SONDHEIM'S ASSASSINS OPENS CDC THEATRE'S 98TH SEASON

CDC Theatre, New Jersey's oldest continually producing community theatre, oped its 98th season Friday, October 7 at 8pm with the bold, original, disturbing and alarmingly funny musical Assassins.

A multiple Tony Award-winning theatrical tour-de-force with music and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim and book by John Weidman, Assassins combines Sondheim's signature blend of intelligently stunning lyrics and beautiful music with a panoramic story of our nation's culture of celebrity and the violent means some will use to obtain it, embodied by America's four successful and five would-be presidential assassins.

Assassins lays bare the lives of nine individuals who assassinated or tried to assassinate the President of the United States, in a one-act historical "revusical" that explores the dark side of the American experience. From John Wilkes Booth to Lee Harvey Oswald, writers, Stephen Sondheim and John Weidman, bend the rules of time and space, taking us on a nightmarish roller coaster ride in which assassins and would-be assassins from different historical periods meet, interact and inspire each other to harrowing acts in the name of the American Dream.

CHIEF JAMES WOZNIAK GRADUATED THE FBI NATIONAL ACADEMY

Chief James Wozniak graduated from the prestigious FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia on Friday, September 16, 2016. The 265th Session of the National Academy consisted of leaders in law enforcement from 47 states and 24 countries. The two hundred and thirty graduates represented law enforcement agencies ranging from cities to small towns, from colleges to military organizations. Collectively the group had over 4,600 years of law enforcement experience.

For 10 weeks Chief Wozniak underwent intensive professional development course work under the guidance of FBI leadership. At the Academy, he integrated with other law enforcement leaders, living in academy dorms, undergoing strenuous physical training and classroom instruction by seasoned special agents and subject matter experts through the University of Virginia.

The NA has been around since 1935. Prompted by twenty-first century challenges, FBI leadership has adjusted the NA's curriculum to address a host of issues ranging from threats posed by homegrown extremists to tensions between police departments and the communities they serve. One of the bedrock principles of the NA since its inception has been to build strong relationships amongst local, state, federal, and international agencies in order to enhance the flow of critical information and intelligence. And in the current terrorism threat environment and age of Internet radicalization, those bonds are more important than ever before.

CHILD SUPPORT – HOW NEW JERSEY COURTS CALCULATE AND MODIFY SUPPORT OBLIGATIONS

In New Jersey, child support is defined as a financial payment from one parent to the other to provide for the needs of their child or children. Child support is the right of every child and neither spouse can waive this responsibility. All parents regardless of their marital status have an obligation to support their children until they are deemed emancipated.

In most instances, the amount of child support to be paid is calculated by using New Jersey's Child Support Guidelines. Income information is exchanged between the parents and this data is used in combination with factors such as the number of children, percentage of non-custodial parenting time and other prior child support obligations, to determine the amount of child support that is to be paid weekly. The Guidelines take into account the amount of funds necessary between the two parents to cover the basic needs of the children including, but not limited to, their food, shelter, healthcare and clothing expenses.

Child support obligations will remain in place for many years. Child support is not terminated automatically and may continue longer based on extraordinary circumstances such as the special needs of a child. As such, a common aspect of many divorce agreements is an agreement between the parties for the use of a "COLA" which is an acronym for Cost-of-Living Adjustment. This procedure automatically raises child support awards every two or three years, the specific details of which are negotiated and agreed to before any final divorce judgment is entered. The purpose of a COLA is to keep the child support award's value current due to inflation. If child support is payable through the Probation Department, parents are often contacted directly regarding the implementation of a cost of living adjustment.

Changes to child support obligations can be made. Child support orders in New Jersey are subject to modification based upon what the Court may define as a change in circumstances. While there are numerous situations that can be defined as a change in circumstances, some of the more common situations that would qualify include:

- an increase in the cost of living
- the emancipation (as defined under law) of one or more of the children
- a demonstrable increase or decrease in the paying parents income
- a parent or child suffering a disability or serious illness
- or, in some instances, the maturation of the child or children.

If a modification in the amount of child support is appropriate, the party seeking to modify the amount paid is obligated to file an application with the Court. These written applications can sometimes be extremely fact sensitive and require extensive documented proof of the change in circumstances. This is particularly relevant if the reason for seeking a modification is employment or health related on the part of the paying parent.

MEET JIMMY ROBERTS ONE OF CRANFORD'S 86

Cranford 86 Adopt A Vet Committee It was the morning of September 11, 2016. As a member of the Cranford 86 Adopt A Vet committee, I was scheduled to meet a family of one of our Cranford 86 to hear their story of their loved one who perished in World War II. When we arranged the meeting it hadn't occurred that this Saturday was 911. I spent my morning as many do on that sad day, watching the families of the 911 families read the endless list of names that we have all become so familiar with. Although fifteen years have gone by, it still has a way of feeling like yesterday, I wiped some tears from my eye as the names past the letter G and went off to the home of Mary Roberts where she had gathered six Roberts/ Benoit family members.

They lined the dining room table, stacked on the table were articles and scrap books from their family archives that told the story of this brave

Roberts that went to war shortly after his last day as a Cranford High School senior in 1943.

Donna Roberts, Jimmy's cousin, took the lead as the coordinator of the articles into the family scrap book. They started telling me the stories and showing me their picture collection that would soon have everyone in attendance wiping tears from their eyes. For them 1944 was like yesterday.

