

UNICANS CELEBRATE 50 YEARS

UNICO National is the largest Italian-American service organization. The Elizabeth Chapter is celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of receiving its charter. While other community service organizations and social clubs have been faltering, the Elizabeth UNICO has been experiencing a recent surge in membership and activity. The organization has experienced a lull in participation over the last decade but has rebounded

The organization has experienced a lull in participation over the last decade but has rebounded with a flux of new members. This younger generation has stepped-up to the challenge of filling the void of absent past members.

Many service organizations experience a decline in participation over time and some naturally go dormant until something sparks a revival. In some cases the need that inspired the group to form may no longer exist or the group has been eclipsed by newer organizations. What is common in most part is the dwindling membership and participation due to attrition caused by aging and the relocation of members. Some members' participation is sidelined by the demands of growing families and work responsibilities. There is the factor of mortality that comes into play, especially when groups are fifty years old. Only two of the original Elizabeth charter members are alive and they are the still active, the DiBella brothers, 88-year-old Anthony, and 80-year-old Mario.

UNICO National was founded in 1922 in order to engage in charitable works, support higher education, and perform patriotic deeds. The mission is still intact and the needs, though they have changed over time, still remain. At the time of UNICO's founding, the Italian-American population suffered from discrimination. Proving that Italian immigrants were loyal to America, their new home, was first and foremost. The prevailing sentiment was that they remained loyal to their former homeland especially in the wake of the Sacco-Venzetti trial. Italian-Americans held no allegiance to their native land save traditions and culture. They certainly had compelling proof of their loyalty in that during World War I, the Italian-American community represented only four percent of the entire United States population, although 12 percent of all Americans casualties during this conflict were Italian-American.



UNICO's extended mission is one of charity, helping those less fortunate, which is a need that never diminishes. Over the past fifty years UNICO has raised funds through their annual dinner dance and other programs which supported numerous local organizations. Recipients of their generosity are St. Anthony's Church and School, Center for Hope Hospice, Arc of Union County, Kohler Development Center and the Occupational Center. Annual academic scholarships are awarded each year depending on the number of applicants, along with the Brian Piccolo trophy; this is awarded to students who excel in sports as well as academics. Seven students received scholarships in 2012. UNICO also supports research and treatment efforts that battle Cooley's Anemia, a blood disorder that affects people of Mediterranean descent. It has been a national effort for the organization.

UNICO members also give of their time and talents. Volunteers spend "Days of Service" improving the community. Projects in the past included graffiti removal, river clean up, landscaping, painting and repairs.



Editor's Opinion

everybody has one - this is mine - by Joe Renna

My dad's birthday was August 6th and he turned 88 years old. He is extremely independent, still drives and is very active every day.

Growing up dad was not warm and fuzzy and not much of a conversationalist. As most "children of the Great Depression" he had a tough upbringing only to be eclipsed by horrific experiences during World War II. As like many of his generation he never spoke to his children about the war. It was a pleasant surprise to my brother when dad recently began to "open up", at length, with detailed conversations, about his Navy years. My Uncle Manny would share many memories of his family growing up and it was through him that I knew how tough they had it, especially what it was like for families to be home while loved ones were at war. There was the anxiety of not knowing where your son or brother was, sometimes for a long period of time. Dad was silent about his past and it was just an accepted aspect of life growing up. We never questioned him and even when we did his responses were no more than a sentence or two.

Dad joined the Navy on his seventeenth birthday, August 6, 1942; this was the same day the US Marines landed on Guadalcanal. Once in, he continued to re-up and volunteer for new missions. He served a total of three and half years and he says he was very lucky to come out alive after "facing death at least a half-dozen times". He was involved in a total of nine battles in the Pacific versus Japanese forces and one battle against the Germans in North Africa. He was on the destroyer USS Stevens during the time it earned five of its nine Battle Stars

His first action, just three months after enlisting, was in North Africa.

His crew were sitting ducks for the German shelling

that sunk his ship. The Battle of Casablanca was brutal, and the U.S. lost four ships along with 462 men. Dad was then sent to the Pacific front, via the Panama Canal. He opted to stay in New Caledonia and volunteered to serve on the USS John Penn. On August 13, 1943, the Penn was hit by a kamikaze and sunk. Ninety men on board died. My dad along with the other survivors, were then assigned to the USS President Adams which was headed for the island of Bougainville.

