## SUSAN BOYKIN SWORN IN AS FOSTER CHILD ADVOCATE

Union County Superior Court Judge Daniel R. Lindemann recently administered oaths to 16 Union County residents among them Susan Boykin of Scotch Plains - to serve as extra eyes and ears for Family Court judges on cases involving abused, neglected or abandoned children currently in foster care. This marks the 30th training class since Court Appointed Special Advocates of Union County began in 2005. A 17th volunteer was sworn in at a later date.

The new CASA volunteers completed 30 hours of training over six weeks. After performing the oath, Judge Lindemann stepped off the bench and thanked each advocate for committing to serve children in need of a voice. A member of the nonprofit's board participated, and each new advocate was provided a commemorative pin and certificate. During a celebratory luncheon that followed, advocates were matched to their new case. Before starting that work, though, they observed court proceedings to see other CASA volunteers in action. Already, most are in the trenches, working their cases and making inroads for their assigned youth.

Volunteers with varied backgrounds and experiences make successful advocates, and this class is no exception: Ages

range from 33 to 80 and include parents, empty-nesters and non-parents; careers include health professionals, school personnel, attorneys and stay-at-home parents. Several experienced abuse in their own childhoods, and one was a CASA years ago who returned to help another child now that her schedule allowed. Most have no prior knowledge of the foster system.

CASA volunteers have court-ordered access to all parties in a child's life, including foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, and incorporate into court reports findings from these contacts as well as time spent with the youth. Volunteers advocate both in the community and court to ensure their youth's needs are met and time in care is as short as possible. There are 600 Union County children in foster care; CASA of Union County advocates for approximately one-quarter of those and its mission is to provide an advocate for every child that needs one.





## RESCUE SQUAD TIP OF THE MONTH: TEENAGERS AND PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

Parents are usually diligent about talking to their kids about drugs and alcohol. However, when they think of drugs, most tend to focus on marijuana, heroin, cocaine and other well-known street drugs. Often overlooked are the drugs sitting in their own medicine cabinets.

Prescription drug abuse among teens is a national health crisis. A survey launched by The Partnership at Drugfree.org, in conjunction with the MetLife Foundation, "showed that 24 percent of high school students -- more than 5 million kids -- have abused these medications." Many have done so before their 14th birthdays. It also showed that 56 percent of these drugs were found right at home. Friends are also a common source of different types of drugs. Kids who are on Ritalin and Adderall will sometimes share these drugs with school mates who do not suffer from ADHD.

There also seems to be a misconception among not only teens but their parents as well that prescription drugs are somewhat safer than street drugs. After all, they were dispensed by a doctor.

treat a particular symptom or prescribed for a particular individual whose weight and tolerance are taken into account can lead to dangerous consequences.

Therefore, it is important to keep track of all medications and keep them in a safe place. Some pain killers, like Oxycontin, contain opioids, which can mimic the effects of heroin. Taking these can cause low blood pressure and a slow breathing rate, and in some cases, can actually suppress breathing. Anti-anxiety medications and sedatives such as Xanax and Valium can also cause these symptoms along with memory problems. Overdoses often lead to coma and death. Stimulants, such as Ritalin and Adderall, can cause heart problems, dangerously high body temperatures, high blood pressure, as well as seizures and hallucinations if not taken as directed.

If you notice any of these symptoms in your teenage son or daughter (or any person), call 911 to obtain medical help immediately. There are

However, any drugs taken that are not used to medications such as Narcan that can reverse the effects of narcotics, and possibly save his or her life. This is why it is crucial to get help as soon as possible.

With over 90 volunteers, we answer calls not only in Scotch Plains but in surrounding towns as well when needed. 



## SCOTCH PLAINS-FANWOOD REGIONAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS BACK TO SCHOOL

Scotch Plains-Fanwood Public Schools welcomed back approximately 5,500 students to a full day of school on Tuesday, September 6th. We were particularly excited that our first class of full-day kindergarten students will be joining us. Finishing touches are being made to the additions at Evergreen and McGinn Schools. These additions were financed through our operating budget, which is within the state mandated cap requirements, and our communities will not bear additional costs associated with referendums.

Over 345 kindergarteners will be welcomed into 18 classes across the district. The program is staffed by a combination of returning kindergarten teachers, teachers who asked to transfer to kindergarten, and teachers who are new to our district. They have collaborated throughout the summer to plan for this exciting program focused on student centered learning and guided by the New Jersey Department of Education's Kindergarten Implementation Guidelines.

Our Preschool Program continues to provide services for early childhood learning in a cost effective manner. Tuition is being maintained at the rate of \$3,100 and tuition does not apply to classified and at-risk students. Enrollment is continuous and new students are welcome!

We are celebrating staff who are taking on new roles in our district. Lisa Rebimbas, formerly Park Middle School principal, is now our new Director of Special Services. Dr. Jocelyn Dumaresq, formerly our District English Language Arts Supervisor, is Park

Scotch Plains-Fanwood Public Schools Middle School's new principal, and Elizabeth McKenna, formerly English teacher at Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School is our new District English Language Arts Supervisor.

During the summer months, many of our teachers participated in professional development to enhance the upcoming school year organized by Dr. Joan Mast, Assistant Superintendent, and our district supervisors. The SPF Summer PD Academy was well subscribed this year, and teachers from all grade levels engaged in a variety of workshops ranging from Art History for Global Perspectives to Formative Assessment and Co-Teaching Strategies. Google Classroom featured students working with teachers in a collaborative learning environment.

