STUDENTS TRAINED TO HEAL OTHERS THROUGH LISTENING

On September 2, just a few days before the start of school, 31 student volunteers from Westfield High School's "Guy and Girl Thing" program were trained by the staff of Imagine, A Center for Coping With Loss, on how to create a more supportive school environment.

Through a grant from the Westfield High School PTSO, the students received six hours of intensive training about grief and loss and the many barriers that keep people from expressing their emotions and reaching out for help. Additionally, they learned strategies for facilitating peer groups and how to be active and empathetic listeners. They will put their knowledge and skills to use not only in their personal relationships but also through facilitating informal "Hangout" sessions which students can attend on various topics such as coping with divorce, the illness or death of a loved one, academic stress, learning disabilities, and more. The "Hangouts" are scheduled to begin for Westfield High School students in October and run throughout the school year on a bi-weekly basis.

"The Guy and Girl Thing" was started by Susan Kolesar, Health teacher at Westfield High School in 2004 to have seniors teach underclassmen about health-related topics. Various activities have been incorporated throughout the years including assemblies, students and teachers sharing their lifestories, retreats, and most notably, the reading and discussion of the "What I Wish I Knew Then..." letters that the seniors write to the underclassmen each year. Health teacher Michelle Spreitzer has been assisting in the programs since 2007. Kevin Everly, who also teaches health, and Paul Valenzano, a guidance counselor at WHS, will be actively involved in overseeing the program as well.

Beyond providing peer support groups to the public, imagine also provides grief education to both students and school staff. This training was led by Imagines' Connie Palmer, Clinical Training Director at Imagine, Corey Wisler, Grief Recovery Specialist, Nick Breza, and Caroline Snizek.

CHILD SUPPORT – HOW NEW JERSEY COURTS CALCULATE AND MODIFY SUPPORT OBLIGATIONS

In New Jersey, child support is defined as a financial payment from one parent to the other to provide for the needs of their child or children. Child support is the right of every child and neither spouse can waive this responsibility. All parents regardless of their marital status have an obligation to support their children until they are deemed emancipated.

In most instances, the amount of child support to be paid is calculated by using New Jersey's Child Support Guidelines. Income information is exchanged between the parents and this data is used in combination with factors such as the number of children, percentage of non-custodial parenting time and other prior child support obligations, to determine the amount of child support that is to be paid weekly. The Guidelines take into account the amount of funds necessary between the two parents to cover the basic needs of the children including, but not limited to, their food, shelter, healthcare and clothing expenses.

Child support obligations will remain in place for many years. Child support is not terminated automatically and may continue longer based on extraordinary circumstances such as the special needs of a child. As such, a common aspect of many divorce agreements is an agreement between the parties for the use of a "COLA" which is an acronym for Cost-of-Living Adjustment. This procedure automatically raises child support awards every two or three years, the specific details of which are negotiated and agreed to before any final divorce judgment is entered. The purpose of a COLA is to keep the child support award's value current due to inflation. If child support is payable through the Probation Department, parents are often contacted directly regarding the implementation of a cost of living adjustment.

Changes to child support obligations can be made. Child support orders in New Jersey are subject to modification based upon what the Court may define as a change in circumstances. While there are numerous situations that can be defined as a change in circumstances, some of the more common situations that would qualify include:

- an increase in the cost of living
- the emancipation (as defined under law) of one or more of the children
- a demonstrable increase or decrease
- in the paying parents income
- a parent or child suffering a disability or serious illness
- or, in some instances, the maturation of the child or children.

If a modification in the amount of child support is appropriate, the party seeking to modify the amount paid is obligated to file an application with the Court. These written applications can sometimes be extremely fact sensitive and require extensive documented proof of the change in circumstances. This is particularly relevant if the reason for seeking a modification is employment or health related on the part of the paying parent.

WESTFIELD TEACHER SAVES WOMAN FROM DROWNING

Westfield English teacher, Matthew Kalafat, thought his Sunday afternoon at the Jersey shore with his family would be a respite from the first hectic weeks of school. Instead, the middle school English teacher plunged into the ocean on September 25 to save a woman who was pulled under by the strong riptide. "It was instinct over intellect – I jumped into the water," said Kalafat, as he responded to his wife's terrified scream when noticing the body floating lifeless. Kalafat jumped in and managed to bring the victim to shore as he himself struggled and went under after a "giant wave knocked me silly." Bystander Scott McLaren, who had First Aid Squad training, started CPR on the victim, who was without a pulse.

Kalafat and McLaren learned that although she was taken unconscious to the hospital, Dishita Pandya has since fully recovered. They reconnected with her in her hospital room where she thanked the men who saved her life. Kalafat predicts that Pandya, a doctor who is a native of India, also will have the opportunity to save lives.