During efforts to regain control of the island from the Japanese, dad road on a small Higgins boat with the 3rd Marine Division while the Japanese fleet tried to pin them down. Coincidently, his buddy from back home Sy Russo, also from Peterstown, was there with the 3rd Marine Division. My dad's was the first Higgins to hit the beach. The first wave of troops could only strafe beach. He grabbed one of the 30mm weapons that the Marines used on his way off the boat when it was hit. He was the only person in the boat to get out without an injury. He made it out with three others and an officer. They grabbed the injured around them and jumped into a new ship.

All the while the Japanese were pummeling the area. A call went out for a rescue boat while Japanese paratroopers started to descend. The thought of how close-up the fighting was did not register while it was going on. After Bougainville dad went to San Diego on a 30-day leave but then it was up to San Francisco and a new assignment on the USS Wiley. This was where he met Hall of Fame quarterback Norm Van Brocklin. He spent much of his time off the ship with Norm, and one time hitched back to his home in Walnut Creek, CA, just north of Oakland and stayed the weekend. The USS Wiley operated throughout the Philippines as part of

Admiral Bill Halsey's command. The Stevens was part of this fleet also. My Dad was just 18-years-old and now, 70 years later, he still remembers these experiences vividly. I'm glad by brother Phil is taking the initiative in recording these stories. He has so many more that he has been taking notes on. One of the main reasons I had for starting this newspaper, fourteen years ago, was to record the oral family histories that would otherwise be lost.

As my generation raised stakes and moved away the practice of talking to family friends and neighbors from the Peterstown neighborhood was disappearing. The stories of the neighborhood and family history would usually be shared during long sessions of hanging out in the cafes, shops, club houses and on front stoops. Those times are all but gone. I feel like this newspaper is my kitchen table in my home on the corner of Fourth Avenue and Niles Street. Thanks for hanging out.



Harry Street was one of the most sought after players in Union County in an era of softball that consisted of hundreds of teams in dozens of leagues. He was loyal though to his original team, The Roadrunners and its General Manager Manny Carravano. Manny's twin sons Jimmy and Joey spear headed the team and Harry was their loyal pitcher. No matter how hard other teams would try and recruit Harry, they knew there was no chance.

The Road Runners home base was Spencer Street in the Peterstown neighborhood in Elizabeth, NJ and they played in the Elizabeth City League and the Union

County Sunday Morning League. Harry was playing against many of his future team mates on those other squads and they would rather play with him than against him.

One of those teams was Sticky Fingers, also based in Peterstown. They recruited him to play with them in the Union County Warinanco Park League. It was only when Jimmy and Joey retired from playing and the Road Runners folded that Harry joined



Sticky Fingers in the Elizabeth League as well. The team went on a 75 game winning streak over two and a half years, two undefeated seasons and two championships with Harry on the mound.

With the Road Runners gone from the Sunday Morning League, Harry started playing for another Peterstown team, The Vets, managed by player/coach Johnny Amato. He also put them on a winning track.

At that time, Harry was playing ball almost every night. Where this would have been an excuse to get away from the family for most guys, Harry's ball playing was a family affair. His biggest supporter and number one fan was his late wife, Lorraine. She would attend his games bringing along with their two sons, Brian and Harry Jr. who kept busy being bat boys for the team.

Harry Streep still plays ball and in July won the prestigious 2013 New Jersey Senior Softball Association (NJSSA) 50+ State B Division Championship playing with his long-time teammate John Amato.

THE AMAZING STAT IS THAT THER ARE STATS

The history of Harry Streep's playing career was dictated by long time scorekeeper and teammate Tommy Renna. He rattled the timeline of Harry's career-the-cuff like it happened yesterday. Tom has a steel trap for numbers and stats and from a very young age he applied it to another love of his, sports. He was so deft at handicapping football that he was a go-to resource for his father's friends and relatives for picking winners on Sunday, even though he was wasn't even ten years old. A bowl of ice cream can be worth a payoff on a pair of underdogs; a parfait for a parlay, if you will.

Tom is the youngest of seven, with four older brothers who played sports and collected trading cards. Eventually he eclipsed all thier playing abilities by playing with them watching them play for organized teams. From a young age he studied strategy and quantified it with statistics. He still has the stats he compiled from forty years ago.

The first team Tommy kept score for was Villa Roma in the St. Anthony's Little League. Tommy was just five years old and his brother Phil, who was 9, was playing on the team. He was the protege of Coach Nick Netta, who used to call him "Stats." Mr Netta taught him how to keep score with a pencil and how to sharpen it with a pocket knife. Forty years later Tommy can still name the starting line up: Nick Netta Jr. Phil Renna, catcher Tom DeRosa, Mike Foti, Blaise Tornatore throwing fireballs, etc.

