

A total of 1,200 dictionaries will be presented, including Spanish-English dictionaries for ESL students.

"Our Dictionary Project for Plainfield and North Plainfield school children is in its eleventh year," said Ravenell Williams, president of the club. "It is one of our most important and most successful community service projects because of its direct contact with so many young girls and boys in their classroom settings. All of our members feel the same way - our hearts are warmed by the smiles and even cheers when we announce the gift and present the dictionaries to each student. This project is so important to the education of our children, and we are proud to play our part."

People from both communities are welcome to join this project. The Rotary Club works with the schools and teachers to help make their students active readers, good writers, and creative thinkers. "We love to have people join us on the project," said club president Williams. "It's a great way to see directly what Rotary is all about - service to others. What better way to do that than helping children with their education?"

The Rotarians take the opportunity to teach the children about service to the community, both local and worldwide. "I like to involve the students by first asking for help defining "rotary" and "club"," said Michael Townley, club secretary. Mr. Townley is on the team that usually presents the dictionaries at the Cook,

"After hearing some excellent responses, I have a student read each definition from the book. Then we talk about service, about what it means to be a Rotarian helping others, about Rotary's efforts to eliminate polio.

"Most children don't know about polio, because it is not a disease we find in this hemisphere. That opens up a wider discussion about how Rotarians throughout the world have worked together to virtually eliminate this crippling disease. The discussion is a great opportunity for us to teach 'Service Above Self' to these young students," said Mr. Townley.

The dictionaries are purchased through The Dictionary Project, Inc., a non-profit created in 1995 in South Carolina. The Dictionary Project's mission is to put a dictionary in the hands of

Two former presidents (portrayed by actors, of course!) will visit two more Somerset County Library System of New Jersey library branches this fall, on October 19, from 7-8 p.m at SCLSNJ's Warren Township Library branch located at 42 Mountain Boulevard in Warren Township; and on November 7, from 7-8 p.m. at SCLSNJ's North Plainfield Memorial Library branch, located at 6 Rockview Avenue in North Plainfield.

In September, American Historical Theatre actor Neill Hartley visited SCLSNJ libraries to perform Franklin Delano Roosevelt's famous speech, "Arsenal for Democracy."

In October, American Historical Theatre actor Peyton Dixon will make his last visit to Warren Township Library to deliver spellbinding performances as President Theodore Roosevelt. In November, Hartley will return to one more SCLSNJ library branch for an encore performance as FDR.

Peyton will bring Teddy's vigorous persona to life on October 19, 7-8 p.m. at SCLSNJ's Warren Township Library branch, located at 42 Mountain Boulevard in Warren Township.

The North Plainfield Fire Department would like to remind our community that October is National Fire Prevention month. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is the nation's leading information and knowledge resource on fire, electrical and related hazards, and their public education campaign is an annual reminder about the importance of "fire safety".

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Don't Wait - Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years," represents the final year of a three-year effort to educate the public about basic but essential elements of smoke alarm safety.

The NFPA's survey data shows that the public has many misconceptions about smoke alarms, which may put them at increased risk in the event of a home fire. For example, only a small percentage of people know how old their smoke alarms are, or how often they need to be replaced.

As a result of those and related findings, the If you have someone who is interested in NPFA is addressing smoke alarm replacement this year with a focus on these key messages: • Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.

- Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your home.
- To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date.

During this monthly campaign, the fire department will be visiting many of the public and private schools to educate the students in our community about fire safety.

We will also be holding an Open House at our Fire Headquarters, 8 Lincoln Place on Saturday, October 15th between 10:00 and 2:00 pm. All Fire and EMS apparatus will be on display and our Firefighters and EMTs will be available to answer questions. Please come out and join us for this event!

Also be reminded that during this month we will begin our annual smoke detector battery replacement program for our local senior citizens.

Tips for a Safe Halloween

Halloween can be a fun holiday for kids, but a worrisome one for parents. Concerns about children's safety--whether they are out in the neighborhood or back home with bags of booty--can darken the day more quickly than a black cat. But not to worry! To make Halloween a treat, follow these safety tips.

ADULTS

- Make sure the path to your door is clear, welcome trick-or-treaters with your porch lights and turn on any exterior lights.
- Report any suspicious or criminal activity to your police department immediately call.
- Do not give homemade or unwrapped treats to children.

MOTORISTS

Exercise extreme caution when driving a vehicle. Be on the alert for excited youngsters, whose vision may be obscured by masks, darting out into traffic.

TRICK OR TREAT TIPS Make sure your kids dress up safely

- Make sure costumes are flame retardant so children aren't in danger near burning jacko-lanterns.
- Keep costumes short to prevent trips, falls, and other bumps in the night.
- Try make-up instead of a mask. Masks can



be hot and uncomfortable, and they can obstruct a child's vision, a dangerous thing when kids are crossing streets and going up and down steps.

• Make sure kids wear light colors or put reflective tape on their costumes.

Make trick-or-treating trouble free

- Trick-or-treaters should always be in groups so they aren't a tempting target for real-life goblins. Parents should accompany young children.
- Make sure older kids trick-or-treat with friends. Tell them to stop only at familiar homes where the outside lights are on.
- Try to get your kids to trick-or-treat while it's still light out. If it's dark, make sure someone has a flashlight, add reflective tape to costumes and bags, and pick well-lighted streets.
- Do not go inside anyone's home. Remain on the porch at all times.
- Do not accept rides from strangers and be sure children do not approach any vehicle, occupied or not.
- Remind kids to keep a safe distance from moving cars.
- Cross only at street corners, never between parked cars, and never diagonally across an intersection.
- Look in all directions before crossing the street, and obey all traffic signals. Walk, never run, across the street. and use sidewalks, not the street, for walking.



- Do not eat any treats until parents have inspected them.
- Discard any homemade or unwrapped treats.
 - Teach children how to call 9-1-1 in an emergency.

Check all treats before eating

- It's hard for kids to hold back from eating their treats until they get home. One way to keep trick-or-treaters from digging in while they're still out is to feed them a meal or a snack beforehand.
- Check out all candy in a well-lighted place when your trick-or-treater gets home.
- What to eat? Only unopened candies and other treats that are in original wrappers. Don't forget to inspect fruit and homemade goodies for anything suspicious.
- Halloween can be a lot of fun for parents and kids alike--if everybody remembers the tricks and treats of playing it safe.


