgers Stadium in New Brunswick. The first run raised \$7,000.

Since then, with the help of police departments like New Providence, over 3-million dollars is raised annually and over 3,000 officers participate. New Providence took the efforts a bit further this year and involved local high school students in the run.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT NEW PROVIDENCE, NEW JERSEY

During the overnight hours of Memorial Day Weekend, a vehicle was taken from the driveway of a Borough residence. During the same time frame, at least 3 other vehicles were entered and various items were taken. In all instances the vehicles were believed to be unlocked. Theses thefts were reported in the area of Central Avenue near the Summit border. We have previously reminded residents and their guests to remove their key fobs used in conjunction with a push to start ignition. Our investigation reveals that these vehicles are being targeted. Residents are asked to contact the police department if they see or