The Roberts family already had 2 sons in the war by 1943, Alan and Edgar. Jimmy would be the third, he joined the Army at age 19 with his two school buddies Joe Griffin and Bob Greco. They reported before the actual commencement ceremony at Cranford High School. All three were assigned to the heavy cruiser Canberra. Bob Greco and Joe Griffin later told of a pact that was made between the three of them. If anything happened to any of them, they would visit the other families regularly upon their return.

As a part of the Aircraft Carrier Task Force they were positioned 70 miles off the China coast, making air strikes on the island of Formosa. On the evening of Friday, October the 13th, 1944 a Japanese attack squadron of 30 planes set out to take out this formation of destroyers, cruisers and four aircraft carriers. After a lengthy battle the guns went silent, the black smoke was clearing, many enemy and American fighters were downed and it seemed that this battle was over. Then a stream of bubbles were spotted heading toward the Canberra. A torpedo had been dropped and was heading toward the center of the ship. It exploded a 55 by 140-foot hole in the boiler room, killing 23 of the nearly 3,000 men on board. Jimmy was on duty that night in the boiler room.

On November 7th ,1944 a Western Union car pulled up in front of the Roberts home on 163 N. Union Ave. Jimmy's younger brother Walter was on a ladder repairing a window. It is told that he put the hammer through the window as the courier walked up the drive. He didn't know which one it was, but he knew one of his brothers were gone. Japanese; it housed a large number of the naval war ships and was the primary source of air attacks for the region. The battles at Formosa were carried out from October 10th - 20th, more than 300 Japanese attack planes were downed during the 10-day encounter. The first report of a Kamikaze strike happened here. After nine years a letter reached the Roberts family, they were informed that the remains of nine sailors from the Canberra would be relocated back to American soil. The family, along with Bob Greco and Joe Griffin, would travel to Zachary Taylor National Cemetery in Kentucky. They weren't given the opportunity to select the burial spot. I asked the family if they could describe what kind of guy Jimmy was. They said he was a happy go lucky guy that loved to drive his mother crazy with wacky antics. He was a real fun character.

For many years the Roberts family members along with Bob Greco and Joe griffin make their way to Canberra reunions around the country. Bob and Joe are gone now as well, but always remembered their pact, each year on October 13th they would always gather for a drink and a toast to their lost buddy and brother James D. Roberts.

FIRE DEPARTMENT CHIEF CZEH ANNOUNCES THEME FOR FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Each October, the Fire Service promotes fire and life safety initiatives during Fire Prevention Week throughout the country. Fire Prevention Week was proclaimed in 1920 by President Woodrow Wilson to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire of 1871 which claimed hundreds of lives and destroyed over 17,000 structures. Chief Czeh notes that this year's theme is "Don't Wait, Check the Date!" and stresses the importance replacing smoke detectors after ten years. The National Fire Protection Association recommends that:

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.
- Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your home.
- To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date. After that age, the sensitivity of the detector can be impaired, potentially delaying the alarm feature in the event of a fire. Residents should visit

In the coming days, the Fire Prevention Bureau will be visiting the Township Schools to conduct fire safety education programs for various age groups. Lieutenant Matthew Lubin, who directs fire prevention, risk reduction, and code enforcement, stresses the importance of proactive public education programs. "In Cranford, Fire Prevention is a year-round initiative across all age groups and risk populations." The Cranford Fire Prevention Bureau conducts programs from Kindergarten through High School and also has programs to help train employees and occupants of business, industrial, and special-hazard occupancies. In addition to the school programs, the Fire Department will have a fire prevention display at the Downtown Street Fair on October 16th.

Chief Czeh is also excited for the upcoming arrival of the Township new aerial fire apparatus. This new vehicle replaces Tower 1, which is over 25 years old and has reached the end of its useful service life. The new aerial truck should be in service sometime in late October or early November.

Aerodynamics in STEAM. Hillside Avenue and Orange Avenue schools. Applicants: Kristin Girone, Steve VanDam. A Flow Visualization Wind Tunnel will be used for hands-on study of aerodynamics and design processes in grades 6 through 8.V

DrumFit. Orange Avenue School. Applicants: Suzette de Araujo, Amanda Innis, Connie Thomas. Students in grade 3 through 5 will take part in DrumFit, a drumming-based activity that promotes mental focus as well as physical and musical education.

Virtual Reality with Google Cardboard.

Orange Avenue School. Applicant: Shannon DellaFortuna. Students in grades 6 through 8 will use Google Cardboard glasses, smartphones, and virtual reality apps to simulate science-related adventures.

PAL BASKETBALL TRYOUT ANNOUNCEMENT

"The Cranford PAL Basketball is a travel level basketball program for boys and girls in grades 4 through 8. Basketball Program Director John Frieri explained the tryout process. "We have one team at each level that is selected after competitive annual tryouts typically conducted in October. We have a panel of at least three evaluators select each team after two days of tryouts. After the teams are selected the Director selects the head coach for each team based upon candidates that have expressed an interest in coaching a specific grade level", he said.

The season itself runs from November through mid-March and could last an additional week if your child's team should be lucky enough to make the championship game in their specific league.

Teams practice twice a week and will usually play one game a week either home or away. It is up to the coach which leagues and tournaments the team will compete in but the PAL allows for up to two leagues and five tournaments for each team. More often than not the teams compete in one league and three to four tournaments. Younger teams usually compete in one to two tournaments in addition to their league play.

Cost to parents is the registration fee after your child makes the team in the amount of \$175, uniform as may be necessary and any team costs for leagues and tournaments that is incurred beyond the first league and most expensive tournament for which the PAL pays on behalf of each team.

Please encourage your children to put on their sneakers and show up for tryouts when they are announced as it costs nothing to tryout, no preregistration required and your child just shows up and plays basketball.
