RAHWAY'S OWN SPECIAL OLYMPICS HOLDS SPECIAL PLACE IN THE COMMUNITY'S HEART

Egg Races! Parachute Fun! Pin the Clothes on the Line! Scooter Runs! An impressive 102 young athletes ranging from Pre-K to 6th Grade, with a variety of personal challenges, showed great prowess and excitement in these and similar activities at Rahway's Recreation Center on May 20, 2016.

With Rahway High School students and cadets from the MCJROTC program on hand to support competitors them, the young enthusiastically cheered on by Rahway's Mayor Samson Steinman, Superintendent of Schools Dr. Patricia Camp, District School Principals, Supervisors and public workers.

The event, organized and run for the last 12 years by Rahway High School teacher Trish Williams, was created to allow these special athletes from Roosevelt and Madison Schools to enjoy a day of competition free from prejudice based on their disabilities. Ms. Williams adds, "Since there are no similar programs in town for them, this is the closest many of them get to being on a sports team."

Among the over 30 community sponsors for this especially endearing event were the Rahway Education Association, Century 21 JRS Realty, RSI Insurance and the Rahway Dept. of Public Works. T-shirts, goodie bags and promotional giveaways for each athlete and volunteer were generously donated. Former and current board members, along with RHS alumni, provided lunch for 200 people. Pepsico was equally gracious in providing all beverages for the event. Ms. Williams is quick to affirm, as well, that "Without our community's support, this yearly program could never take place. All these gifts assure that no additional financial burden would be placed on our Board of Education."

"To watch the compassion, caring and encouraging attitudes from the RHS students was a privilege for me to see," offers Guidance Counselor Nicole Gleason who was present to photograph the athletes' activities. "To witness everyone working together to create such an







amazing atmosphere filled with laughter and fun made me feel so proud to be part of something much bigger." Junior Sephora Delice added, "It was an unforgettable experience. Seeing how happy the kids were really made my heart feel full." Master Sgt, Mintz offered perhaps the best summation of this memorable day, "Ms. Williams should be recognized for her enthusiasm, her dedication and her sense of caring for our special needs Olympians. All the kids did an amazing job in keeping their young competitors enthusiastic and totally involved."



and service.





6TH GRADE VIRTUAL LAB

Sixth grade students in Mrs. Nicole Brighouse's class at Franklin school in Rahway participated in a Virtual lab through the Students 2 Science program based in East Hanover, NJ. Students 2 Science is an innovative program that links local classrooms to working scientists by bringing challenging STEM based experiments to the classroom.

Mrs. Brighouse's 6th grade classroom was turned into a functioning lab environment. An experiment was then led virtually, via video conferencing, by a scientist at the East Hanover lab facility and facilitated in the classroom by a volunteer Merck scientist.

The students conducted an experiment entitled "Glow it up". Students worked with their lab partners, under the guidance of the virtual scientist and Merck scientist present in the class, to investigate the best method for illuminating a space without the presence of a spark. This led into a lesson on "glow sticks" and an experiment which explained how the glow sticks work. Not only did the Franklin students gain scientific knowledge they were connected with a professional scientist who demonstrated to them the inner workings of a real laboratory and revealed what it looks like doing actual scientific experiments for a living.







THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ESTABLISHED BEFORE THE UNITED STATES, DATES BACK 275 YEARS

This year, the First Presbyterian Church is celebrating 275 years of Christian ministry in Rahway. Founded in 1741, First Pres. has the longest tenure of any institution in the history of the city.

The four settlements of Rahway, Leesville (also called Lower Rahway), Bridgetown, Upper Rahway, and Milton, developed shortly after the founding of Elizabethtown and Woodbridge both of which date back to the 1660s. For the next seven decades, the inhabitants of the Rahway area had to travel to the two larger communities to conduct business or to participate in religious services. For religious groups, making the long trek to either city every Sunday was difficult at best, but during the winter of 1741, a time referred to as the "Hard Winter," it became impossible. It was during that season that the Rahway Presbyterians made a formal request to organize their own church.

The construction of a sanctuary commenced in the summer of 1741 and was completed within the next year. It was built on St. Georges Avenue across from Union Street on the present grounds of the Rahway Cemetery. The location of the structure is clearly outlined by the position of the grave stones which stood on the north, south, and west sides of the church. This first church was two stories high and constructed of heavy timbers. A bell tower rose from the roof and was topped with a copper weathercock. During the Revolutionary War, the weather vane was damaged when a musket ball was shot through it. Church rolls listed members who were New Englanders, Scottish Presbyterians, those of Irish and Welsh extraction, Puritans, Covenanters, and Quakers.