CIVIL AIR PATROL PROGRAM OF UNION COUNTY

The Civil Air Patrol Cadet Program of Union County ended their action packed summer by providing a presentation to community members in the Scotch Plains Library. The Civil Air Patrol is a non-combatant organization, which is an auxiliary of the Air force, made up of civilian volunteers. Cadets had the opportunity to teach local students about aerospace concepts, as well as give hands-on training on how to use a flight simulator. The purpose of the event was to serve as an outreach program to display what the cadet program encompasses, hopefully sparking some interest among the student population in Scotch Plains and the surrounding towns within Union County.

The day was broken down into two sections. The cadets first presented a PowerPoint explaining topics, such as how wings create lift; which, according to NASA, is a subject that many internet sources, textbooks, and encyclopedias get wrong. The theory NASA uses is what the cadets explained in their presentation, the Bernoulli's principle. NASA also refers to an Isaac Newton theory, but explains that the Bernoulli's theory is correct, along with Newton's theory. Other topics covered in the first session included the axis of an airplane and also the parts of an airplane that control maneuvers.

The second portion of the program was dedicated to more hands-on instruction. Students at the library were instructed on how to use flight simulators. Two simulators were used in the demonstration. Attendees could practice how to take off, land, fly, and could also learn the different instruments on a plane and how they

Jose and Ceri Vergara are in charge of the Civil Air Patrol. Ceri explains that the Civil Air Patrol began during World War II for the purpose of allowing civilians, who owned airplanes, to get involved. During the September 11th attacks, civilian airplanes were used for reconnaissance. The Civil Air Patrol Program has programs for both adults and teenagers, ages 12-18. Currently, the Civil Air Patrol Program of Union County has 6 adult members, these members are in charge of providing education and scheduling activities for the group. The group meets Tuesdays from 7-9 p.m. at Chatham High School.

Jose and Ceri were inspired to join the Civil Air Patrol by their daughter, Veronica Vergara, who attends Union County Vocational Technical School in Scotch Plains. Currently, Veronica is the elder of the cadets and has taken over as senior cadet.

Jose notes that countless students looking to go to college in the near future often seek extracurricular activities in order to stand out. This is where a program like Civil Air Patrol could be useful. Ceri feels that in addition to the program looking good on your resume, students also have the opportunity to learn and experience things that they might not in a regular school setting. One parent, Ceri recalls, stated at a parent's meeting, "This is the best kept secret in the United States!"

Noting this isn't the case for the 600 Union County children in foster care, Gabe added, "Many of these kids have been removed from home because their parents can no longer take remaining \$700 to the organization, noted, "My care of them. Many of the parents suffer from mental illness or substance abuse. These kids are neglected, or physically or mentally abused."

Gabe met with staff and quickly found a pressing need: organization of a conference room that had become makeshift storage, as toys,

When he approached Court Appointed Special books, school supplies, pajamas and CASA marketing materials were stashed in every nook and cranny. After hearing about time spent searching for items and the difficulty in assessing what's on hand and what's not, Gabe hatched a plan: inventory the room, build and install shelves, sort and organize items into bins, create an inventory spreadsheet by shelf location, and provide a tablet on which staff could manage inventory electronically.

To make it happen, Gabe raised \$2,150 from family, friends and troop members; mapped the space; ordered supplies; devised a two-day work schedule; and recruited help from several Troop 77 members, his mom and brother. Today, that chaotic space is now an orderly oasis, and CASA staff can easily access items and identify needs.

Gabe, who spent \$1,450 and is donating the experience was really great. CASA was a great partner and really allowed me to be creative with my project. I was a little overwhelmed just before we started to fix the storage room. There was a lot more stuff than I thought there would be! I wasn't sure we'd be able to complete the project

in the time I'd proposed. Luckily, my volunteers worked really hard and the system I came up with worked really well. I'm very proud of the way the room looks and how happy CASA is!"

CASA Executive Director Marla Higginbotham said she and staff are thrilled. "Staff spends their time working with our volunteers, attending court, training advocates and managing cases. The storage space had gotten out of hand but we just hadn't been able to dig in and devote time or resources. Gabe's planning, fundraising and commitment brought about a result well beyond our expectations. He's made our job easier, which means he's absolutely helping us more easily impact the lives of abused and neglected children from his own county. We thank him, and our kids thank him."

There are many ranks within Boy Scouts, and Eagle is the highest. Currently a Life Scout, Gabe had three years to earn 21 merit badges and lead and complete a service project before turning 18. He predicts his Eagle Scout ceremony will be this Winter or early Spring; given his efficiency and determination, CASA staff is betting he'll be right on schedule.