Summer curriculum work enriches our programs. This summer the focus was on integrating elementary language arts and social studies, Media Center experiences for kindergarten and first grade, connecting math and literature in primary grades, expanding the middle school Connected Math Program to sixth grade, revising the Full Option Science Program (FOSS) units in kindergarten through grade five, and aligning middle school science with the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS).

Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School will be offering a new Advanced Placement course in Environmental Science. Students will make good use of our new greenhouse, donated by Thomas Hargreaves, as they design experiments in plant science. Updated learning resources support our programs and eleventh and twelfth

grade students in You and the Law as well as Advanced Placement European History will be using new texts and online resources.

Our new teachers participated in an intensive three-day orientation program and on September 1 and 2, professional development and staff meetings prepared everyone for the new school year. Again this year, a highlight of our opening of school program was our "Teachers Teaching Teachers" workshop that focused on deepening understanding of student engagement.

Under the guidance of Deborah Saridaki, School Business Administrator, and Anthony Miranda, Buildings and Grounds Director, our skilled buildings and grounds crews and custodians accomplished many summer projects including upgrades on interior doors as well as classroom re-configurations needed for new programs. In addition, roof improvements have been made at Park Middle School and Coles, McGinn and School One. New HVAC units have been installed for Park's second floor and Brunner's second floor. McGinn has a new boiler. Coles and Evergreen have new windows and paving projects were completed at Coles, Evergreen and McGinn.

Back-to-School evening presentations are planned for Elementary Schools on September 22, Middle Schools on September 15, and SPFHS on September 29. While many Scotch Plains students happily settle into school routines, buoyed by active parents readying for Back to School Night, there are foster youth without that support system who face educational challenges. Your commitment to their success helps ensure access to an education that meets their specialized needs:

Five-year-old Samantha is severely autistic and almost completely nonverbal. Due to excessive violence in the family home, a concerned neighbor called for help and, after investigation, Samantha was removed from her parents' care and placed in foster care. Although primarily nonverbal, the two phrases Samantha does say graphically depict the violence she witnessed at home and confirm the trauma she endured. Since entering care, it has become clear Samantha also is a victim of educational neglect. At age three, Samantha was entitled to an Individualized Education Plan from the Department of Education to ensure continued inhome speech and behavioral services to move her toward enrollment in a half-day educational program. Unfortunately, Samantha's parents neglected to utilize these services and she is now two years behind others her age! A CASA volunteer can advocate for Samantha's educational rights and needed services, among

other things, and make recommendations to the family court judge that will ensure her best interests remain prioritized.

CASA of Union County is seeking Scotch Plains residents to be the voice for one of the nearly 600 Union County youth, ages 0-21, in foster care through no fault of their own, as there are currently only enough volunteers to serve one-third of those youth. Trained CASA volunteers are sworn in by a judge and empowered to speak to foster parents, teachers, doctors, lawyers, tutors, therapists and more. They visit the youth regularly, incorporate findings into court reports and attend court hearings quarterly, working to ensure best interests are considered and a safe and permanent home is secured as quickly as possible. Although not required, there is a particular need for advocates who speak Spanish.

Fall training kicks off Tuesday, Sept. 27, 2016 and includes 10 sessions over several weeks. A swearing-in at the Union County Courthouse by a family court judge and luncheon follows. Training is 6 to 9 p.m. at the County Clerk Building, 300 North Avenue East in Westfield, across from the diner. A light dinner is provided.



## WHEN IT COMES TO PREVENTING SUICIDE, YOU MATTER!

September is Suicide Prevention Month. It's a time when organizations, communities and individuals throughout the nation will bring attention to how each of us can be a part of the solution to end suicide. Can you image feeling so hopeless that you'd consider taking your own life? For some what feels unthinkable is optional, and the experience often goes unnoticed and unaddressed. The unfortunate reality is that suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in America; occurs every 12.3 minutes; and, takes the life of approximately 117 individuals on any given day. Those who complete suicide most often suffered in silence and were desperate to end their emotional pain. Experts believe that people don't really want to die, but in a moment choose a permanent solution to solve a temporary problem that felt overwhelming. However, suicide can be prevented and help is available. Therefore, our challenge as a society, neighborhood, family member, friend or concerned individual is to be educated about suicide prevention, and prepared to take action in the event that we find ourselves in the difficult position to assist someone in distress.

It's important to know that we should always take a person serious whenever they suggest they no longer want to live. Also, we must understand that age, ethnicity, gender or economic status does not protect a person from experiencing suicidal thoughts or behaviors. It is always right to tell somebody who can partner with you to keep the person safe whether that be a parent, spouse/partner, adult sibling, teacher, doctor or police officer to name a few. Finally, in a crisis immediately call 911 or the National Suicide Hotline at 1-800-273-TALK (8255).

There are many opportunities to learn more and equip ourselves with helpful information. A few resources to assist us in our efforts to obtain important knowledge includes: 1) New Jersey Hopeline at 1-855-654-6735 or www.njhopeline.com - includes a live chat option; and, 2) National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (www.suicidepreventionlifeline.org). The list is not exhaustive nor intended to exclude a host of organizations that are invaluable in the effort to prevent suicide. It's simply a beginning step that each of us can take. Suicide prevention is everyone's business. So, speak up, speak out,

and speak often because you matter!