For the first six years, sermons were given by visiting preachers. In 1748, Aaron Richards became the spiritual leader and remained in that position for the next forty-three years. His length of service is still the longest in the church's history.

In the mid-1770s, the Revolutionary War

began bringing with it hardships and loss of life to the church. As a group, the Presbyterians were hostile towards the British who considered a Presbyterian and a rebel to be one and the same. Pastor Richards, an ardent patriot, was forced to flee to South Hanover to escape capture and imprisonment. While there, he continued to speak out against English rule and returned to Rahway only after his safety was no longer jeopardized.

A famous patriot, who was a member of the church, was Abraham Clark, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. A large granite monument marks his grave in the church cemetery.

In the years following the war, membership in the church increased and by 1830 it became apparent that a new and larger sanctuary was needed. A seventeen acre lot that encompassed the area from the corner of Grand Avenue and Church Street all the way back to the river had been left to the congregation by Pastor Richards. Ground was broken for a new church in May 1831. Job Squier and Samuel Oliver each gave \$5,000.00 to help defray the \$14,600.00 construction cost. The church, which was patterned after the Third Church in Newark, and minister's home, which was built next to the church, were both dedicated on February 5, 1832.

As all parts of the city continued to grow, neighborhoods became populated enough to be able to support their own churches. By the 1840s, members of First Pres. who lived in Lower Rahway began to consider organizing a congregation that would be located closer to their homes. Discussions were held and on November 9, 1849 the way was made clear "with deep brotherly regard, cooperation, fellowship, and true Christian spirit" to organize the Second Presbyterian Church in Lower Rahway.

From the mid-19th century, the history of First Pres. continued to illustrate a congregation whose enthusiasm never waned and whose mission always encouraged improvement and refinement. In 1912, Mrs. William Squier donated a \$6,000 organ to replace the old water-powered organ the church had been using since 1875. The congregation paid tribute to Mrs. Squier on December 6, 1926, when a new Community House, built behind the church, was dedicated to her memory. A new residence for the minister was built on Union Street and was dedicated on January 1, 1938. In 1967, many changes and modernization work took place. Improvements were made to the Community House, extensive renovations were made in the church sanctuary, and a new building, Davis Fellowship Hall, was added to the property. This large addition was named in honor of the Reverend Chester M. Davis, who served faithfully for thirty-six years (1922-1958).

The church was recognized as a historic site in 1974 by the Historical Sites Commission of the Presbyterian Historical Society. On January 29, 2012, after 160 years of faithful ministry, the congregation of Second Pres. reunited with the mother church marking a "New Dawn" in the history of Presbyterianism in Rahway. In 2016, the year of its 275 anniversary, First Pres. is a welcoming church that is actively engaged in creating a multi-cultural and multi-racial community of faith, striving to be a living testimony of Christ in the world.





WASPS AND YELLOW JACKETS

Throughout the centuries humans have learned to fear wasps, with good reason. When disturbed, wasps render a quick and painful response. After

stinging a victim, wasps keep their stingers intact, enabling them to repeat the attack on their target multiple times, while alerting the rest of the colony to join in.

Hornets, Yellow-jackets, Polistes, Mud daubers and Cicada killers are all wasps, considered a beneficial insect because they feed on other destructive insects around the home grounds and in gardens. No matter how beneficial wasps are to the environment they also attack us, so their nests should be destroyed when they build them close to where we live and children play.


The type of wasp can be identified by the nest they build. Polistes, also known as paper wasp and Hornets build their nest above ground in trees, shrubbery and under eaves.

Mud daubers nest under eaves, porch roofs and behind shutters, but not in trees.

Cicada killers nest in the ground and will not usually attack humans.

Yellow-jackets mostly nest in the ground but will take advantage of many other nesting sites they find.

Yellow jackets are one of the most feared wasps in our area. In the early summer, yellow jackets feed mainly on insects, but as the season changes so does their diet. By September yellow jackets feed on meat which makes them an unwelcomed and aggressive visitor at picnics and BBO's.

Whatever you do, don't spray a nest during the day when the colony is on the alert to defend itself, especially if children, pets and other humans are nearby.

Warn everyone to stay away and if possible rope off the area. Then make plans to spray the nest at night when wasps are least able to defend themselves. Before spraying, make sure you have a quick and safe escape route from the area.