When he was seven, Tommy kept score for the softball team Quick Masonry sponsored and run by Neighbor George Triola. Tommy's brother Pete was playing for the team at the time. He also was keeping score for another team Pete played for, Wings, sponsored by Sacco's Meat Market and managed by Joe Sacco.

The next year a team sponsored by the restaurant Zio Angelo emerged and Tommy kept score while watching his brother Nick play. John Amato and Blaise Lapolla managed the team. Tom would wear the team's uniform and the name on his jersey would say "Coach". Players still call him Coach when they see him.

Though Tommy kept score for his team he would also record what the opposing team was doing. In this way he became familiar with players throughout the various leagues that he was monitoring. He remembers one time walking up to an umpire to protest a game because the other team batted out of order. The other team, guilty, wasn't expecting anyone was paying attention at softball game 9am on a Sunday morning, let a lone a 9 year old kid.

Tommy was also keeping score in hard ball leagues. Nick played for Betsytown. A prestigious baseball team coached by the legendary Lenny Green. Nick and his two friends, Joe LaRocca and Mike Colletti also played for a team called the Elizabeth Colonials. Tom learned more about statistics by keeping score for coaches Ron & Ray Matlosz and asst coach Fred Erxleben.

Tommy, was just thirteen and was responsible for calling in the states to the Star


At the end of the season Tom would give all the players a homemade baseball card with their individual stats, per game, both offensively and defensively, including their fielding position, rank on team, height, weight, street address, home phone number and if they were lefty or righty, along with their nicknames. If a player had great stats, Tom would get a tip. Player had bad stats sometimes just rip it up but tipped him anyway but maybe not as much.

Tommy first saw Harry play when he was seven when Carravano's Road Runners played Triola's Quick Masonry, their next door neighbors on Spencer Street. Tommy played his first season when he was 15 for Riccio's and a few years later played shortstop behind Harry for Sticky Fingers. Tom continues to play today with Harry and Johnny Amato for C&A Trucking. He is still till a few years away from joining them in the over 50 league.







INGREDIENTS:

1 Large onion sliced

1 20 oz jar of crushed or peeled tomatoes

1/4 Cup basil

1 Pinch of oregano (optional)

1 Cup of celery from the garden (or store bought)

1 Large zucchini sliced







ST. ANTHONY'S WELCOMES FR. PAT ANGELUCCI

On August 1, 2013, Fr. Pat Angelucci started his assignment as pastor of St. Anthony's Parish, which is located in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth, NJ, a neighborhood traditionally made up of, like Fr. Family Name History

Angelucci



The Italian surname Angelucci is patronymic, originating in the name "Angelo" which in turn comes directly from the word "angelo", a derivative of the Catin "angelus", from the Greek "anghelos", derived from the verb "anghello" meaning "to announce", and ulbimabely a branslabion of the Hebrev "mal'ak", which means "messenger of Goo". The suffix "-ucci" of the surname Angelucci, is one of those suffixes such as "-ino", "-one", "-ebbo", and "-ello", which give a particular flavor and meaning to nouns and adjectives to which they are attached. Since the Middle Ages, they have been used with first names to indicate size, age, affection, physical and moral qualities. The final letter in of the surname denotes the plural form, illustrating the process of the surname having been passed on from one generation to the next. Dariants of Angelucci include Angelini, Angelo, Angeli, Angelone, Angeloni and Angelussi.

References to this name or to one of its variants include a record of the Angelini family, who haileò from Assisi and who are first recorded in the year 1279. We also find records relating to a Dicar General named Antonio Angelucci, who is documented between 1583 and 1604. Notable bearers of the name include the medical doctor and literary figure, Ceodoro Angelucci, who died in 1600, the Jesuit priest and philosopher Ignazio Angelucci, who died in 1653, the maker of violines Angelo Angelucci, who died in Waples, in 1765 and the politician and doctor Eiborio Angelucci, who was born in 1764. Additional references to the name include the marriage of Pietro Angelucci and Domenica Cartaglia, which book place in Guilmi, Chiebi, ont he 5th of February, 1809. Cansana Angelucci, baughter of Francesco Angelucci and Angela la Rocca, was born in Palieba, Chiebi, on the 10th of October, 1812.






